

Galway are triumphant but camogie is also a winner

Teams' combined total of 3-31 make it the highest scoring final since 1988

Camogie needed this. Not specifically Galway winning their first All-Ireland since 2013, nor Kilkenny's run of lost finals ticking along to three in a row.

Not even the healthy crowd of 24,703, the highest ever for a standalone final (ie, one not

ne All-Ireland champion, but two winners. Where Galway had

cause for celebration, so too had the game of camogie itself.

There was the record-breaking crowd of 24,730, fantastic underdog stories in Westmeath and Kerry, and then a senior final to beholdeasily the most engrossing ca-mogie decider since Cork and Wexford shared six goals back in 2012. And, if we're truthful, the quality of fare and scoretaking on display yesterday surpassed 2012 and many

other finals along with it. Camogie needed this senior final, needed this spectacle,


particularly after the arm-wrestles of 2017 and 2018, both of which were blighted by overly fussy officiating. In that light, referee Ray Kelly is to be commended for not enforcing himself on proceed-

Yes, the Galway crowd was none-too-pleased with some of the decisions they didn't get, and yes, there were seven yellow cards doled out, but Kelly was only a bit-part figure in the overall narrative. He didn't at any time seek to cast himself in a leading role.

The contrast between this game and the corresponding fixtures in 2017 and 2018 can be seen in the fact that Gal-way's half-time total of 3-7 would have been sufficient to win both of those two finals.

It was Galway's first-half performance which laid the foundation for their third O'Duffy Cup triumph, adding to the 1996 and 2013 wins.

As early as the 86th second, Galway had the sliotar in the Kilkenny net. Kilkenny had bagged the opening score, a Michelle Quilty free, but in the ensuing play, Aoife Donoghue and Niamh Kilkenny combined to put through Ailish O'Reilly and, no more than she did in the 2013 decider, the Oranmore/Maree forward



the opening goal.

The next six points were evenly split, but Kilkenny asserted themselves thereafter, outscoring their opponents by 0-5 to 0-1 between the 10th and 20th minutes. Quilty was re-sponsible for all bar one of these Kilkenny scores, her dead-ball accuracy punishing Galway's indiscipline. Denise Gaule also wrote her

name onto the scoresheet, but she was one of a very small number of players in black and amber making any sort of impression in the opposition

Anne Dalton came into this final having hit 6-11 from open play, but was a spectator in that opening half, such was the marshalling job done by forward-turned-defender Caitriona Cormican. There were others who will harbour regrets over their respective performances. That Kilkenny didn't create a single gilt-edged goal chance highlights the extent to which their attack misfired, even if they did post 0-17.

The league champions made the crucial burst on the run-up to half time, hitting 2-3 to Kilkenny's solitary white


flag. Sarah Healy's puck-out strategy of landing possession in the middle of Kilkenny's half-back line, with Galway swarming in numbers under the breaking ball, reaped sig-nificant rewards. It was from one such restart that Galway struck for goal number two, Niamh Hanniffy scrambling the sliotar home after Ailish O'Reilly and Sarah Spellman

had been thwarted.
That score put Galway into a 2-6 to 0-10 lead and there was five between them little over a minute and a half later as O'Reilly drilled home her sec-ond, taking advantage of a

mistake by a Kilkenny de-fender who failed to hold on to possession when attempting to intercept a Niamh Kilkenny

The winners led 3-7 to 0-10 at the break, but could have had two more green flags as Emma Kavanagh and Kellyann Doyle both produced goal-line heroics in quick succession, while Catherine Foley's last-ditch hook denied Catherine Finn-

Camogie, as well as Galway, the big winner



ut of all of Galway's three All-Ireland senior successes, I imagine this one will tick all the boxes. Not alone because they have beaten two of the best teams in the country - Cork and Kilkenny

but when the Cats brought it down to a dogfight in the second half, their determination and resolve could not

be questioned.

They, along with Kilkenny, contributed to the kind of All-Ireland final that camogie supporters had craved. In contrast to the two previous low-scoring finals, there was widespread praise among the 24,730-strong crowd after this edge-of-the-seat encounter. The game of camogie was the big winner, showcased all through as the spectacle it is. In the end, it was the com-mitment and sheer brilliance

of each and every one of the Galway women that saw Sarah Dervan mount the steps of the Hogan Stand to collect the O'Duffy Cup. For me, the work-rate of Niamh Kilkenny was Galway's inspiration. The midfielder weighed in with four unbelievable points from play. Kilkenny, from the Pearses club, is one of Galway's more seasoned contributors, and her vital presence was felt all through.

Galway didn't have the best start to the day either, which makes this triumph all the more memorable. When news broke yesterday morning in Croke Park that regular wingback Tara Kenny was out, having suffered a cruciate ligament injury in recent days, the immediate feeling was one of heartbreak for the Sarsfields players, but also concern that there would have to be a significant reshuffle to the Galway back six. Such an alteration would surely have serious consequences, especially against Kilkenny's potent attack.

After all, this was a maroonand-white defensive unit that had excelled all season. And secured a National League title, which kickstarted this momentous journey.

Incredibly, the Galway management still got all the necessary duels spot on.

Mountebellow/Moylough's Catherine Finnerty was the replacement off the bench. And while it meant that Cathal Murray had to switch some of his key players to facilitate the alteration Catriona Cormican moving to half-back to mark Kilkenny dangerwoman Anne Dalton and Finnerty coming into attack — they remained resolute in defence while still

managing to fly out of the

They fired three goals and 14 points in one of their best performances all year. Ailish O'Reilly's goals - one at the start and one at the end of the first half - were sheer quality. She played a part in Niamh Hannify's goal too. It was evident O'Reilly was their go-to forward. Her first goal set the tone, rocking Kilkenny to the core. It gave Galway the dream start against a Cats outfit that now has suffered a third straight loss on All-Ireland final day - their fifth in six years.

O'Reilly's second goal — Galway's third — was the killer blow on the brink of half time after a ferocious opening 30 minutes which saw so many players put their bodies on the line. Galway were six points up at the break - the same margin they emerged victorious by. Kilkenny, meanwhile, had relied heavily on the free-taking accuracy of Michelle Quilty and went to the dressing room rattled by what Galway had brought to the table — pure aggression, physicality, and unbelievable will-to-win.

Kilkenny boss Ann Downey needed to get her charges, who were fortunate not to have conceded another couple of goals, into the dressing room - and fast. Kilkenny steadied the ship in the second half, but were always chasing this game. To their credit, they cut the margin to two points and it looked like the come-back was on. But cool heads, and a couple of late Galway scores, saw them through.

All of this after Galway under the same management had lost out to Westmeath in the intermediate final an hour earlier. What a turnaround from the Leinster team, who were seven points behind at half time, to win by two. They played in the Premier Junior grade just two years ago, and nobody more than long-serving Pamela Greville (who scored 0-9) deserves to play top-flight camogie To conclude, we should also

applaud superb Kerry. Led by the excellent Patrice Diggin and having lost 12 months ago to Dublin, they deserved every bit of their victory in the Premier Junior final. Their massive support was evident around the arena, with lots of green and gold flying from early morning.

It was hard luck on Limerick, but they found Kerry that little bit too strong. They say you learn more in defeat, and it was no surprise to see the Ian Brick managed the team back again. It was an extraordinary achievement considering 14 of the starting 15 are from the Clanmaurice club, with Brid Horan from Cillard the only exception.



For long stretches here, they were at least Galway's equal and frequently their better. Problem was, they never came close to scoring a goal.

Up against Galway's first-half trifecta, that was never going to get it done. Ailish O'Reilly bookended the opening period with a goal after two minutes and another two minutes short of the break. Throw in another from Niamh Hanniffy and the weight of it all was always going to be tough to bal-



Westmeath Galway

Camogie 'on a crest of a wave' with more to come



HE record-breaking attendance of 24,730 at Sunday's camogie finals was one of many highlights of a dizzying day for the sport, but in keeping with expectations for a game that has gone stratospheric in recent times.

In the past year, female sport has enjoyed an explosion of interest. Last September the record attendance of over 50,141 at the ladies' football finals became the best attended female sporting event in Europe. Some 60,739 watched Atletico Madrid's women face Barcelona in March. This summer was synonymous with the success of the women's soccer World Cup, with the winning team of America containing many outspoken and charismatic members.

Since the All-Ireland camogic finals became stand-alone sports events, the attendances have steadily risen. In 2014, 12,476 came through the gates. That rose up to break the 20k mark in 2016 with 20,037 and while they fell just marginally short of the 25,000 mark they had targeted this year, the level they have reached is remarkable.

President of the Camogie Association, Kathleen Woods, says it came as no surprise from those involved in promoting the game.

"We were expecting to beat it," says the Armagh native, from the Derrynoose club.

"One of the major things about this season has been the number of games to have been streamed live throughout the Championship. There was a game streamed live every weekend, and AIB did the same during the club Championship."

every weekend, and AIB did the same during the club Championship." She explained: "So, more people are being exposed to the top quality of the sport. The notion that there are wee girls running around the pitch protending to be hurlers... That's

"They are strong, determined, highly-tuned and toned athletes who spend four, maybe five days a week honing their skills and improving their physical competencies. And that has been the case for a number of years. It's taken a while to build it up and I really believe camogie is on the crest of a wave, I truly do and I have high hopes for our game over this next decade."

New technology has helped their cause. Sky TV broadcasting the game was a statement of intent also and Woods paid lavish tributes to the employees of the Camogie Association.

"I have to say the team of dedicated employees that we have, you couldn't pay them for what they do," she said. "Everybody comes into work with a job description, but to achieve what they have yesterday, it takes everybody on board and everybody driving forward."

Part of the appeal of this year's final was how referee Ray Kelly handled the occasion, allowing a certain amount of physical contact that was disappointingly absent in the previous year's decider. Woods revealed that work-is well underway to implement a number of experimental rule changes for the 2020 leagues, with the level of physicality expected to be addressed.

The first draft of rule changes is expected to be back to Ard Chomhairle for their October meeting.

"We are hoping for no more than three rule changes at a time – I think we have learned that as a way forward. You have to allow referees, coaches, players a chance to come to terms with changes," said Woods. "They will put forward their rec-

"They will put forward their recommendations to us and we have past players, present players, we have health and medical specialists on this Rules group and it is chaired by Liam O'Neill (former President of the GAA)"

The Camogie Association have also plans to increase participation levels in the large urban areas of Belfast and Derry, joining in with the greater efforts of the 'Gaelfast' financial package aimed at strengthening the GAA in Belfast, and a similar scheme in Derry city.

scheme in Derry city.

Woods stated, "The staff member over this will be funded by the Camogie Association at national level. We will be working very closely with the Belfast 'Gaelfast' initiative. Our rural clubs are more secure than our urban clubs. We have huge urban populations that are missing out on our games, so we really want to being our game to those girls. Schools will be a big target. I know Ulster administrator Julie O'Neill is doing major work in schools and colleges across Ulster. She is having great results. She is the administrator in Armagh.

"Integration with the GAA and camogle in Ulster is very, very strong and leading the way, on the ground."

Downey steps down as Kilkenny boss

Kilkenny boss Ann Downey stepped down from her role after Sunday's All-Ireland senior final defeat to Galway.

Kilkenny Camogie chairperson Sheila Norris said Downey's dedication to her county "has been second to none".

Norris said: "Having done a two-year stint from 2008-2009 and reaching the All-Ireland in 2009, she again took over the reins in 2016, bringing the team to claim their first All-Ireland in 22 years.

Meanwhile Donal O'Rourke has stepped down as Waterford senior camogle manager after two seasons, writes *Tomás McCarthy*. The Cappoquin man brought the Déise to back-toback All-Ireland quarter-finals.

Waterford led eventual O'Duffy Cup winners Galway by five points during this summer's quarter-final in Thurles before Galway reeled them in.

The former Waterford keeper will take up a coaching role with Erin's Own in Cork next season. "It's a club with massive plans over the next 12 months."

Local clubs help put Carbery camogie on the county map

BALLINASCARTHY Camogie Club was set up 50 years ago in 1969 and was known then as Castleview, wearing amber jerseys and maroon divided skirts at the time with minor and junior teams taking to the field.

After a decade of enjoyable and successful years, the club's main cohort of girls went further afield to either get married or for work, and camogic suffered as a result. However, the club was revived in the mid-1980s to become know as Ballinascarthy, sporting the current colours of red and black, but mainly concentrating on underage teams.

It was during the nineties that the adult teams were formed. Many players have had the honour of representing their county at various levels and indeed the Carbery division too, most recently Moira Barrett who captained the Cork minors to All-Ireland glory in 2018 and Claire Kingston who captained the Cork U16As to a Munster victory the same year. Caroline Sugrue, the club's highest scorer historically, won Cork intermediate league and championship medals in 2018 and Clara Crowley won an All-Ireland intermediate medal with the University of Limerick in 2019.

Today, Ballinascarthy Camogie Club is more vibrant than ever with the adult team playing junior A, having conquered the junior C county title in 2011 and the junior B county title in 2018, adding the West Cork junior A cup in a double in 2018.

A lot of Bal's girls play camogie with Sacred Heart Secondary School in Clonakilty and have enjoyed major success over the years. In 2015 they went to an All-Ireland senior final with Michelle Dullea, Clara Crowley, Megan Ryan and Ciara Barrett on the team. In 2019 they won the junior All-Ireland final with Bal players Annie Condon, Anna Flynn, Kate Ryan, Sinéad McCarthy, Maeve Kingston, Millie Condon and Siofra Pattwell on board.

Bandon Camogie Club was newly reformed in April 2017 to cater for girls in the area who played on the boys' GAA teams up to U12 but had no club in the town after that. The driving force behind the new club were former camogie players who had daughters in this age

The 'Hurl with Me' programme was

Mairéad Crowley is the only Kilbree player on the Carbery senior camogie panel. introduced in Bandon to kick-start the club. This was for six weeks where parents learned basic skills alongside their daughters and culminated in a blitz in the National Games Development Centre in Dublin where parents played the first half and the girls played the second half of three matches. This helped foster a club atmosphere with a sense of ownership and belonging from very early on.

This resulted in parents getting involved and staying involved in the club. There were 72 girls registered in 2017 and just two years later, almost 100 girls have registered with teams from U8 up to U14. Three of Bandon's girls are participating in the Carbery U13 development training.

