




Clubs programme, which reached the considerable milestone of 450 clubs engaged in 2022. Following two years of not being able to gather during the pandemic, it was a breath of fresh air to see 300 Healthy Clubs Officers representing the 150 new clubs that entered the programme mingle, laugh, and shake hands, at the Healthy Club orientation day in Croke Park in March. Prof Rose Anne Kenny, lead researcher with the Irish Longitudinal Study of Ageing (TILDA) gave a wonderful keynote address that revealed how we add life to our years as well as years to our life. The secret? Having a sense of purpose in one's life while being stitched into a fabric of meaningful social connections that allows one to contribute to something bigger than oneself. When the GAA functions well, it provides such opportunities. It would be remiss as part of a recollection of 2022 not to acknowledge and recall the exceptional losses we experienced as an Association, as a community, as a family. It is one of the

responsibilities of the Community & Health Department to support our units through challenging times and critical incidents. Every year, clubs quietly draw on generations of innate experience to support their members and communities through heart-breaking losses and critical incidents. This is usually done quietly,

without recognition. Occasionally, the incident is of such high profile that it stops the country in its tracks and attracts national media attention. This occurred more often in 2022 than during any other year during my eleven seasons working in Croke Park. I highlight the following situations not because they were exceptional (which they were), but because the responses involved are indicative of the quiet work undertaken by so many clubs and counties in 2022 as they helped their members and communities overcome incredibly challenging times and experiences. The work of the Kilcormac/Killoughey Camogie Club in the aftermath of the shocking murder of Ashling Murphy in January. The response by the Athenry





and Ardrahan camogie clubs following the tragic death of Kate Moran in their league match in March. The efforts of the Curry club in Sligo following the sudden death of Red Og Murphy in April. The reaction of the Clonoulty-Rossmore club when Dillon Quirke passed away in a club championship match against Kilruane MacDonaghs in August. The resolve of the St Michael's club in Creeslough in the aftermath of the unprecedented explosion that claimed 10 lives in October. The responses of the volunteers in these clubs, and countless others, could not have been more empathetic, more compassionate, were it one of their own that had lost their life. Other critical incidents may not involve a death but could be life-changing in other ways. In many cases, the volunteers leading the response are also deeply impacted by the experience but set aside their grief and trauma to support those around them. They are the people that the family of Gaelic Games and Irish communities are built upon and we owe them a great debt of gratitude.

Annie Lynn and Caitrín Dobbin replied with points for the Ulster champions.

In the 18th minute a high delivery from Joanne Ryan came back off the crossbar and Miriam Campion forced the ball over the line for a Drom and Inch goal.

Loughgiel replied almost immediately as Annie Lynn was the first to react after Drom and Inch goalkeeper Caoimhe Burke had saved from a Lucia McNaughton

The Munster champions had their second goal in the 22nd minute after Ryan's high

ball resulted in Elmear McGrath finishing to the net to put her side four points up.

Just before half-time Loughgiel scored a crucial goal to reduce the deficit to two points heading into the break. McNaughton popped a pass over the defence for Dobbin to finish to the net.

Big move to tackle concussion issues among GAA bodies

IN a welcome development, UPMC has joined with the Camogie Association, the GAA, LGFA, and the Gaelic Players Association to roll out a concussion baseline testing programme for inter-county players across the 32 counties.

This has been done with the goal of rapidly diagnosing and treating con-

cussions in players.

The initiative, which began on Monday will cover camogie, hurling, and football players who will participate equally across all codes.

Senior vice-president of UPMC International David Beirne, said: "UPMC is changing how health care is delivered in Ireland, and we are excited to use our world-renowned concussion treatment and testing experience to assist players across our national games.

"As a global leader in concussion care, sports medicine, and rehabilitation, UPMC is proud to support this player welfare programme along with our dedicated partners."

The presidents of the GAA, Camogie Association and LGFA as well as the GPA all welcomed the programme and Uachtarán CLG Larry McCarthy said: "A considerable effort has been made in the area of education and awareness among players and coaches in relation to concussion and it requires constant vigilance.

"This latest development between leading experts in UPMC and the GAA is not only welcome but vital to ensure best practice is being followed.

"Although this is a programme that focuses initially on inter-county players our intention is to see the benefits of the programme made available to clubs and to every player at every level as soon as possible."

Uachtarán ACC Hilda Breslin expressed the Camogie Associations delight to be involved with the project: "We are delighted to be joining with UPMC and the Gaelic games family on this programme.