One of the highlights for the club this year was the John West Féile na nGael weekend when two teams were entered in this U14 competition. Camogie teams from Kildare and Louth were hosted in Bandon, Last year Bandon's U10s were runners up in the prestigious Declan Crowley Memorial Blitz and the U14s won the West Cork C final. Also, last year's U12 players participated in the Camán to Croker initiative where they joined over 1,000 other girls in Croke Park on Easter Monday 2019 for minigames and a tour of the museum. At present, the club doesn't have an adult team but some previous players have expressed an interest in dusting off their skorts so watch this space!

Enniskeane Camogie Club was formed in 1995 by Angela Corcoran, Tony Goughlan, Catherine Barron, Joan O'Sullivan and Finbarr Lynch, amongst others. It will be proudly celebrating its 25th anniversary next June with an abundance of achievements accomplished to date.

Enniskeane-camogie have a range of players from bordering clubs, including St Mary's, Diarmúid Ó Mathúnas, Dohenys and Randal Óg. The majority of the players would have played with these clubs up to the age of 12. This year Enniskeane has 192 registered players

92 registered players and 33 registered mentors/committee members with teams from U8 up to Intermediate grade.

Outstanding achievements for the club include the first-ever intermediate county league title in 2019, and Danielle Carroll and Siobhán O'Driscoll winning the Ashbourne league with

There are six Enniskane players on this year's Carbery senior panel – Orla Cronin, Danielle Carroll, Laura Mannix, Sinéad Hurley, Tara Sheehan and Dáire O'Brien.

Kilbrittain/Timoleague Camogie Club: There was a camogie club in Kilbrittain in the 1950s for a few years, and as well as home-based players, it included girls from

Clonakilty, Enniskeane and Riverstick.
Kilbrittain had a very successful
ladies' football team from the mid1970s to the mid-80s, but following
a fixtures dispute, the team was
withdrawn. In 1988, along with players
from Timoleague, a camogie club was
formed.

In the first seven years there were ten county finals contested, from U14, U16, U18, junior B, junior A and intermediate. Four teams were successful and brought home the silverware. Over the years since then, the club has played in all grades of camogie from U8 right up to senior A. Many county titles have been won at underage and a few at adult level. Numerous players have worn the Cork jersey at all levels and county teams have been captained by players from the club, some achieving All-Ireland success.

In 2000, Marian Murphy won the Cork Féile na nGael skills competition and was runner-up in the All-Ireland final. As well as providing many players to Carbery over the years, club players have made a big contribution to college teams like Sacred Heart in Clonakilty and Colaiste na Toirbhirte, Bandon, and third level colleges like UCC, UL, CIT and Mary Immaculata.

Miriam Deasy was successful with Cork seniors and won All-Ireland medals in 1995, 1997 and 1998. In 2002 Eilish O'Sullivan was the recipient of an All-Ireland intermediate medal. Recently Kate Wall won an All-Ireland intermediate medal with Cork in 2018 and Hannah Sexton won an All-Ireland minor A with Cork in 2019.

On a club level Kilbrittain/

Timoleague won an U16A county in 2013, and U18C and U12B counties in 2018, as well as senior B in 2003 and senior A in 2004.

In Clonakilty, camogie was first played in the area in 1919 and evidence suggests that Clonakilty were the first West Cork champions that year. Camogie in the Carbery division has an on-off existence with Clonakilty appearing only now and again.

A fairly active team existed in the 1960s but facilities were scarce and the lack of a permanent base was a major problem. The players back then would meet in the old Town Hall and play their games in the Showgrounds, which had been vacated by the GAA club in the late 1950s. However, when camogic clubs like Kilbrittain, Newcestown and Barryroe began to emerge strongly in the 1980s there was no sign of Clonakilty Camogie Club.

The present club began on a very small scale in the mid-1990s, with concentration on the underage teams. Success was again limited because of the lack of facilities and a permanent base, but with a dedicated group of mentors putting in a big effort,

performances improved. The club is now based in Ahamilla, where it rents playing facilities from Clonakilty GAA Club, which gives the club a permanent base to train and play.

Success began to arrive with the U16C in 2003 and U16B the following year. The junior B team finally made the breakthrough in 2006 by winning both championship and league to secure promotion from the junior B grade which had eluded them for years previously.

Players like Hazel O'Regan, Sharon Whelton, Aoife Deasy and Juanita Brennan had spent seasons in the red jersey and the club was seeing the benefit of the example these girls, and more, were setting. Minor county and adult titles were secured in 2007 as the club continued to grow stronger. 2009 was an exceptional year as Clon won the intermediate county title and were runners up in Munster, a first for the club. A senior B and county league in 2016 was the last county achievement in adult grade.

While underage success has eluded Clon in the intervening years, they have had some encouraging results in the last few years. So far, 2019 has been a fantastic year with players representing Clon in Cork U14, U15 and U16 teams. The U14 girls entered two teams in the All-Ireland Féile competition with the first team winning Division 2, a first camogie All-Ireland title for the club.

St Colum's Camogie Club in Kealkil was formed in 2009 and field teams in U12, U14, U16, minor and junior C. Their biggest achievement to date was winning the junior C 13 a-side competition league and championship in 2018 which meant they could compete in the junior C 15 a-side competition this year. This was the club's first year entering in an adult junior competition. The minors also reached the U18D county final last year. This club is very proud of Libby Coppinger's outstanding achievements with Cork seniors. winning two All-Ireland medals. Maggie Coppinger also plays for the Cork junior team and Seadna O'Sullivan lines out for the Carbery team along with Libby and Maggie.

Barryroe Camogie Club draws its players from the villages of Courtmacsherry, Butlerstown, Lislevane and surrounding areas,

and fields teams from U6s through to junior A, competing in the Carbery division and also in county league and championship.

While the history of camogie in Barryroe goes back to the 1930s, the game ceased to exist in the parish for close on five decades until the early 1980s when there was an upsurge of interest with clubs springing up throughout rural areas. Fr Pat McCarthy CC, Paddy Murphy and Mai Whelton helped set up the club with the first meeting on April 2nd, 1985. At that meeting the colours of Sky Blue were proposed and adopted.

Officers were Mai Whelton, Josie Whelton, Eily Wycherley with trainers Fr Pat McCarthy, Mairead Keohane, Margaret Deasy, Mary Whelton and Lola Keohane. Having played in schools and underage competitions, Cora Keohane, Mairéad Sexton, Jacinta Barry and Olive Sexton were selected to compete in the mini-skills during the All-Ireland hurling semifinals and final in Croke Park in 1988.

In 1993 Barryroe defeated Courcey Rovers in the county junior B final and two years later defeated Brian Dillons in the junior A final. In 1996 Barryroe were victorious over Castlemagner in the intermediate final and in 1998

were winners against St Finbarr's in the county senior B final.

In 1999 the Clonakilty's Sacred Heart Secondary School won All-Ireland honours with ten Barryroe girls on the team, captained by Geraldine Collins. In 2007 the club beat St Finbarr's in the county senior A league final. Also, 2012 was a special year winning both league against Glen Rovers and championship against Clonakilty in senior B county camogie. The club's most recent success came in 2017 when Barryroe won the U16C title against Youghal.

Barryroe has supplied numerous players for the Carbery divisional team over the years. Currently, Eimear White (captain), Meadhbh Sexton, Elaine Ryan and Rachel Sheehy are playing on the Carbery senior A team in 2019.

The most decorated player from Barryroe is Jennifer O'Leary, winner of eight All-Star awards and four All-Ireland medals with Cork senior camogie, along with five national league medals and three Ashbourne Cup titles in a row when she played with the University of Limerick.

Other players who won All-Ireland senior medals with Cork are Cora Keohane, Rosarie Holland, Eimear White and Sile Burns. Senior B All-Ireland medals went to Ann Marie Fleming, Geraldine Collins and Eimear White. From the current generation Jessica McCarthy (U16) and Tara Fleming (U14) are part of the Cork underage development squads.

Kilbree Camogie Club was formed in 2005, in its current form. A club connected with Macra existed in the 1960s. The current club initially had teams from U8 up to U14. An U16 team was entered in all competitions two years ago. The club fielded a minor team for the first time in 2019 and it has been a most successful year winning the county league title.

A junior team was formed in 2018. The team qualified for the county league final, losing out to Rockbán earlier this year. There were great scenes of delight on Saturday, August, 31st last when the junior team defeated Rockbán to win the junior county championship in Castle Road.

The club has strong numbers from U6 up to adult level. The underage camogie club has been most successful in recent years, winning county titles at U12 and U14 level as well as many Carbery divisional titles. The club has players on Carbery and Cork teams, currently at U14, U15 and U17.

In its current form Newcestown Camogie Club was established on October 14th, 1983, fielding U14 and junior B in 1984. The club won its first county title at junior B level in 1989, thus moving up to junior A. Newcestown subsequently reached the junior A county final three years in a row, but it was to be the third year, 1993, that proved successful for this young club.

Having reached the intermediate county finals

in 1994 and 1995, winning the latter, for the first time in the club's short history the adult team joined the big guns at senior level in 1996. During this 13-year period, the underage set-up was gathering momentum, expanding to participate at all levels of underage, and in 1999 Newcestown secured the club's first underage camogie title in the U16B county final.

The success at both underage and adult level was self evident in the number of players participating at both club and county. Most notably Hilda Kenneally, who is current chairperson and intermediate player, and Antoinette O'Connell, both of whom played at Cork junior and senior level in the 1990s. Hilda had the honour of captaining Cork to an intermediate All-Ireland title in 2002. Yvonne O'Callaghan, Colette Desmond, Suzanne Deasy and Sinéad O'Donovan all played for Cork and All-Ireland winning teams with Colette receiving All-Star recognition in 2006 with UCC's Ashbourne Cup team.

Whilst success continued for players at inter-county level during this time, Newcestown, as a club, struggled to perform successfully at senior level so opted to re-grade down to junior A and minor D, to allow the club to rebuild. This proved to be a good move as in 2015 they won the junior A county and two years later the intermediate. They would then have progressed to senior B but a new system came in to play in Cork clubs in 2018, removing the senior B competition so they stay and play at a more competitive intermediate level now.

Just like earlier years, a number of Newcestown players' success at club level paved the way to play for their county too, emulating the success of the older club members in times gone by, such as Therese McCarthy, Suzanne Deasy and Aisling O'Donovan. Newcestown currently has four players participating on Cork teams in 2019, Maeve Lynch with the intermediates, Ciara O'Sullivan starred for the minor A team and juniors, Emma Tarrant for the U17s and Grace Ryan with the Cork U16As, all these girls having won Munster and All-Ireland titles with Cork.


I think she had to go on the attack this year, but maybe keeping Ann Dalton at centre-back might have helped that defensive problem.

Wonderful Westmeath make history as vital goal turns tide

Courageous comeback secures All-Ireland camogie crown

THE rise and rise of Westmeath camogie continues apace! Seldom have success-starved Westmeath GAA fans in any code experienced such a roller-coaster of emotions as the large contingent did in pleasant autumnal conditions at Croke Park last Sunday afternoon when the Lake County ladies produced a stunning second-half display to edge out Galway, thereby claiming a first-ever All-Ireland intermediate title in front of close on 25,000 spectators.

When one considers that a first junior title was won just two short years ago - and with many of the same players involved - the enormity of the achievement of Johnny Greville's superbly-managed and coached side can be put into perspective.

Looking dead and buried at half-time when trailing by seven points - and having saved a penalty to boot - the girls in a changed blue and maroon strip hurled with consummate skill and admirable passion in a never-to-be-forgotten second half to deservedly claim the Jack McGrath Cup.

The Galway girls, wearing white and maroon colours, showed their intent with a first-minute attack which yielded a penalty when Mairéad Dillon was fouled. However, Meadbh Scally saved Rachel Monaghan's ensuing puck from the spot.

Westmeath nudged ahead when Niamh Horan pointed neatly in the third minute and they doubled

Westmeath's Megan Dowdall on the attack as Galway's Laura Ward tries to stop her. their lead courtesy of 'Hawkeye' after Pamela Greville's shot initially appeared to have been prevented from going over the crossbar by Galway goalkeeper Laura Glynn.

Galway regained the initiative and were full value for their 0-4 to 0-2 lead at the end of the third quarter, their four points coming from the sticks of Tara Rutledge (from a tight angle), Monaghan (a brace of frees, both from around the 50-metre mark), and Karen Kennedy (a fine solo score).

Conversely, their opponents were displaying signs of big match nerves throughout the pitch. One such unforced error by Scally allowed Dillon to tee up Ava Lynskey for a clinically-taken goal in the 20th minute. When Monaghan added two fine points from play (the first also something of a gift), the champions-elect looked in deep trouble.

An inspirational point from Pamela Greville and a converted free by the same lady reduced the deficit, but the Tribeswomen cancelled these out by half-time with a point under pressure from Rutledge and another from Lynskey, the centre half-forward having done well to cut in goalward. Ecstatic scenes followed the final whistle moments later. As Mairéad McCormack and Megan Dowdall climbed the famous Hogan Stand steps to receive the Jack McGrath Cup and official player of the match statuette respectively, scorerin-chief Pamela Greville and her bainisteoir brother Johnny were being interviewed by RTÉ.

The latter joyously stuck to his promise that he would "not do a Jim Gavin" (well known for avoiding any displays of post-match emotion). Indeed, the Deelsider's passionate contribution went viral as the afternoon progressed. However, Messrs Gavin and Greville undoubtedly share one common trait - they are both superb managers of superb teams.

We're a family as a whole. That showed through. We win together and we lose together.

"The journey we had to get here today was phenomenal, but to come

I have to hand it to Cathal (Murray) - he did two (managerial) jobs at the one time and had to juggle them all on All-Ireland final day. ALL-IRELAND SENIOR CAMOGIE FINAL

It's more Croker heartache for the gifted ladies

Not since the eighties has a county lost three All-Ireland senior finals in-a-row. Kilkenny battled and battled, but it wasn't to be, writes John Knox



GALWAY KILKENNY 3-14 0-17

On the day when a stunning victory in a magnificent contest saw Galway reach the Promised Land in camogie, hard chasing Kilkenny had their hopes and dreams buried again.

All-Ireland final day never looked as dark for Kilkenny as it did at around 5.30pm on Sunday after the Cats slumped to their third consecutive defeat in the Liberty Insurance All-Ireland senior camogie final.

This was a first time experience for the county; heart breaking stuff. Not since the Noresiders were the dominant force in the eighties has a county been beaten in three finals in-a-row. However, the fate has befallen Cork on no less than three occasions.

The last time was against Kilkenny in 1987, 1988 and 1989 when the Cats were on a glory run that saw them own the O'Duffy Cup for seven straight years between 1985 and 1991.

In simple terms, all action

Galway claimed their third O'Duffy Cup win because they scored three goals during the first half. Indeed, it might have been four or five as their opponents solid game up to that staggered for a while following the concession of two goals in as many minutes nearing the end of the half.

Kilkenny put in a battling, well structured effort afterwards and the second half exchanges were even at 0-7 each. However, the day belonged to Galway's gifted class of 2019 with the likes of Niamh Kilkenny, Sarah Spellman, Allish O'Reilly and company never looking like surrendering following that volley of goals.

However, in the final straight Galway produced a sprint finish. Unanswered scores came from free taker, Carrie Dolan, the magnificent Niamh Kilkenny, goalie Sarah Healy from a free beyond midfield and Niamh Kilkenny again as they signed off with a devastating flourish.

Croke Park can be a theatre of dreams on days such as Galway enjoyed as they captured their first title since 2013, but for beaten Kilkenny is must now seem like a cursed place.

Kilkenny nabbed the opening score from a free by the sure firing Michelle Quilty following a foul on Anne Dalton. With barely 90 seconds showing on the clock Galway struck for a goal.

Niamh Kilkenny, who appeared to be everywhere in the early stages, made a lightening break from the '30' at the Hill 16 end and off-loaded the ball to Allish O'Reilly on her right. From no more than eight metres the latter rifled a bullet into the net.

With the addition of a quick point from Kilkenny (Niamh) that was worked by driving centre-back, Emma Helebert, the winners enjoyed a perfect spell that helped them settle.

Kilkenny gave chase. With the addition of a great point off the left from Denise Gaule and another at the end of a storming run by Davina Tobin, plus a couple of frees from Michelle Quilty, they caught up at 0-6 to 1-3 after 11 minutes.

An exchange of points followed before Kilkenny hit the front for the second time in the 16th minute when Gaule pointed. Quilty doubled the lead from a free after Miriam Walsh had been fouled (0-9 to 1-4).

The exchanges were magnificent; touch and vision class, and all at a deadly pace

During the following five minutes Galway cut the gap to the minimum before the second goal arrived. Full-forward Niamh Hanniffy put her name on the score after Sarah Spellman broke a fast delivery from defence.

That was the 25th minute. In the 27th the green was flying again, this time after Ailish O'Reilly got a long run at goal before finishing after a delivery from wing-back, Lorraine Ryan, got through to her.

Without having suffered a mauling in the open exchanges, and without having played to a level expected, Kilkenny reached half-time a hefty 0-10 to 3-7 behind.

That would have been worse but for the fact goalie Emma Kavanagh brought off a smashing late save from O'Reilly before a sizzling second drive by Spellman was deflected out for a 45, which Carrie Dolan pointed.

For the new half the losers had that usual bundle of energy Anne Dalton in midfield, but things didn't improve in the short term. They got worse when Dolan extended the Galway lead when converting a point.

Credit to Kilkenny, they dragged their game back

together. The chase was always tough, however. The gains were painstaking slow against opposition with a tremendous work ethic.

Galway broke up the field when goalie Sarah Healy drove a ball to Niamh Kilkenny, who landed a magnificent pressure relieving point from 60 metres (3-9 to 0-14). A like score from a 45 by Carrie Dolan knocked the Cats back again, but they doggedly lifted their challenge again.

DETERMINED

Anne Dalton made a determined break and nabbed a point. Then she landed a second from a free on midfield, and with a third from Denise Gaule in the 50th minute the losers were right back in it (3-10 to 0-17).

Galway looked a bit unsteady for a moment when Dolan missed a handy enough free, which was only their third wide of the match, and this was the 51st minute.

Not long afterwards Galway took off on their devastating spring finish. It was magnificent stuff.



Fantastic final victory for Murray's squad over luckless Cats

GALWAY 3-14 KILKENNY 0-17

ANY lingering doubts about the Galway camogie team's bottle and fortitude in the white heat of battle were gloriously swept aside on the back of a magnificent performance at Croke Park on Sunday.

Since Galway's previous All-Ireland triumph in 2013 - only the county's second ever - the theory that they didn't like too much hardship had gained some traction, but that shadow no longer stalks Sarah Dervan and her colleagues.

This was the day Galway answered every call. They went after the strong pre-match favourites from the off, built up a significant lead, and still had the resolution to push on again when Kilkenny threatened a successful second-half revival.

After edging out champions Cork in a titanic semi-final, Gal-way were every bit as relentless in terms of their work ethic and commitment on the sport's biggest occasion. Cathal Murray's wonderfully prepared charges were in no mood for compromise having seen what had worked so well against the Rebels. They brought the same levels of verve and energy into Sunday's memorable decider.

In front of a record-breaking attendance of almost 25,000, Galway continued their transformation of the past few months. Having already claimed the league title against the same opposition earlier in the year, the Tribeswomen are now the standard bearers in camogle and may take some shifting from their pedestal in the seasons ahead.

Though Galway produced almost the perfect team display, highlighted by their defensive match-ups proving so effective - Denise Gaule was the only Kilkenny forward to score more than once from play - the heroic exploits of several individuals was critical to the O'Duffy Cup returning west.

Topping the bill was the longserving Niamh Kilkenny who produced an astonishing performance of the highest quality which helped to break the opposition's hearts. The Galway midfielder, who covered acres of ground, set the tone from the start and her haul of four points from play ensured that there was no deliberation when it came to the Player of the Match award.



But Kilkenny got sterling support all over the field. Goalkeeper Sarah Healy was faultless and her second-half point from a long-range free was the crowning glory. Her defensive back-up was magnificent, none less so than Catriona Cormican, who was successfully redeployed to centre-back after a knee injury ruled out Tara Kenny.


With Heather Cooney, Dervan, Shauna Healy, 2013 captain Lorraine Ryan and Emma Helebert also in the zone, Kilkenny's famed attack, which didn't create a goal chance of note, was held well in check on a day the Noresiders' poor finals record - they have now lost nine of their last 10 appearances - took another turn for the worst.

Aoife Donohue helped considerably to establish Galway's midfield dominance, while two-goal hero Ailish O'Reilly really tormented the Cats in the opening-half. In that forward division, Sarah Spellman, Niamh Hanniffy, whose early surges rattled Kilkenny, Noreen Coen and Catherine Finnerty all tellingly featured on the scoreboard while the free-taking of young Carrie Dolan stood up to the pressure.

In essence, Galway didn't have a weak link and the belief the players carried into their final on the back of their unexpected victory over Cork was plain to see. The conviction in their overall play typified a team on good terms with itself mentally.

'Our approach all year was to try and get the ball as fast as possible into our full forward line, the girls inside have proven all year that they can score goals if they're given the right amount of ball. It was always in our heads to try to get good ball into Ailish (O'Reilly), Noreen (Coen) and Niamh Hanniffy and they showed today the damage they can do inside. The three goals gave us a great boost and we had a good lead at half time.

"We knew then that we couldn't be complacent, Kilkenny were always going to come back and have a purple patch. We just focused on keeping the scoreboard ticking over and working hard and, thankfully, we came out on top."

Having been part of the Galway panel since 2008 and going through many highs and lows, the Galway midfielder was clearly savouring the feeling of victory. "I've had some really tough days here, losing three All-Ireland Finals and the hurt that goes with that. It's a really special feeling today.

We learned a huge amount from that game, and we took the momentum into the Cork game after that. The test we got against Waterford really stood to us. Beating Cork then was a huge confidence boost and we knuckled down then for three weeks and, thankfully, it all worked out for us today."

She also paid tribute to her injured teammate Tara Kenny, who was desperately unfortunate to tear her cruciate ligament in training the week before the All-Ireland final. "For any sports person to tear their cruciate is a really difficult experience. But all credit to Tara, she put her own misfortune aside and really drove on the team. The fear of losing may have been factor in Cats latest All-Ireland loss

The mental baggage of Kilkenny losing consecutive All-Ireland finals and five in the previous 10 seasons could have inhibited the Cats in their bid for senior camogie glory in Croker

The Noresiders became the first county in 30 years to lose three deciders in-a-row when falling to Galway in Croke Park on Sunday, and there were suggestions that the fear of losing might have got to them.

Former great and team manager, Ann Downey, was at a loss to explain Sunday's below par showing that followed previous losses to Cork in the last two seasons.

"Maybe our players were so afraid of losing they weren't able to express themselves," the 12 times former All-Ireland medal winner suggested. "I know some of them will be disappointed with their performances.

When you get to an All-Ireland final and you are

playing in Croke Park the whole thing can take on a life of its own. You have to be able to shut everything out and just try and perform.

"I have never asked the girls to go out and win a match. I have always asked them to perform, perform, perform. Unfortunately for some of them it did not happen today.

"When you get to an All-Ireland final you need the XV and subs to do that."

STANDING DOWN

The former St Paul's and Lisdowney star told the players in the dressing-room after the game that she was standing down from the position she has held for the last four years.

During that time the county won the O'Duffy Cup once, plus three National League titles.

This was Ann's second stint as manager, and the fact the county contested seven national finals in that time would suggest she and the selectors got a lot out of the

"The three goals conceded in the first half killed us to be

stage," she replied. "Maybe it was that they haven't been here for so long, and Kilkenny have been here for the last few years.

"There was too much space. There was an ocean of space when they scored the goals and we never created that kind of space. They had no fear. We have lost so many All-Irelands here, maybe that fear was holding the girls back.

They came up with great hope. They knew they would have to battle hard to beat Galway. If we wanted to have a

chance, we had to go toe-to-toe with them and we were not able to do that

When asked how in the lead up to the final Kilkenny had handled the losing finals issue, Ann said the situation was addressed but there was only so much looking back that could be done.

"You must always look ahead," she insisted. "While we did look at the last two All-Ireland finals, they weren't our focus point to be honest. You can only look back and learn.

BIG STAGE

"With new opposition and a new challenge, we were hoping things would go better for us. They All-Ireland day is a big stage. Some of the young girls played with freedom.

"Our older players are nearer the finishing line than they were last year, so maybe that was holding them back.

"I couldn't ask any more of the girls. They have trained so hard and put in so many hours. They have been watching their diet and they have been fully committed.

"You couldn't fault them. It is all about the day, and it didn't happen for us today."

She felt Galway defended very well and they hunted in packs, thereby limiting space in front of goal to the opposition.

"I think we got only one run at goal, and that was early on. All year that was that was something happening for us," she pointed out.

"Obviously Galway had their work done on us, and they stopped that overlap. It all comes down to the will to win. Galway had it in spades."

Rising the girls now would be difficult, but the manager said getting back playing with their clubs would be the first step on the road to lifting the gloom.

"It is very hard," she assured. "They have been here so many times and they have come back and come back. It is going to be a long winter for them.

They will go back to their clubs, and everyone will be there to help and support them to try and get over this bitter disappointment."

Gifted players must continue to believe - Dowling

Kilkenny's constant involvement at the highest level of camogie over the past five years or so suggests there is something big there, so the quest for All-Ireland glory has to go on.

These are no ordinary players," insisted new coach, Brian Dowling, in the aftermath of Sunday's hugely disappointing All-Ireland final defeat against Galway.

"When we got back close to Galway they kept tacking on the points. They fully deserved their win and we congratulate them."

"In sport you don't get what you deserve, you have to go out and earn it.

"The girls can be proud of themselves. The effort they put into preparing for this final was second to none. I wish I had the answers to what went wrong, but 1 don't."

Galway the best team in the land after fronting up in terrific decider

HE best All-Ireland camogic final in years at Croke Park on Sunday saw Galway shed their reputation as something of a flaky team when the pressure came on. They never blinked in an absorbing battle for supremacy and are worthy new champions.

In the process, the Tribeswomen also improved slightly the county's terrible record in All-Ireland finals, having only won two of their previous 17 championship deciders stretching back to 1932. We daren't have mentioned that terrible statistic in the build up to Sunday's showdown, but it's doubtful if it would have fazed Galway in any event.

This was a team with a different and more positive mentality. It didn't matter to them that they were the 7/4 outsiders against Kilkenny. After all, they had taken out title holders Cork in a high-wire semi-final and if Galway hadn't buckled in that challenging environment, why would they do so against a Kilkenny outfit which also had their own All-Ireland final demons?

Sarah Dervan and company would have gained huge belief and confidence from coming out on top after going toe to toe with Cork. It showed on Sunday. The old frailties were gone; replaced by a new sense of self-assurance. They carried the day by six points and were in no way flattered by the margin.

Under the progressive management of Cathal Murray and a committed backroom staff of Orla Kilkenny, Conor Dolan, John Connor and Robbie Lane, together with the associated medical and logistics support, Galway were women on a mission in 2019. Having already overcome the Cats in the league final, they were not intimidated by what lay ahead of them at GAA headquarters.

Camogie deservedly got a bad rap after the previous two All-Ireland finals which allowed for minimal physical contact. With players countrywide demanding scope for matches to be less rigorously officiated, the sport has enjoyed a renaissance this summer which has led to a sharp increase in affection from the terraces.

The crowd of nearly 25,000 was a ringing endorsement of camogie players being allowed to give and take hard hits. Galway still got five yellow cards and for a horrible moment in the first-half we thought Dervan was heading for an early shower after what was just a tangle of legs. Thankfully, common sense prevailed and the popular Mullagh clubwoman was able to lift the O'Duffy Cup on the Hogan Stand afterwards.

There was big Galway support at Croke Park and why should it be any different. This group of players were utterly professional in their preparations, have made the same sacrifices as their male counterparts and are playing the game to an admirably high standard. They were magnificent ambassadors for the county and deserve all the acclaim coming their

Coming out on top by a decisive six-point margin, Galway rarely allowed the dangerous Kilkenny forward division the time or space to exert to its expected influence. All of the winners' backline were alert and aware of the task in hand, while their exceptional goalkeeper, Sarah Healy, again

During the league Tipperary won one game from four. They lost to Wex-ford, Galway and Cork. They scored 3-51 and conceded 8-46. Cork were in the same group. They won four games from four and advanced to the semifinal with 5-54 scored and 4-35 against.