"The welfare of our players is paramount, and we hope this programme will not only help ensure our players have the right medical treatment if they sustain a

concussion, but it will also provide important insight on concussive incidents in our games."

President of the LGFA Micheal Naughton said: "Confirmation of the baseline testing programme for inter-county players is a most welcome development.

"The short and long-term impacts of concussion have come into sharp focus in more recent times and to be in a position to assist our players on such a wide-scale basis is a huge step forward.

"If concussions are not diagnosed early, and treated carefully, the consequences can be serious, and with a huge risk of repeat concussions.

"We are delighted to join our colleagues in the GAA, the Camogie Association, the Gaelic Players Association and UPMC to roll-out the programme.

"I am sure that this programme will be of huge benefit to a number of our players and, from a health and safety perspective, this is a vital intervention piece."

CEO of the GPA Tom Parsons sees the move as an excellent one and is important for the wellbeing of players.

"This is an extremely important step in terms of looking after the physical welfare of players."
"With the attritional nature of Gaelic

games, head injuries and concussive events are an unfortunate feature of our games. Being able to diagnose and better manage the return-to-play protocols provides players with a greater standard of care with head injuries.

"That's why we are delighted to partner with UPMC and the governing bodies to proactively monitor the incidence and effects of concussion on our members.

"This will allow us to take the necessary steps in militating against the consequences of concussion and delivering the best possible care for players."

Baseline concussion testing will be provided to all inter-county players, and these players will also be covered for concussion physician specialist treatment.

This will be delivered using the Im-PACT concussion testing model, evidencebased, neurocognitive assessment software co-developed by UPMC specialists.

ImPACT which stands for immediate post-concussion assessment and cognitive testing is an objective tool to support trained clinicians in making return-to-activity decisions following concussions.

This announcement builds on UPMC's pilot programme for baseline testing that was launched in 2021 for the GAA.

It also follows a conference in September between UPMC and the Gaelic Athletic Medical Association in UCD, where Michael Collins Ph.D. director of the UPMC sports medicine concussion programme in Pittsburgh, and his colleagues presented their latest research and treatment protocols.

This is an exciting initiative which is welcome for inter-county players, male and female, and hopefully going forward it may be extended to include all GAA players at all levels, but for now it's a welcome step in the right direction.

McNaughton continuing special family tradition

LUCIA McNAUGHTON will play for Antrim's Loughgiel Shamrocks at Croke Park today in the AIB All-Ireland School Camogie Club Championship final against the holders, Sarsfields of Galway (6 30)

Lucia's grandmother, Mary McGarry, played on the Antrim team that completed the All-Ireland championship three-in-a-row in 1947.

That 1947 All-Ireland inter-county championship campaign contained controversy. The CIE club, representing Dublin, beat Galway in the All-Ireland semi-final at Ballinasloe. At the end of the game, hundreds of spectators rushed onto the pitch to express their upset with the refereeing. The gardai restored order and escorted the referee away by car.

Late on in the November All-Ireland final at Corrigan Park, Kathleen Cody's blistering shot sank in the sea of mud in the Antrim goal area.

The Antrim goalkeeper, Kathleen Madden, fished the sliotar out of the net and cleared it to safety. Dublin appeals that the ball had crossed the line were not entertained. Antrim won by two points.

Lucia's sister Una is also on the Loughgiel team, as are three more of

the late Mary's granddaughters, Katie, Maria and Annie Lynn.

"I was very young when my grandmother died," explains Lucia. "But I would have heard all the stories about her from my family and the people in the parish.

"It's really nice that my grandfather, Mary's husband, John, is still alive, and he can watch us playing on the television. He was a top player himself."

The small ball was always big news in these parts.

"Camogie and hurling. That's all we did. And Irish dancing. I have been playing since I was five.

"It means so much to the people here. My grandmother's generation loved hurling and camogie, and it's the same for us now. It's nice to have that piece of family history, but there are other families on the team that have their histories too.

"There's such a great buzz in the locality about the final. When you go down to the shops, or to Mass, people are coming up to you talking about the match. It just shows how something like this can lift the parish. We always hoped that this day would come. As a child, you'd dream about running out in Croke Park with your club mates.

"It's our first ever All-Ireland final. We lost a few semi-finals. This is such a big

deal for us. Reaching Croke Park is a wonderful achievement. We have put in the work. We'll give it a rattle."