To be fair, Tipperary regrouped and had a much better championship

O'Connor upset over All-Stars

SINCE its inauguration in 2004, Gemma O'Connor has been nominated 14 times for an All-Star, winning 11 statues, even though she missed one season while overseas with the Irish

The nominations speak for themselves, the awards even further, of the consistency of one of camogle's greatest players. Gemma sets high standards and I know that she would take pleasure in those nominations and awards, not because of the personal accolade but because they gave confirmation that she had done her best on the field for her teammates and county.

She's extremely disappointed and upset that Cork were left so short on the nomination front this year, not because she wasn't nominated, but because some of her teammates weren't when they clearly deserved to be.

cause some of her teammates weren't when they clearly deserved to be.

"I want to make this clear; I'm not whingeing or being unsporting because I didn't get one. And I didn't expect me or Cork to get six or seven All-Stars because of how the championship finished for us but I just think that from the nominations point of view to only get four from 45?

"If you look back over the years at

only get four from 45?

"If you look back over the years at the semi-finalists, it's a long time if ever that they only picked four from those counties. I can't get over it. It's almost as if we're punished in a way for the group we were in, in that, because we were beating teams comfortably, we weren't being challenged, when really, it's because of how well we were performing is why we won those the way we did.

"None of our group games as All-Ireland champions for two years in a row were televised/streamed either. The publicity nationally around our games wasn't as high as for others.

"The nominations for the 'Player of the Week' – I recall our game against Meath, they may not be as strong as other teams, but Cliona Healy played up front for us and scored five points from play. If that was any other team, she would have been nominated for Player of the Week.

"We were winning our games well and there were weeks when no Cork player was nominated. I don't want to go down the line of thinking there's this thing against Cork, but little things have happened over the past couple of years that has me leaning towards that way of thinking. "I know the Association might want

"I know the Association might want a change. It's like they don't want us to reach an All-Ireland final. As captain and having watched the players train and play all year and watch how some of them performed I feel I have to say it, speak on behalf of the Cork team, when I say that giving four nominations is completely disrespectful to us as a group of players." Gemma feels a number of her team-mates did more than enough to be recognised.

"Orla Cotter, do they mean to tell me that she didn't deserve a nomination? Same as Orla Cronin. Chloe Sigerson scored points from play and frees that you wouldn't see in a senior hurling

game. I just feel that as captain I need to represent the players and say we were wronged.

"It's nothing against Tipperary, I'm not trying to steal other team's or players' thunder, but we played them three times this year, the facts are there. Comparing our players and their players on a semi-final stage and what we scored and conceded during the championship versus what they did, it just doesn't make sense.

"Their players did not perform better than our players and they've nine nominations." The St Finbarr's club stalwart, who faces Sars in a county semi-final tomorrow, has never been slow to speak her mind

never been slow to speak her mind.
"I find the association at times so frustrating. They can be unreasonable and unaccommodating. I've played the game all my life.

"I hate when it gets negative publicity but for example, a few players from a number of counties went and met them this year about the rule changes. Here we are, players from different counties with the same view. "But all we were told was players

"But all we were told was players shouldn't be giving negative opinions, that we need to say the right thing to the press when interviewed. Players have a right to express their views."

I find that bizarre when anyone who watched the 2017 and 2018 finals could see for themselves how the game wasn't flowing. For players like Gemma to deny or defend that would make them look ridiculous.

Reflecting on Cork's season it's difficult to pinpoint what went wrong in their bid for three in a row.

"I think people tried to do the right thing this year but maybe without realising it some weren't as focused as they should be. Our stats showed that we were off the pace. What's particularly disappointing is that we wanted

to reach another level. I thought we were mentally tougher than what we were in the semi-final, but that bite and hunger wasn't there. I thought it was.

"And look you'll always have two or three players that might not play their best in any game but when you've six or seven and only losing by a point to the All-Ireland champions, I think that's the hardest thing to take."

It's a big weekend for the Barrs and her club's progression has made up somewhat for Cork's loss.

"It's great, it's exciting. There's a great buzz in the club. A mixture of the huge underage work and Brian O'Sullivan over the past couple of years is why we're here.

"We've a young team overall. We're balanced which is what we lacked for a number of years. Sarsfields are also young and they're well balanced. I think we've a good chance."

Nana inspired my book for kids

HE bracelet an All-Ireland winning Cork camogie player had made from her medals was the inspiration behind her granddaughter's first book, which she hopes will en-courage more girls to play sport.

Emma Larkin's granny was the legendary Maureen Hennebry (nee Cashman), of Blackrock, who won three in a row All-Ireland titles from 1939 to 1941.

One of her brothers was Mick shman, who played for Blackrock and was goalie on the Cork senior hurling team.

Chrissie Ahern, former Lord Mayor of Cork, was one of her sisters. Tom and Jim Cashman, who also played hurling for Cork, were her nephews

Emma, an accountant who grew up in Boycestown (halfway between Carrigaline and Crosshaven), explains how the book came about: "I wanted to write something about my grandmother. She came from a family rich in GAA history, the Cash-mans of Blackrock in Cork, and is even mentioned in a poem by the famous Irish poet, Patrick Kavanagh, entitled Camogie Match.

While thinking of writing about Nana, I was also looking for books to buy for my daughter Isabelle, who was seven at the time. In my search, I noticed there were very few books about young girls playing sport. Isabelle loves so many sports, including football, soccer and athletics. There were plenty with boys as the main character, but not many for girls, and certainly none that I could see about a girl playing Gaelic Foot-ball. One day, I was thinking about

the bracelet that my grandmother had had made from her All-Ireland camogie medals, and inspiration struck! I decided then that I would write my own book about a girl playing football, and the bracelet would feature, to bring a fun and magical theme to the book, Izzy's Magical Football.

Emma is a mum of four children Damian, 19; Paddy, 10; Isabelle eight, and Robbie, five - and works as a financial controller of The Rose Hotel in Tralee, Married to Robbie, they live near Listowel where he's from.

She has been working on the book since last January and admits it was sometimes hard to find the time with work and family

"Sometimes I feel like I'm going to drop the ball somewhere! But I do enjoy both my jobs, and I also enjoy the writing process and all that goes with it, so it has been fun to do. I wrote the book quite quickly, once the idea came, the words started flowing! I actually self-published the book

"When I didn't hear back from any Irish publishers, I researched a lot about self-publishing and I joined ALLI, the alliance of independent authors.

"I also hired an illustrator, Paul Nugent, who was just fantastic

throughout the whole process. Before Emma embarked on the book, she flexed her writing muscle by penning pieces on both park runs and the Gaelic4Mothers & Others initiative.

In a blog post, she wrote: "I started playing Gaelic4Mothers and Others football with my local club in 2012. I had three of my four children in the four years between 2009 and 2013, and it's fair to say that getting time for fitness or anything at all really was a challenge in those years! When I look back, it does really seem like I was just muddling through and that old cliché, it is all a bit of a blur!

"I really do think, however, in hindsight, that the Gaelic4Mothers & Others initiative in our local club was my first step to rediscovering the great feeling that exercise brings, something that I had neglected in my twenties. In addition to getting me back exercising. it introduced me to an absolutely fantastic gang of women.

By getting involved in my club and playing football, I soon started running as well, as lots of the women in the club were running. This lad to me becoming very involved in our local parkrun, and now I love running and wouldn't feel right without getting a few runs in every week. It also meant, as my kids got older and started playing football themselves, that they got a great kick out of seeing me practising my skills in the back

This has all played a part in leading me to where I am now. writing and publishing a children's book about girls playing sport, with the hope that it will encourage girls both to read and play sport, and to keep playing sport.

As well as her Nana, Emma credits her mother as a big inspiration: "She always wanted myself and my sister to be independent women and to follow our own path

Already in the middle of her next book, which features Izzy playing camogie, she credits her husband with coming up with that plot idea and for also for being a fantastic support. In hindsight, Emma says she's in awe of the fact Maureen and her teammates played camogie at such a high level at a time, in Ireland, where a woman's role was predominantly to be a wife and homemaker.

"I wish I had asked her more about what it was like. We just took it as normal that Nana loved hurling and football -- I even remember her in her eighties, taking my son Damian, her great-grandson, out in the back garden with a hurley and a sliotar!

It is 30 years since Sarsfields claimed their one and only Cork senior camogie championship title.

Like most clubs, they have experienced peaks and troughs but now they are back in the big-time, and it is a dream come true for all

involved to be contesting tomorrow's final against four-in-a-row seeking Inniscarra at Castle Road,

Needless to say, there is an incredible buzz around Glanmire ahead of the showdown, and a huge crowd is expected at the Camogie Grounds.
"It is unbelievable," said

manager Emmet Fennell, a former Sarsfields hurler who is in his first year in charge.

Not one of these girls ever played in a senior county final. The last time Sars won was 1989 and it is bringing back fond memories of that occasion. But that is a long time ago. We are up senior four years, having won the senior B championship and the intermediate championships previous to that. The backbone of our team would come from those panels and we would have girls from the 2016 Féile team as well."

Underage success, undoubtedly, is providing the platform for their swift rise up the ranks. They secured suc-cessive All Ireland Féile na nGael triumphs between 2016 and 2018 and they reached this year's decider. They vied for honours in three consecutive Cork minor finals — winning in 2014 and 2016 which is praiseworthy especially in such a short space of time.

Fennell has an accomplished management team around him, while his wife Emer is well used to match-day nerves, the talented attacker who lined out her club with distinction.

The average age of our team is 23. We have a good balance throughout, and we have joint captains in Ellen Murphy and Lucy Allen and that has worked well. We would have leaders in different areas of the field.

They would include Katie Barry, Niamh O'Callaghan (Cork senior), Michelle Barry, Hollie Herlihy and Edel Lonergan.

"I took over from Tadhg Óg Lynch this year and I have Joe Barry, Brendan O'Callaghan, Jeff Leopold, Sinead O'Leary and Mossy O'Sullivan with me in management.

We were able to push on with the training. We had most of our squad available as we have just one member on the county senior team and that gave us great scope. We know Inniscarra have a wealth of experience. It is going to be a massive occasion

INNISCARRA mentor Joe McCarthy is no stranger to county finals having been in-volved in all the club's successes in recent years.

However he knows just how lucky his side are to be contesting Sunday's SE Systems Senior Camogie decider after having to battle with all their might to hold off the huge challenge of a strong Killeagh

"We are thrilled to have got over the line and to be honest we know how lucky we are, Killeagh could have forced extra time with the last puck of the game and I suppose really it was a hard way for them to lose.

"It took two games to separate us and again the replay was a superb game full of everything that is good about the game, great skill and a ter-

"We had to call on all our experience to make it to the final but now we have to put that behind us and concentrate on the job in hand."

"We have a nice blend of experience and a few younger players stepping up this year to the starting team so these games have all stood to them and we are looking forward now to the huge challenge Sarsfields will pose."

FORMED in 1969, Sarsfields Camogie Club is now one of the largest growing in

Winning the Junior A championship in 973, intermediate in 1979 and senior in 1989, there followed a baron period for the club to the point where a club meeting was held in the early noughties to consider dis-

But people like Eithne Allen and Maria Dinan just wouldn't let it happen.

Eithne went between the posts at junior level to fill in numbers. Star forward in the team that takes to the field on Sunday, Emer Fennell, was another who kept playing throughout those tough years and, slowly but surely, they turned the things around. Currently secretary of the club, it's for people like Eithne that you love to see clubs reaching the pinnacle.

All her life Eithne has been involved with Sars. She played senior back in the 80s, but the one year she decided to go to London for 12 months, 1989, was the year the club won their first and only senior

title. Eithne didn't mind.
"I genuinely didn't mind missing out. I was just thrilled for the girls and the club that we won it.

Eithne shies away from taking credit for the Trojan work she has done

Actually, Maria Dinan did far more than me, she was a constant during all the years, she kept it together."

Eithne, mother of current full-forward Lucy Allen, and Julie Allen, also on Sun-day's panel, and Maria began back in the day working with U6s, and U7s.

They went into the local schools and got numbers out. Eventually the tide turned.

"Every club goes through what we went through, those difficult years. We won the U16 D title in 2006 when Aine Barry was

"Then Glanmire got bigger, we went into the schools and I think a big turning point for us was when the club developed the all-weather pitch. We could train during the winter in pleasant conditions and that was key for us."

Moving on, it was 2008/2009 when Sars pushed up the ranks. They won the U14A title in 2011, managed by Bryan O'Leary, and that team makes up the majority of the squad taking to the Castle Road pitch on Sunday, players like Hollie Herlihy, Lucy Kelly, Chloe and Emma Casey, Katie Barry, and Maeve McCarthy.

That was a key moment for the club, and they've gone from strength to strength at underage. That U14 team contested three minor finals in a row from 2014-2016, winning two, O'Leary and Tadgh Og Lynch the coaches. The club also reached four All-Ireland Féile finals between 2016-2019, winning three in a row, losing the 2019 final.

The population explosion in Glanmire greatly enhanced numbers for the club but without their fantastic facilities and an excellent underage coaching structure, Sars would not be in the county final this

It's 30 years since they last danced on this stage. Many members of that 1989 team have daughters and nieces playing today. As well as the Allens, you have another famous Sars name in the Barrys. I spent a lot of time in the Barry household as a teenager where hurling and camogie was huge, Billy Barry coaching me at underage in Brian Dillon's

Katie Barry, Ruth McCarthy, and Mi-chelle Barry are all nieces of Geraldine Barry who postponed her honeymoon in 1969 to help her side to that senior title. Michelle is the daughter of Vincy Barry. coach of the 1989 side.

Often, we speak about the characters in Cork camogie. Marie Kearney, Munster camogie delegate to Ard Comhairle is one of those. Her love for Sarsfields alongside people like Lillian Zinkant, who starred in that 1989 win, are still involved in the game and for them Sunday is a huge occa-

It's the ethos of the club that we all love. People like Eithne and Maria are in every club around the country. Many give their lives to it and by doing so, enhance the lives of so many others. It's a big day on Sunday for Sarsfields. It didn't come easy. That shouldn't be forgotten.

At senior level this Sars team are relatively inexperienced, having made the step up in 2016. Four seasons later they are in a county final. Eithne acknowledges that they are up against it.

"Inniscarra are so experienced, they're great team. But we'll give it our best.

Regardless of the result it's a proud day for Glanmire.

IT'S hard to believe that Inniscarra captain Niamh Dilworth has been playing camogie for close on 24 years but when she explains that she was just four when she took the hurley in her hand it is then understandable.

"We used have great fun with our neighbours, the O'Callaghans, they had a huge garden and we made a pitch

"We had goal post and it was half the size of a real pitch and we played and played all day

The 'we' Niamh is referring to are her brother, John, and the six O'Callaghan neighbours, three boys and three

With two mixed teams of four they had their own mini

"We continued it up until we were around 14 and by then there were just three of us left the older ones had found better things to do by then.

"It was here we really learned the game and from there I began playing in Ber-rings NS and then joined Inniscarra.

Niamh won an U16 county championship and league with the club and speaks fondly about her mentors Terry McMahon, Rita Kavan-agh and Betty O'Mahony who guided the team all the way

Despite playing on Cork teams from U14 up to Senior B there was little success.

"We always lost! We lost two All-Ireland minor final in a row to Kilkenny but at least we got a Munster title out of it but I suppose it was disappointing on the inter-county stage alright.

Whilst she has not had much luck with Cork it has been a dream with her beloved

Inniscaria Now the holder of three senior county championship medals, she did miss out in 2016 when Inniscarra defeated

I was studying midwifery so I dropped out in 2015/2106 but sitting out in CIT that night watching the final as we defeated Milford in cracking game I knew I wanted to get

Back she came in 2017 as Inniscarra made it back to back titles defeating Glen Rovers in an exciting final and then CAMOGIE

again last year as they made it three in a row as they over-came the challenge of Courcey

This year has seen the champions taken to a replay by Killeagh before they edged it with a late point from a free converted by Niamh and she credits the many hours of work put in by trainer Kevin Murphy who was a former hurling goalkeeper with Inniscarra.

"Kevin is great and he is so good he will go to the field even if we are not training and put in hours of work with me doing free taking, he stays back after training or arrives before we start and again puts in the work and we are so lucky to have that commitment.

Speaking about the championship so far Niamh thinks the standard has been very high and that a lot of the clubs are very evenly matched.

"In all the game they have been very close and really in think all teams are evenly matched and any team could have won out on any given

"We were so lucky to get over Killeagh but it was good test of us and thankfully we stood up and were counted and just got over the line."

Looking ahead to Sunday's opponents Niamh has huge respect for a Sarsfields side contesting the final for the first time in over 30 years.

'Sarsfields are one of the coming teams they are young and very skilfully, we know what it is like to be playing in your first final and they will be hungry for success.

"They have got hard games hrough the campaign but they came out of them, they battled hard against Carbery and got back on level and then won it in extra time, same in the semi-final they came from behind to win.

"They are a side who have won things all the way up from underage and they know how to win so being in a final won't be new to them.

"We know they are a good side and it will take a huge effort from us to win but we are ready and looking forward to the challenge.

Bryan O'Leary and Tadgh Og Lynch are two of those. Tadgh stepped back this year and in January, Emmet Fennell took over as Sars senior manager.

He had high hopes for his team. When questioned if he envisaged Sars in this position, in their first senior county final in 30 years, he replied: "I did of course!"

"I suppose when you set up a management at the start you set out your plan, you have a vision, sometimes it doesn't always go to plan but the draw we had and the response we got from the girls, things lined up for us very well.

The management team consists of Joe Barry, Brendan O'Callaghan, Mossie O'Sullivan, Sinead O'Leary, Jeff Leopold and Donal Kenneally

Sars' win over Carbery in the quarter final was a real turning point in their sea-

"Yeah, we trained very hard for it. Car-bery are a fantastic team. I believe fourteen of their players played intercounty at some stage. People underestimated them and I'm glad we met then when we did, in the earlier stages. So, it was a turning point and it showed us that the girls can go all the way

"They didn't tire and won it in the last couple of minutes which is a great sign of a team. I thought we also did well against a good St. Finbarrs team in the semi-

Reflecting on the other semi-final which saw Inniscarra beat Killeagh by a point last Friday night in a replay, Emmet said that it's a good team that can pull out a win in the tightest of positions.

"Killeagh had their chances and Inniscarra looked on the rocks but they're a good team and they came back and won

senior county final was when he was manager of Imokilly in 2010 which the East Cork side subsequently lost to an injury time goal to Inniscarra in a replay. Leading by two points entering the fourth minute of injury time it looked as if Imokilly had done nough to win their first title in 34 years.

But Rena Buckley connected in a oalmouth scramble to send the ball to the net. Imokilly lost by one.

Emmett's hoping history won't repeat itself. He has the utmost of respect for In-

"They're on the road a long time. They know how to work the lines. They're very

confident in their ability. 'When they have a puck-out they'll run

at it. They're cute and you can't buy that. "But we've a good side. We've a panel of 28 and any one of those are capable of coming on and doing a job for us. Depending on the position that's needed, a different player could come on each time.

We're going to concentrate on ourselves. We believe in our own girls. We've trained very hard. We were always hoping that we'd be in a final. So, we've no ex-

"We've a full panel, injury free. I hope the occasion doesn't get to the girls. We're going to go out and enjoy it."

From a young age the majority of this senior team have been winning u14 and minor titles. Much of the team are in their early twenties now. But it is different winning at underage and senior, the step up is huge.

The hype is something that Sars will also have to be careful of. You'd expect that Sars will play Emer Fennell out in the corner to either keep her away from Rena Buckley or try and entice Rena out of the centre. I don't think she'll follow.

wonderfully but were pegged back and trailed by two points early in the second half.

This is a young team, but 38-year-old Fennell – wife of manager Emmet - has played camogie for almost three

"It has been a long road," she said. "But the girls are inspirational, they never give up. They have total faith in their ability. We had the belief and when you have that, you can do anything.

"What a year to win it, 30 years on. We knew we could do it, and we did it." Inniscar-

ra led 0-7 to 0-6 at the break, but it was Sarsfields who were quicker to start with five points without reply on the board in the first 10 minutes. They thundered into the action, Fennell, Olivia McAllen (2) and Hollie Herlihy (2) on

Niamh McCarthy got Inniscarra up and running in the 11th minute, and by the end of the half, the sides were tied 0-6 apiece after Aileen Sheehan replied to a Fennell

IT'S been a heady few months for Ireland's Fittest Family star Anna Geary. She got a new job - as a presenter on Today FM. which she will do in addition to her work as a coach for the new GAA season. 

'We didn't put our heads down after that, we came back into the game and every single one of our players gave it 110 per cent,' McSweeney said.

It took Newcestown two minutes to register their opening score and it came from player-of-the-match O'Sullivan when she fired over a 20-metre free. The influential O'Sullivan followed it up quickly after when she made a surging run at defence and finished with a handpass point to cut the Enniskeane lead to the slimmest.

Cronin put two between the sides on five when she pointed a close-range free, however Newcestown had the deficit back to one when O'Sullivan found Evelyn Crowley free on 30 metres and she split the posts with a fine effort in the eighth minute.

CORK senior camogie champions Sarsfields face Drom & Inch of Tipperary in the Munster senior championship semi-final this Sunday.

In an upset, Drom & Inch defeated eight in a row chasing Burgess-Duharra with a seven-point winning margin in the Tipperary county final last Sunday, 2-10 to 0-9. With Burgess containing a number of intercounty players, it was a huge win for the village.

Drom goalkeeper Caoimhe Bourke was a driving force from between the posts, wingback and captain Aoife McGrath was outstanding, earning the Player of the Match award, while Joanne Ryan, Eimear McGrath and excellent forwards Niamh Treacy and Miriam Campion also shone.

Parts of Drom & Inch's play was similar to that of Sars' two weeks ago against Inniscarra where work rate played a huge role in their first senior county title in 30 years.

Sars understandably had a tremendous week of celebrations and they've been fortunate in that they had this past week to come back down to earth a little and re-focus for Sunday's game. Drom & Inch are still on a high. That could work either way for them. They'll either carry that euphoria onto the pitch in Riverstown or their minds will be elsewhere on the day.

Fennell looks to add another chapter to Sars' fairytale

Age is but a number, says 38-year-old Sarsfields full-forward Emer Fennell as she bids to extend what has been a fairwisle season.

Tomorrow afternoon at Riverstown (1pm), Sarsfields entertain Tipperary champions Drom & Inch in the Munster senior camogie semifinal.

The Cork club secured their place in the provincial competition when ending a 30-year wait for county championship honours a fortnight ago. It was no surprise victory. Sars have been the coming force in Cork camogie for the past few years. They reached the last four All-Ireland U14 Feile finals, winning three, while three successive county minor finals were contested between 2014 and '16, two of which yielded silver-

Their current senior team,

as you'd expect with such relentless underage success, is flooded with players in their late teens and early to mid-twenties.

Then there is Emer Fennell, or Emer O'Farrell as she was known when pocketing backto-back All-Ireland medals with Cork in 2008 and '09.

Fennell raises the team's average age somewhat and as she herself remarks, she didn't grow up playing along-side these girls, she grew up playing alongside their mothers. But far from being carried by the team's younger members, she has been the one leading their charge.

It was her goal deep in the second half of extra-time which rescued Sars from the jaws of defeat on the afternoon of their county quarter-final win over Carbery. She finished that game with 2-12 to her name. She hit three points in the subsequent semi-final win over the Barr's, supplying

2-3 during the final triumph against Inniscarra.

"To win the county final was a fairytale," says Fennell, whose husband Emmet is Sars

"On a personal note, it was the icing on the cake. It is something I have always dreamt of doing with my club. Nothing can describe winning a senior county title with your club, with girls you've watched grow up, girls who you have trained underage, and, in a lot of cases, I played with their mothers. Without them and without their dedication, commitment, and enthusiasm, it wouldn't have happened.

"I know I am in my twilight years when it comes to playing. But, look, age is just a number. If you have the ability, the drive, and the love of the sport, age shouldn't hold anyone back."

The Account Manager and mother of two (Tom is nine,

Anna is seven) is keenly aware that her well-being is heavily linked to her decision to keep coming back year after year. She heaps praise on her husband and parents for their roles in making it possible to continue togging out.

"I'm in a great position in that they've all been so supportive of me in keeping going. My kids, too, love to see me out

playing. They are part of my drive and my inspiration.

"Sport and camogie has been my life. Getting out playing is good for mental health, good for physical health. It is great to have a good work-life balance. It's very important to have an outlet. Camogie has been my outlet for all these years. I am the person today because of camogie and because of Sars. It has given me and provided me with great life lessons and great friends.

"A lot of people I've spoken to have said to me, keep playing because once you stop, you'll never go back. It is so true. Keep driving on, keep playing. I'd so encourage that. If the body can do it, there is nothing impossible. To win two weeks ago was the pinnacle of my career."

The hope is that their Munster campaign will extend beyond tomorrow and so put paid to any talk of potential retirement.



Amy flies All Star flag for Rebels

CONGRATS to Amy O'Connor, Cork's sole All-Star for 2019.

It's an honour she richly deserved. So last Saturday night Galway received seven awards, Kilkenny four, Waterford two, Cork one and Limerick

Eleven positions filled from the finalists, one from the semi-finalists and three from the quarter finalists. Tip-perary received no awards after having nine nominations

I received a copy of the draft fixtures and changes for the 2020 camogie league and championship campaigns during the week.

A few of the rules and points to note I'll reference here. First up is the rule regards naming of panels.

Any county which has two teams in National League competition, they must provide a list of 23 players seven before their first fixture at either grade. These players and any other player who play at the higher grade will not subsequently be eligible to play on the lower-graded team.

These players listed must be named on the team sheet for all fixtures at the higher grade within the competition.

I can understand what the organisation are trying to achieve - to prevent strong senior panellists alternating freely between both divisions. But I feel this rule restricts development of tier two players.



Most counties will give their Division 2 players a trial run during the Division I league. If that is going to eliminate them completely from playing in their own grade and getting games week in and week out, players won't want to do it.

Based on this rule, players won't be freely introduced to the senior squads during the national league now.

What if the senior squad runs into a spate of injuries and calls on division two players to fill the gap for a particular game?

The players won't want to do it as they'll believe they'll be back on the bench the following week and be out for the remainder of their own cam-

Worth considering is that the ruling should be based on the previous year's championship in that if a player played senior championship in 2019 then they are ineligible to play Division 2 league in 2020.

That restriction should only be for one season and on a rolling basis.

Year in and year out I find it hard to

fathom why counties with two adult teams end up playing other two-team counties with one at home and one away at the same time.

On March 8, Cork seniors play Kilkenny at home, while our intermediates are away to Kilkenny on the same

Surely a double-header could be arranged for this?

And a home and away arrangement made between the counties every other year. If nothing else, it would save on costs.

In addition to that, the fixtures should also be made in a way where the division 1 and 2 sides don't always play the same weekend. It makes life very difficult for counties when one team is at one end of the country and

the other is fielding at the other end. There is a weekend for 'back matches', ie games that have been postponed during the campaign yet that weekend clashes with the third level Ashbourne and Purcell Cup semi-finals and final.

Already I see a problem there. You can almost be assured of a back match with the games now kicking off on Ja-

The final will be March 22. There is to be no league semi-finals this year. I think a discussion should be had on the start date of the National League. Why start the league so early and then have no semi-final?

It gets rushed though very early in the year when facilities are not available. It also doesn't give the university teams fair play in the preparation of their teams where players are in the middle of a national league campaign.

The top team in each division will meet in the league final. I think eliminating a semi-final from the competition isn't good for the promotion of the

I wonder what the reasoning behind this was. It's a great boost for some counties to say they reached a league semi-final

For a while now championship games are all set for 5pm on Saturdays and there seems to be little or no room for manoeuvre on this, even if both counties would prefer it earlier, for travel purposes etc.

If it is for TV and media coverage purposes, then explain that it is the reason and have it for specific games

Only two or three games are highlighted on the Sunday Game a week out of a possible five or six played, yet the ruling is across the board.

We would get better support and print media coverage I feel if the games were earlier. Most counties would be in favour of a discussion on this topic.

The 2020 campaign kicks off in just over 12 weeks.

A national newspaper article earlier in the year noted how short a distance it is from Knocknaheeny to the gates of University College Cork.

The crucial rider, of course, given the area's high levels of unemployment and social problems is that it's a journey very few ever make.

"I literally only got my results on Thursday," smiled
O'Connor.

A former Irish underage soccer international and now a mainstay of the Cork camogie set-up, she is a high achiever with an inner hope that others from her area will follow. It's a drum she has banged publicly before and she is unapologetic for doing so again.

"I am not going to say I am the first in the area to go to college but it's not really the thing to do in my area, unfortunately," she said.

thing to do in my area, unfortunately," she said.

"I didn't go to my local school — now the school that I went to was only two minutes

"But the school that would have been my closest school, it's not really a thing to go on to UCC or CIT or anywhere like that.

"It's just not the norm and it's very hard to change that when it's just cycles of people doing the same as what their

parents did. It is disappointing but you just have to try to make it better."

Naturally, O'Connor witnessed peers diverging from the tracks of sport and education and going down different routes.

"I know an awful lot of people that have gone down the wrong road," she said. "It's very easy to go down the wrong road, unfortunately." O'Connor insists she is not putting down the area, far from it.

She is aware of how words can be twisted after making comments about the health of camogie earlier in the year and feeling they were taken out of context in the media.

And this is too important a subject to reduce to a war over words.

"I don't want to put the area

down either because there is huge work being done in the area to try to get people on the straight and narrow, to try to get people to go on and do other things," she said.

"And I'm not saying that everyone has to go to college, because college is not the be all and end all either, it's not for everyone.

"There are very successful people who have never gone to

college but it's just about kind of breaking cycles that have gone before people and that is very difficult to do."

O'Connor doesn't wish to be considered an iconoclast either, though aside from her achievements in education she is one of just two players on the Cork squad from junior clubs.

Her recent All-Star at left half-forward on the team of 2019 was a breakthrough moment for St Vincents.

"It was a great night, I had a table with the family, then the next night at the club itself was very special," she said. "I was the first All-Star from the club was as formals

"I was the first All-Star from the club, male or female, and they had a homecoming for me, the whole club turned out.

"Obviously when you start off playing, you hear about the All-Stars and it's something you want to win. I don't think at the start of any year you set out to actually win one, you set out to win the All-Ireland.

"Unfortunately it didn't happen in that regard for us but it was nice to get an All-Star, to be recognised like that."

For all the garlands thrown O'Connor's way lately, Cork's one-point All-Ireland semi-final defeat to Galway in August still rankles.

"We were awful on the day," she said flatly. "You can't pinpoint one thing and say that's why we lost. Galway were just better on the day and unfortunately we didn't turn up. And in Cork if you don't win outright that's not good enough. Winning Munster was brilliant but the All-Ireland is where you want to be.

"This is my sixth year with Cork and my first year not being involved (in a final). So August and September was strange."

A puck of a ball separated Cork and Galway in the semi-final this year, and Galway went on to win the All-Ireland. I think Galway were better in the final than the semi-final though, so we have

How Galway build on their win will be telling. They haven't done so in the past. I didn't rate their 2013 All-Ireland-winning side too highly, but this current crop of players is good. Cathal Murray remains as manager and that's no surprise.

Certainly, Dublin being involved plays a huge part in that increase, but all the same, they're attending. Look at the ladies hockey international last weekend. What a buzz that was!

A record attendance, a peak TV viewership of 379,000 and pages and pages of print media were dedicated to their qualification, not to mention countless hours of interviews on radio.

While the St Vincent's star is the county's sole representative on this year's selection, eight Rebels will feature on the 2018 team.

Rules trial gets green light for next year

History will be made next year when camogie will trial rule changes for the first time and those changes will be revealed within the next two weeks.

Camogie Association CEO Sinéad McNulty - who declined to reveal the developments but confirmed that they have been adopted by the Association's Ard Chomhairle - described the development as "brilliant" for the sport.

Earlier this year, at the launch of the Liberty Insurance All-Ireland Camogie Championships, Camogie Association president Kathleen Woods confirmed a commitment to modernising the code when stating that it had to catch up with the advancements made by players.

That arrived on the back of the vote at Congress to agree to trial new rules.

pril when it was passed that we would use trial rules for the first time in our history" said McNulty in New York, where the Liberty Insurance Camogie All-Stars Tour is taking place.

There was a trial rules working group set up. Liam O'Neill was chairing that. It was a great committee with diverse membership and they put together a number of proposals which we will be announcing in a couple of weeks. To be able to trial them next year is really important as well. It gives us a chance to try something new and to make sure it does what it is supposed to do.

McNulty also revealed that the sport's integration with the GAA and LGFA has accelerated. "There's a lot happening at a high level. There are people sitting on each other's association committees, on the management committees, working together on the development of the coaching of games, and supporting volunteers. Next year there will be a joint coaching qualification and a programme on leadership training. We want to bring that to the club and to streamline it, try and make it work more smoothly for members.

But what about the integration of the associations? "It's not something that's going to happen overnight. You have three associations with three cultures. Our memorandum is with the GAA, and the LGFA have a memorandum with the GAA and there's a lot of work to do to see these bear fruit."

Camogie trials player contact and frees from hand

Minimal' contact and frees rom the hand will be permitted in camogie as part of six potential rule changes peing trialled.

The handpassed goal and leliberately dropping the nurley will also be banned inder the experimental rules. The trial will take place

luring next spring's National

League before being considered for permanent inclusion in the rules of the game at the Camogie Association's Annual Congress in 2021.

The outlawing of shouldering and 'moving into an opponent's body' in the rules of camogie has received strong criticism from managers and players. This is addressed in the trial rules, which will allow players to use "minimal contact on an opponent's body from side-on, once they are

making a reasonable effort to gain possession of the ball". There are efforts to speed up

the game through the free from the hand and quick puckout changes. A player will get the option to take an indirect free from their hand if they are fouled inside their own 45-metre line. Only the player that is fouled can take the free.

A quick puck-out will be allowed anytime following the referee blowing their whistle to signal a score or a wide ball. The referee will no longer need to blow their whistle a second time before a puck-out can be taken, once it occurs

from the correct position. While deliberately dropping the hurley and the handpassed goal will no longer be permitted under the trial rules, a handpassed point is still allowed. In a move mirroring recent changes in hurling, a penalty must be struck on or outside the 20-metre line but not inside it, and the goalkeeper is not allowed to move ahead of the goal-line before the ball is struck.

A persistent fouling rule will also be trialled, with a player given a 'tick' by the referee after two deliberate fouls, and a yellow card following a third foul.

"These trial playing rules are an important step for the Association to ensure that our game remains fit for purpose for many years to come," said Camogie Association President Kathleen Woods.

The National Referee Panel will receive training in the coming weeks, while workshops will be held for players and managers before the League begins.

The Association's Rules Revision Working Group, chaired by the former GAA president Liam O'Neill, consulted widely in developing the trial changes, including a survey that received more than 1,500 responses.

A seven-time All-Ireland medal winner, and the recipient of six All-Star awards, Cotter recently moved to the Big Apple with her husband Mark, who had secured a work transfer from the company he was employed with in Ireland. As a result, the influential midfielder won't be available for Cork's League campaign, but the team boss has not ruled out the possibility of the player lining out in the championship.

The door is certainly open for Orla to play for us in next year's championship, and we would love to have her back in that regard," remarked Mur-ray on the St Catherine's club player, who has been featuring for the Rebels for a whopping 14 years without a break

We are resigned to the fact that we will be without Orla for the league, but hopefully we will be able to set up some, type of an arrangement that would allow her to play for us over the summer months.

'Although Orla has been, playing at inter-county level for a lot of years, I feel that she still has a couple of good years left in her to continue to do a good job at the top level. 'So we will be keeping our

fingers crossed that her move to New York won't mark the end of her inter-county career. T've been talking to Orla

and she is very well aware of the fact that we would warmly welcome her back to play in the championship. "However, in this regard, I

don't think an arrangement whereby Orla would make the trip back to Ireland just ahead of each individual game would be feasible. So I think it would be necessary for her to remain in Ireland for longer stays over the summer

"We will be bringing in a lot

of young players for the league, and, in fact, the oldest player on the league panel will be 24," revealed Murray. whose side open their campaign at a home to Clare on January 26.

Murray backs new rules but says ending league semi-finals a 'joke'

Cork camogie manager Paudie Murray has welcomed the new set of experimental rules, but believes they will be trialled at the wrong time of year.

Six experimental rules, one of which permits a player to shoulder an opponent, will be trialled during next year's national league. This new suite of rules, drawn up by a working group chaired by former GAA president Liam O'Neill, will then be voted on for permanent adoption at Congress 2021.

Murray, who has slammed the Camogie Association for discontinuing the league semi-finals, is concerned at the trialling of the rules in early spring. He's adamant that February games, on rainsodden pitches, is not conducive to gauging the true effectiveness of the new playing

"Firstly, the rule changes are very welcome. That said, February is probably the worst month weather-wise, so how do you effectively trial them during this month? My response to when someone says they have to be tried during the league, the same as the GAA do with theirs, is that we don't get to play in Croke Park, Thurles, or Páirc Uí Chaoimh during the league round-robin. We normally get thrown onto pitches during the league that are less favourable to good hurling," said the four-time All-Ireland winning

ing a free out of defence be taken with the hand is very interesting. Getting rid of the handpassed goal is irrelevant as there were so few goals coming from the handpass anyway.

"Regarding the rule permitting minimal contact on an opponent's body side-on, the word minimal worries me a small bit. If you have a strong player running up against a weaker player, who is using minimal contact and who's not?"

These experimental rules will not be in use for the 2020 championship and Murray sees it as imperative that the inconsistency of refereeing in the latter stages of recent championships is the next issue tackled by Camogie topbrass.

"In the early stages of the championship, when there are no cameras on, there will be a set of rules applied and then when you come to a All-Ireland quarter-final, semi-final, and final, everything is all over the place. If I go back to this year's All-Ireland semi-final (Cork were defeated by eventual champions Galway),

it was the best example ever of inconsistent refereeing. This problem needs to be tidied up. Managers can't be showing up for All-Ireland quarter-finals, semi-finals, and finals, games that are being broadcast live on television, and not know what rules will be enforced."

Next year's league will consist of two groups, scheduled on a round-robin format, with the top team in either advancing directly to the final. Murray has described the move to scrap the semis as "an absolute joke"

"Getting rid of the Division 1 league semis is an absolute own goal in the promotion of the game. It is mind boggling from a developmental point of view.

"The association are supposed to be about developing and promoting the game.

"How are they going to develop the game when they are stopping one of the so-called weaker teams getting to a league semi-final."

"If we lose to Waterford in the first round of the league, the league then becomes a non-event for us. It'll be the same for every other county."

New look, new rules for the new season

IT will be a very much a new look Littlewoods National Camogie League in 2020. At a recent meeting of the Camogie Association's Ard Chomhairle a decision was made that several trial playing rules will be introduced in next year's National League.

These come ahead of potential proposals for permanent playing rule changes at the Camogie Association's Annual Congress in 2021.

The decision to implement and look as these changes and implement trial playing rule began at the Camogie congress last April when delegates when a vote was taken to permit trial playing rules to be introduced within the rules. In April a 'Feedback Forum' was held and this saw players and managers participating before a rules revision working group was established and this was under the chairman ship of former GAA President Liam O'Neill.

This rules revision working group consulted with various people in what was a very extensive process, which included a survey of players and mentors which received over 1,500 responses and produced a report and recommendations to the camogle association's Ard Chomhairle in October.

There was then a working group of Ard Chomhairle established to meet to refine the proposed rules which have now been ratified for implementation.

There are six areas that these rules will cover and all have generated a lot of talk and interest amongst players at all levels. It must be remembered whilst it is inter county players who will be trialling these rules the association needs to be mindful if they decide to implement them fully in 2021 that they will apply to all sectors and that underage players will need to be taken into consideration when these decisions are made. We all agree the rules need to be changed and we must also be mindful just because the inter-county players like them and or want them it does not always follow the ordinary player at club level or the underage players of 12 or 13 years' of age will be able for what some of these changes could bring.

The suggestion to implement a rule change recontact is the one general

The suggestion to implement a rule change re contact is the one generating a lot of debate, with a lot of people saying it is simply not enough and that the wording which says "minimal contact" is not what the

players want.

The change for the national league on a trial basis will now see the following A player may now use minimal contact on an opponent's body from side-on, once they are making a reasonable effort to gain possession

Persistent fouling is something which needs to be clamped out and the suggested rule change is that a player who is now deemed to be persistently fouling another player (two deliberate fouls) will be given a "tick" by the referee. If that player commits one more foul, it will merit a yellow card.

The suggestion re the puck out is

not that a quick puck out can be taken, the referee will now blow the whistle once only to signal a wide or a score and from that moment the sliotar is back in play and the goal-keeper is free to restart the game via a puck-out from the correct position. A lot feel this will speedy up the play so we will probably see a lot of goal-keepers with deeper pocket's as they keep sliotars close at hand.

The suggestion to take a free from the hand is a very strange one and in my opinion does nothing for the game in fact to be able to lift and strike is a skill so why take it away, to be this is something only for players playing go games young children getting used to hitting a free. The suggestion is that a player will now have the option to take a free from their hand if they are fouled inside her own 45-metre line. Only the player that is fouled can take the free from the hand and it is an indirect free.

One that has generated huge debate down through the years' is the dropping the hurley and hand-pass goal. The suggestion to be trailed is that a players will now no longer be permitted to drop the hurley intentionally, and in addition players may no longer score a goal by hand-passing the sliotar into the net. Strangely players may still score a point by hand-passing the ball over the har

One which I do not agree with is

the one regarding the penalty and 20metre free and I really think we are following hurling with this. I not agree with it in hurling either. The suggestion is that same as hurling a penalty must be struck from on or outside the 20-metre line but not inside it

In addition only one defending player may stand on the goal-line during a penalty and shall not move towards the 20m-metre line before the ball has been struck.

Imagine a little 12-year-old all alone in the goal and a size four sliotar being hit by another 12-year-old who may be a stronger girl than her. In hurling I think it is dangerous and really hope this is one that simply will not be passed as I think the goalkeeper or defender is very vulnerable and liable to get injured easily. Maybe this could be a discussion for the association child welfare people to look at before a decision is made in

Speaking about the trial playing rules, Uachtarán an Cumann Camogaíochta Kathleen Woods said:

"These rules are an important step for the association to ensure that our game remains fit for purpose for many years to come. We have listened to a range of key stakeholders involved in our game and I hope that this process will be of benefit in order for us to tweak our playing rules in the future to allow our wonderful game to continue to grow and flourish as it has done in recent years."

A training programme will take place in the coming weeks involving the association's National Referee Panel as well as workshops which will be held in early 2020 for players and managers who will participate in the 2020 National League as well as a series of trial matches which will be organised across other grades of the game as part of this process.

The rules initiative will be supported by a body of work to monitor, track and analyse their implementation, with a view to providing objective feedback from which final decisions regarding motions to the association's Annual Congress regarding permanent rule changes can be made



Early birthday present as Puspure heads elite list of stars

orld sculls champion Sanita Puspure got an early birthday present yesterday when she won the 2019 Sportswoman of the Year award.

The two-in-a-row world champion is the first rower to win the prestigious Irish Times/Sport Ireland award in its 16-year history, and it came just 24 hours ahead of her 38th birthday today

"This is a really nice reward personally. There were so many good athletes in the running, and I am really mixing with the cream of Irish women's sport here," she said.

"Olive Loughnane drove me to these awards and I met Sonia O'Sullivan last week and she handed me a trophy

"It is also great for Irish rowing as we have been making a dent on the whole international scene in recent years. Hopefully we will have a few more girls joining us yet on the Olympic journey, she added of Irish rowing's prospect of adding a women's four to the two female boats they have already qualified for

Tokyo 2020. "Training is lovely in the summer when it's warm and the sun is shining, but this is the time of year when it's cold, raining and windy," she said, "but this is where we become a speed factory and work relentiessly every single day.

Puspure held off particu-larly stiff competition in a stellar year of Irish women's sport, especially from double-weight world professional boxing champion Katie Taylor (a four-time previous winner) and jump jockey Rachael Blackmore. The dominance Puspure demonstrated in successfully defending her world title in a summer in which she tragically lost her sister Inese to cancer, demonstrated extraordinary durability and resilience.

Her world title also clinched her third Olympic qualification a good 10 months in advance, and makes her the hot favourite in her event next

This year's Outstanding Contribution to Sport went to Kerry woman Mary Geaney, a true sporting pioneer.

Not only was Geaney the first woman to captain All Ireland winning teams in football and camogie, but she also has 65 hockey caps for Ireland, won All-Ireland titles in badminton and, more recently, managed the Killarney women's golf team to Irish

Senior Cup glory. The Castleisland woman captained Kerry to football success in 1976 (scoring 3-2, the first hat-trick in a women's final)

She played club camogie in Eire Og and went on to win three All-Ireland camogie medals with Cork in 1978 (in which she scored another hattrick), 1980 and 1983, plus two

All-Ireland club football medals with Castleisland Desmonds.

She debuted, in goals, for the Irish hockey team in 1971 and was a member of the teams that won the 1977 Triple Crown and the 1983 Women's Intercontinental Cup.

Back in her heyday, Geaney thought nothing of travelling from Kerry to Belfast to train with Ireland, saying: "I was very lucky I was shopkeeping and I had great family at home and friends who filled in the gaps for me." She also played squash, badminton and golf for Munster. Limerick hockey hero Roisin Upton was, fittingly, on hand to present her with the award.

Puspure was selected overall winner from all of 2019's monthly winners, including Cork soccer star Denise O'Sullivan, who is currently playing in Australia.

Hilda will continue playing as Newcestown go senior

More than three decades after her first appearance for Newcestown Camogie Club, Hilda Kenneally will still be an active player as they make their senior debut. She spoke to DENIS HURLEY

ILDA Kenneally describes herself as being 'like a bad smell that won't go away!' from Newcestown Camogie Club, but her staying power will be rewarded

Since first playing at adult level, she has been involved in six county finals, with victory first sampled with a 2-4 to 1-5 triumph against Kilbrittain in the 1989 junior B decider - a report noted that 'when this final is talked about, the deeds of Hilda Kenneally will be forever remembered."

Now the club chairperson, she remains a valuable playing presence. Victory at junior A level in 2015 having re-graded from intermediate - kick-started the current golden period for the club, leading all the way to senior for the first time.

"That was when the whole thing got a rejuvenation,' Hilda says.

The older players stayed on, they said they wanted to give one more go. We won that and came up to intermediate and we won that too two years later.

'We were supposed to be senior B but the format was changed and that grade was removed, so we were still intermediate even though we had

'Still, we weren't fazed by that and then we went and won it again this year, so for the first time since the club was formed 37 years ago, we're up in the top flight.

'It takes a long time, but now that we're there, we want to stay there and

That's the only problem, that it's going to take a huge effort from everybody. We had our AGM recently, I was trying to emphasise really that even U8s and U10s are hugely

'In a short period of time, before we know it, they'll be trying to keep the senior team going as well."

'We didn't have the greatest of starts. We beat Clonakilty alright in the first round but then Na Piarsaigh beat us, though it was probably the best thing that ever happened.

'We thought we were going too well and all that, that put us back in



The single biggest investment in sport in this country annually is made by the volunteers, 450,000 of whom give of their time every week - on average 3.5 hours a week. The value of this was calculated to be €1.1bn to the economy annually. Well in truth you cannot really put a monetary value on it - their work is invaluable.

The research also showed sport contributes approximately 1.4% of gross added value in Ireland.

It directly employs 39,500 people, accounting for 1.7% of the workforce. This is a greater number than the total number of primary school teachers in Ireland.

When it comes to household expenditure: Sport accounts for 2.7% of total consumer expenditure. This equates to an average of €30

per household per week, putting it on a par with clothing and footwear, and alcohol and tobacco.

The report estimated that Government return on investment in sport is approximately €195 in tax revenue for every €100 it spends on sports-related goods and services. In addition to a positive revenue impact on the public finances, increased investment in sport could reduce

public health expenditure. An estimated 62% of the population are overweight or obese. This is believed to cost the State over €1bn annually. Separate research estimates that there are 4,000 preventable deaths in Ireland each year due to physical inactivity.

The work of the Federation is to ensure that sport is valued, not just in economic terms but also that it is valued as a changemaker and we were delighted in October 2018 to partner with the 20x20 campaign which in the 14 months since its launch has had a stunning impact and in truth is now a movement recognised as a unifying voice for women and girls of all ages, sizes and abilities to be part of sport and physical ac-

tivity on the island of Ireland. Sarah Colgan and Heather Thornton of the creative agency Along Came a Spider created the concept of 20x20. Its success is based on increasing participation in, media coverage of, and attendance at women and girls' games and events by 20% by 2020.

The campaign has resonated with both men and women alike across the country, 20×20 is about creating a cultural shift in our perception of girls and women in sport. By increasing the visibility of women's sport, it will become a greater part of who we are and what we follow.

71 Sporting Bodies (National Governing Bodies of Sport and Local Sports Partnerships) have signed the 20x20 Charter and given their public support to the movement and are actively working with their own members to utilise the campaign to grow their membership and enhance the visibility of women in their sport.

Fiona wins top West Cork award

FIONA Keating is the 2019 West Cork Junior Sports Star of the Year.

The talented Ballinspittle teenager is one of the rising stars of Cork GAA and last year the dual player played a leading role as the Rebels won both All-Ireland minor football and camogie crowns.

The Courcey Rovers player scored five points and was player of the match in the All-Ireland minor camogie final in May 2019, as Cork beat Clare by 3-15 to 2-12.

There was more to come later in the summer for the Kinsale Community College Leaving Cert student when she swapped codes and led the Cork minor footballers' attack. In the All-Ireland semi-final, Keating scored 1-4 and again was player of the match as Cork beat Galway. In the All-Ireland final against Monaghan, she scored 2-1 as the Rebels won 4-11 to 1-8, as Keating finished her minor days on an incredible high.

Last year, Cork minor football selector Anne O'Grady from Bantry described Keating as 'an incredible talent ... and refreshingly modest.'


Her talent is unquestionable, and the evening after she received her West Cork Youth Sports Star quarterly award, Keating scored 4-4 for Courcey Rovers in their senior camogie championship hammering of Milford. Keating also started for the West Cork ladies' senior football team that reached the 2019 county final.



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No player wants 'scoreboard journalism' insists O'Connor

MARY O'Connor, the CEO of the Federation of Irish Sport, says that, while camogie and ladies' football have made progress in recent years, there is still ample room for improvement.

This year is considered a pivotal one in terms of women's sport with the FIS leading the '20x20' charge, where sports have been encouraged to aim for improvements of 20 percent under three headings.

O'Connor, an All-Ireland winner with Cork in both codes, is keen to see the positive trend continue but knows that it won't happen without effort – and proper media evaluation rather than 'scoreboard journalism'.

'Ladies' football has been on an upward curve for a number of years,' she says.

Camogie is maybe caught slightly in the sense of the same teams getting to final, whereas football has had one team consistently getting to the final but against different finalist.

'I think the point to make is that ladies' football isn't even 50 years old yet and look what has been achieved, especially in the last five or six years, and obviously in 2019 again there was a record-breaking crowd. While the standard of football in the final wasn't fantastic, that shouldn't take away from the calibre of football all year, particularly the semi-finals, which were very good to watch as a spectacle.

get, the more important it is. I was playing up until 2010 and up until 2006 and 2007, only the All-Ireland camogie final was shown live and if it happened to be a poor game, that defined people's perceptions.

"The 2019 camogic final was exceptional, Galway brought something new but it was a good standard too. We have to be grown-up about it, people shouldn't be going to the games just because women are playing, they should be going because they're good games. We have to be able to criticise as well as admire the players and not just put them up there.

'It's something Rena Buckley has said previously and I would have gone on record with it, I don't think any player wants scoreboard journalism. When I played camogie with Cork, I was a back and the backs were never mentioned, only the scorers. Only by actually covering the games in a bit more detail and critiquing the players, that will create a bit more seriousness around them.

'It's important that the wider Gaelic games family see that

there's a real talent and skill-set there and the players are applying it.' The 20x20 campaign comes at a time when women's sports are getting more notice, but O'Connor knows that the opportunity to move forward won't last indefinitely.

'The campaign was launched in October 2018 and we had 71 national governing bodies [NGBs] and local sports partnerships signed up,' she says.

"There were three headings – media coverage, participation or attendances at games – and they all signed up to at least one of those, or in some instances all three, and they would have a plan for how to achieve the stated goals.


'For instance, under participation, they might have a low number of coaches at a certain level and seek to increase it by a certain amount. We didn't prescribe to them what they had to do, it was for them for decide.

Then, in 2019 Sport Ireland appointed Nora Stapleton and brought out their Women in Sport Policy and Women in Sport funding. Those three things will complement 20x20 and vice versa, because the policy is going to have outcomes.

'The governing bodies will be able to really fine-tune their targets now because they have the resources and some of them have taken on Women in Sport Officers to drive that and that's important. Nobody in the country owns 'women in sport' and 20x20 doesn't either, but what we're trying to do is create a platform where real conversations take place and provide strength in unity.

This is about getting people to think in a different way and that's why the Sport Ireland Women in Sport Policy is so important. I can't overstate that enough because it puts objectives in place and holds governing bodies to account on what they've committed to.

'Women's sport in Ireland is in a good place but can it get better? Absolutely, there's appetite for it and people don't see it as a threat anymore. We know there are challenges but we need to be looking at solutions and how we're going to get there rather than continually going back over old ground.'

Downey's appointment is deserved - she managed Kilkenny's camogie side to All-Ireland glory in 2016 - but it will also do the club little harm in sending out a far more positive message to its female members.

WHILE it is great to be successful at adult level the importance of bringing young fresh faces onto the scene is something that is crucial for a county to maintain its strength and certainly in 2019 Cork were very much to the fore as the All-Ireland minor title was retained in superb fashion.

In 2018 a 12-year wait finally came to an end as the minors captured the county first title since the age criteria was raised from 16 to 18. And once the celebrations had died down it was back to business again for manager Jerry Wallace and his back room team as he vowed it was not going to be a "one off".

The champions were brought down to earth with a bang as they lost to Tipperary in their round one clash on February 23.

The home side laid the foundations for victory in the opening half when playing with the aid of a strong wind they hit seven points without reply and they led by this margin at the interval as Cork failed to register a first half score.

Having hit five in the opening 20 minutes Tipp had to battle to stretch their lead as the Cork defence came to grips with the situation but two points just before the interval gave them a seven-point cushion.

Cork came out fighting for the second half and as they got the scoreboard ticking over they matched Tipp in all sectors and had the lead trimmed to a point. However, Tipperary held their lead to run out

Cork faced a tough round two clash away to Galway on March 16 where a win was a must to get keep their campaign for a place in the last four on track, but this was cancellation due to weather conditions and in a way it possibly suited Cork and they refocused for a meeting with Wexford the following week.

Cork knew this was a must-win game and they showed huge intensity in the opening half. Ellen Murphy gave Cork a great start with a goal after just two minutes and with Emma Murphy, Clodagh Finn, Ciara O' Sullivan and Cliona O'Leary adding points Cork were eight points in front before Annis Curran converted a 45 to get the visitors on the

Continuing to take the game to Wexford, Cork stretched their lead with four unanswered points before

Annis Curran had two in between a converted Cliona O'Leary pointed free. With their defence rock solid Cork held the upperhand and controlled the game to the full-time whistle.

Dublin came to Cork the following weekend and Cork had to battle hard in the opening half but once they got to grips with their opponents they went on to record an impressive win.

Qualified

Meanwhile, on the same afternoon in Tipperary Galway lost out by five points to the home side who were now qualified for the semi-final.

The rescheduled game against Galway saw Cork head to Gort for what turned out to be a vital clash in the last game second in their group.

Having lost out to Tipperary in their opening game and with Galway having also lost a game, both sides headed into the game on the same points it was most definitely a winner takes all with a semi-final place against Kilkenny the reward for the victors. Galway led at the interval by five points 0-8 to 0-3 but showing the mark of champions Cork dug deep to carve out a 1-11 to 1-11 draw. The result was enough to see them edge Galway out on scoring difference to make it to a semi-final

clash with Kilkenny.

As they had done so often a powerful second-half display where they turned around a four-point interval deficit saw Cork book their place in the All-Ireland final as they got the upperhand over Kilkenny.

A first-minute goal gave Kilkenny a dream start and aided by the strong wind they came at Cork and as the sides traded score for score Kilkenny managed to stay in front to led 1-9 to 0-8 at the interval.

Cork worked hard with Clodagh Finn, Emma Murphy, Fiona Keating

and Ellen Murphy all on the scoresheet. From the restart Cork tore into the game but it was still level at the end of the third quarter before Cork upped the pace and advanced to the final.

Clare caused the shock of the championship as they dumped out Kilkenny to book their spot against Cork in the final at windswept McDonagh Park Nenagh.

The impact of the wind was huge and helped Cork lead 3-11 to 0-3 at the interval. Clodagh Finn propelled Cork into a 1-5 to no-score lead in the opening 10 minutes.

Lorna Mc Namara had two points back for Clare before Fiona Keating stretched the Cork lead. Cork were in the driving seat thanks to two Emma Murphy goals inside 55 minutes. Clare were rocked on their heels as Murphy grabbed the vital goals and with Fiona Keating adding three points and Clodagh Finn two, Clare's

reply was one from Lorna McNamara McNamara set up Robyn Conway for a goal inside six of the restart after McNamara and Sinead McGee had fired over points and they pressed for more as two on the trot narrowed the gap before Isobel Sheehan and Finn replied. It was 3-13 to 1-7 as the game entered the last quarter.

Caoimhe Kelly had one before Lorna McNamara brought her tally to 10 points, Finn and Keating relieved the pressure on Cork with one each as Clare fired over two frees. Three minutes into injury time Lorna Mc Namara and Robyn Conway combined for a second Clare goal but Cork had done enough to retain their crown.

Fiona Keating was named as player of the match on a day that did Cork camogic proud and got new county sponsor Black Bee Investments term off to a great start.

THERE was huge joy in 2019 as a 16-year gap was bridged when Cork were crowned All-Ireland U16 A camogie champions, halting Galway's bid for five in a row.

Before that, the provincial competition proved to be a great springboard as Donie Daly and his backroom team set about building a championship team.

Cork retained the Munster U16 A championship title as they overcame a strong Limerick side, with Aimee Morgan turning in a superb display, contributing 1-4 from play in a Player of the Match display.

The U16 B side, having lost out in the opening round of the Munster series, qualified for the Munster B Shield final and had an emphatic victory over Clare, with Emily Coffey named Player of the Match.

Championship got under way on July 7 and the journey to Newbridge failed to bother Cork in a one-sided affair they overpowered Antrim.

They made it two out of two as they overcame Kilkenny who started strongly and grabbed an early goal. That failed to upset Cork, and points from Rose Murphy and Aimee Morgan settled them.

A Ciara Golden goal on the stroke of half time put Cork 1-7 to 1-5 ahead at the break. The second half was close and it was end-to-end action as both sides worked hard in the scorching heat.

The Cork defence had to absorb a lot of pressure from a Kilkenny forward line, who showed a lot of pace. Cork introduced Lilly Hayes Nally and Ella Wiggington Barrett and they both grabbed secondhalf goals with Morgan also adding to the tally. Cork weathered the challenge and were not denied.

Tipperary provided the next challenge and again a superb performance from Cork ensured that a semi-final spot was secured. Cork played with the wind in the opening half, but it was Tipp who opened the scoring and it was nip-and-tuck to the interval as Cork led 2-7 to 0-6.



Camogie season a success with games played

WITH a massive programme of games at adult and underage level all completed on schedule, Cork camogie enjoyed another busy year.

The county boards oversaw championship, league, and plate competitions from underage to adult levels under the chair-manship of Mary McSweeney.

They got through a fixture schedule of 23 competitions at championship and league level.

Junior A, B, C, Minor A, B, C, and D com-petitions in championship and league, add in two summer cup competitions.

At underage level, between championship and leagues, there were 790 games played across the grades from U12 to U16 plus the National Féile na nGael. Go Games and Cluster Blitzes were or-

ganised and ran off by the divisions for beginners up to U11.

This was a huge amount of games and a lot of organising and a lot of girls playing camogie but everything was completed bar one outstanding competition, the U16 A1 league, which ran into difficulty.

Without doubt, owning their own grounds in Castle Road has been a major help as it gives them a pitch at their dis-posal 24/7 but such is the volume of traffic for it another Castle Road would not go

This gives just a small idea of the massive workload involved in organising and keeping competitions going outside of the everyday work that has to be done.

The juvenile board was restructured in 2019 and came under the remit of the senior board with a committee headed up by the hugely efficient Willie Wallace and Mairead Donovan continuing to do massive work catering for the needs of players from U12s up to and including U16s.

The games were organised superbly and all must receive huge credit for the manner in which competitions were run off under the auspice of the adult board.

Clubs were well catered for with a huge amount of competitions in all grades The format of the U12 competition was

changed in 2018 and proved a huge hit. It continued for 2019 and was expanded to U14 and U16 league competitions

The league was divided into eight sections with six teams in each section; each team in each section then played each other giving each club five games.

On completion of each of the sections of their games the teams were then split into groups based on their finishing position in their respective sections.

Group I consisted of the winners in each section; Group 2 had the teams finishing in positions two and so forth down.

These groups then played off in a league competition with each grade divided into two groups where the top two played in

Championships at U14 and U16 again had a change of format and instead of a back door system the first round winners progressed to the second round of championship with the losers participating in a championship plate competition, with both competitions played on a knockout system after round one.

The National Féile na nGael was held in Cork and came under the remit of the board with a huge volume of work to ensure a splendid feile ran off superbly

On the development front, the final phase of the work on two extra dressing rooms is almost complete and the board is extremely grateful for a lot of voluntary work that is being done to help defray the huge expense of this work.

Having got through such a comprehensive programme of competitions it is a tremendous achievement for the hard-working officials who continue to promote camogie to the highest level in the county. and players and clubs owe a huge debt of gratitude to these voluntary officials.

Very often clubs tend to get bogged down in their own zones and when fixtures sometimes do not fall to their liking it may not be too pleasing, but with over 66 clubs to consider sometimes somebody is not going to be happy

Both boards are always flexible, sometimes to their detriment as when competitions run late the backlash is invariably

given to those at the top.

This year, two underage teams contested All-Ireland finals and it meant a lot of club playing time was lost as Cork had to be afforded time to be at their best

It's a scenario of "you're damned if you do and you're damned if you don't

The board looked closely at the intercounty calendar and slotted in club games around it and this worked out reasonably well with championship games running off smoothly; yet it only takes one draw at either club or inter-county level to knock the whole schedule off balance.

Hopefully, this year again, a schedule of dates can be worked out and announced at the end of February as this will enable clubs to plan ahead and players to book holidays safe in the knowledge they won't be missing out or having to fly home. The

draws do not necessarily need to be made. Huge challenges lie ahead in the bid to get the perfect balance but it can be achieved.

The board was again fortunate to have the all of their adult championship com-petitions sponsored by S E Systems and this support ensures that a huge burden is taken off the shoulders of the board.

They are hugely appreciative to John O'Leary for the help and support his company continues to give to camogie in Cork.

Blackbee came on board at the start of the year as new county teams sponsors and their support has been of huge help in promoting camogie.

The Echo is also very important to the board as sponsors of all the adult Player of the Match awards for championship and again this support is a huge help in the promotion of the game.

Over the next few Saturdays we will take a look back at some of the highs and lows of the season gone by for the club and county feams.

Golden moment for Hall of Famestar

SHELIA GOLDEN is regularly referred to as the "mammy of camorie"

And she was a very fitting recipient of the Hall of Fame accolade at The Echo Women In Sport awards at the Cork Airport Hotel.

Given her years of hardworking service to the sport of camogie on Leeside, this is a richly deserved award.

Although she does hold provincial honours with her county, it was through her work as an administrator that she is best known, where she has had a remarkable career.

She held the offices of county chairperson, vice-chairperson, secretary, president, as well as a team mentor on numerous occasions.

She set the foundations for this career when she took on the role of secretary of the Cork schools board. A Cork Camogie chairperson between 1988-2002, outside

A Cork Camogie chairperson between 1968-2002, outside of her roles with the County Board, Golden served as the chairperson of Inniscarra and also acted as a selector with the club teams.

In March 2012 Cork Camoigle opened their own pitch in Castle Road, a facility which they could call their own.

That was a dream for people like Sheila Golden and that dream became a reality when the pitch was opened by camogie president Joan O'Flynn.

When she was announced as the winner for this particular accolade, Golden was deservingly given a standing ovation.

Giving her thoughts on picking up the Hall of Fame Award, Golden said: "I would like to remember the people that I have worked with over the years, marvellous people and marvellous volunteers, my parents and my late husband Tommy.

"Those who I worked with on the County Board over the years, players, mentors, selectors. A lot of those people are no longer with us. I am sure they could never envisage how Cork Camogie proceeded over those years.

"They definitely wouldn't have dreamed that the Board below on their own headquarters down in Castle Road in Blackrock, with a wonderful pitch and facilities.

Golden is a worthy winner

A WONDERFUL honour was bestowed on one of Cork Camogie's best known camogie officials recently when *The Echo* named Sheila Golden as their Hall of Fame Recipient at the Ladies Sports awards.

Sheila is a well-known figure all over the country and she has given a life time of service to her sport both as a player and administrator in a career that has spanned six decades.

It all began for her at school in the South Presentation Convent which was a wonderful nursery for the game of camogie until its closure in 1987, the school produced some fantastic players for the county amongst them Betty Sugrue and Anne Comeford who both led Cork to All Ireland glory.

Sheila was chosen on the Cork Colleges team before going on to continue playing with the South Presentation Past Pupils side with whom she won three Senior county Championship medals in a row from 1969 to 1971, she also won Munster club championship medal in 1970. A member of the Cork senior team that lost out to Wexford in 1968 she holds provincial honours with the county.

It is as an administrator that she is best known and she set the foundations for this when she took on the role of secretary to the Cork Schools Board in what has been a remarkable career in administration she has held the offices of county chairman, vice chairman, secretary and president as well as team mentor.

Whilst still a player she took up an administrative role and from 1964 to 1968 she served in the role of county secretary before retiring from administration for a number of years in 1968.

When her daughters began to play the game Sheila made a returned to camogie with the Inniscarra club and when Cork county board couldn't get a chairman at convention in 1988 Glen Rovers delegate Nora Newman asked and pleaded with our recipient to take on the role for a year and the rest is history.

Chairman from 1988 to 2002 she assumed the horary presidents role from

2003 to 2007 and answered the call again when a secretary was needed and she willingly stepped into the breach in 2006 a role she filled with her usual efficiency. Retirement was not an option and once again she answered the call and took on the role of vice chairman in 2015 a position in which she is currently serving the Cork camogie board.

Outside of her roles with the county board she also served as chairman of Inniscarra in the 1980s and also acted as a selector with the clubs teams.

As a Cork selector Sheila was involved with Cork teams at Junior and Intermediate levels when All Ireland titles were won but one of her proudest moments was presenting the county Senior B championship trophy as chairman of the county board to her own club Inniscarra when Irene O'Keeffe captained the side.

Sheila has great support from all her family but without doubt her late husband Tommy was her number one helper he was there to take the phone calls and help Sheila in any way he could and this has was an important part of Sheila's involvement in administration up to Tommy's untimely passing in 2014 Sheila Golden nee O' Sullivan has given and continues to give Cork Camogie tremendous service her dedication and commitment is

unbelievable and as a person she is most courteous and helpful. An active member of the grounds committee she is one of the driving forces behind the Magnificent Castle Road Cork Camogie complex and is always busy there helping to collect gates, make tea, man the score board or do a hundred and one other jobs all for the love of Camogie A true Cork follower Sheila is widely travelled and is frequently seen supporting Cork hurling and football teams all over the country.

Outside of camogie Sheila has a huge interest in politics and no doubt this weekend will be avidly watching as all the drama unfolds.

The honour bestowed on Sheila Golden came as a huge shock to her but it is one richly deserved by somebody who has given a lifetime of service to camogie, her courtesy and efficiency is second to none and she is a wonderful ambassador for the game.

On Friday last, Shella was accompanied to the Ladies Awards Lunch in the Cork Airport Hotel by her daughters Anne, Gillian and Sinead son Tomas and her adored grandchildren Stephen, Dylan, Darragh and Odhran as well as her niece Noelle.

They will take on a Tipperary side welcoming back man-

ager Bill Mullaney, who stood down for personal reasons at the beginning of the 2019 championship, Niamh Lillis deputising to good effect.

We want our players playing in the best stadiums," says McNulty. "We had a super attendance at our All-Ireland semi-finals at LIT Gaelic Grounds in Limerick and a record attendance at the finals at Croke Park. We have been working with our colleagues in the GAA for a number of years to make sure that our girls get to play in county grounds as often as possible.

Camogie's rule trials to be put to the test

A player may use minimal contact on an opponent's body from side-on, once they are making a reasonable effort to gain possession of the sliotar. Contact must not be made in an aggressive or cynical manner

A player who is deemed to be persistently fouling another player in the first instance will be noted by the referee. For any further infringement normal rules apply.

To restart the game following a wide/score, the referee will blow the whistle to signal a wide/score and from that point the sliotar is back in play and the goalkeeper is free to restart the game via a puck-out from the correct position.

A player may choose to take

a quick free from their hand if they are fouled inside their own 45m line. Only the player that is fouled can take it from the hand and it is an indirect

Should a player deliberately drop their hurley, this will result in a free to the opposing team from where the foul occurred. Any sliotar that is hand-passed directly into the net by an attacking player will be treated as a wide.

A penalty must be struck from on or outside the 20m line but not inside it. In addition, only one defending player may stand on the goalline during a penalty and shall not move towards the 20m line before the sliotar has been