McNaughton works as a physiotherapist. She is one of the club's most decorated players. She captained Antrim to All-Ireland intermediate success last year.

"That was one of the best days of my life. It encouraged us all to push on to stay senior, and try to get better every year."

Another memorable afternoon came last Saturday when Loughgiel overcame Tipperary's Drom & Inch in the All-Ireland semi-final.

"Three points in it. So tight the whole way through."

The champions will be another test. But Shamrocks will take inspiration from those that have gone before.

Like her grandmother, and the hurling teams that brought home All-Ireland titles. Loughgiel have twice been All-Ireland senior hurling champions, 1983 and 2012. Her dad, Séamus, was on the winning side of '83.

"It's vital to have a strong underage section," states McNaughton. "And to give them something to aspire to. Showing them the importance of the club to the community, and to appreciate the effort it takes to keep a club going."

The omens are good. They lost key men in Shane Boland and Kenny Feeney to injury in their recent victory over Killimor but coped, with Liam Lavin and Seán Regan playing key roles.

ALL-IRELAND SENIOR CLUB CAMOGIE FINAL Loughgiel Shamrocks (Antrim) v Sarsfields (Galway), Croke Park,

6.30, L Dempsey (Kilkenny) - RTÉ2 A FOURTH consecutive All-Ireland final and the status of champions makes Sarsfields justifiable favourites here as they seek to emulate the feats of the club's senior men's hurlers, who went back-to-back on the national stage in 1993 and '94.

Galway star Siobhán McGrath scored 1-7 (0-4f) against a doughty St Vincent's in the semi-final last weekend. Sarsfields scraped through by a point and, in the absence of a commanding performance, still mustered a winning one.

Loughgiel, meanwhile, were liberated by finally moving out of Slaughtneil's shadow in Ulster to beat Drom & Inch last week in Kinnegad to make the first All-Ireland final in their history.

They kept the Munster champions to just three scores from play all day and require a similar defensive effort here if their first trip to Croke Park is to be a successful one.

Four of her sisters are involved - Clodagh, Siobhán, Ciara and Orlaith, Orlaith, though, is injured. Their other sister, Laoise (15), will be eligible to step up next year. A magnificent six.

Their mother, Geraldine, played hockey for Ireland. Their dad, Michael 'Hopper' McGrath, won two All-Ireland senior hurling championship medals with Galway. He's the Sarsfields manager.

"There's a real family involvement.

but it's not just us. The squad has many sisters, cousins and relatives."

The midfielder (left) is enjoying the game as much as ever. "Especially in the last couple of years, but it's easy to enjoy it when you have success," she admitted.

She has two All-Ireland senior club and two senior inter-county medals, but her Galway days are behind her.

"There's such a big commitment involved nowadays," she said. "And living in Dublin, and with the job that I have, that would be difficult.

"When I began playing, there was a big commitment, but it has increased so much, particularly in the last five to six years. You have the gym, the ball wall, your nutrition, not to mention the usual training sessions. You'd admire the people who do it year in, year out.

"The sport has changed - with the strength and conditioning, the science and everything else that's involved. Players are playing on for longer. They are minding themselves.

"The Galway team has several players in their 30s, and they are as fit and as fast as anyone. It's up to each individual to see how much they get out of it. Camogie is not a young person's sport anymore. When I began, you had players as young as 14 and 15 playing senior. But now you'd have to be an exceptional player at 16 to get on a senior team."

Sarsfields have played in five All-Ireland senior finals, losing three and winning two.

"Hopefully, we can balance that out on Saturday. A big disappointment was losing the All-Ireland final to Oulart last December. We just didn't turn up, and Oulart hurled us off the field.

"The fact that we got to redeem ourselves so quickly last March was such a good thing. Time has flown since that day. I'm glad the competition will be over before Christmas. When you come back to play a semi-final or final in January, it seems like a new season."

She is expecting a close tussle.
"We know each other well. I think it
will be very tight."

Sarsfields are in their sixth final in seven seasons and aiming to increase their conversion rate to 50% by going back-to-back for the first time.

They displayed mammoth character to emerge from a rip-roaring All-Ireland semi-final against Kerry's courageous Clanmaurice last Saturday, needing two last-ditch levellers before emerging successful at the end of two periods of extra time.

They trailed by four points at the break but O'Hagan and Graffin exerted a greater influence after the resumption, eventually scoring 13 points between them, while Carr also thundered into the fray and Clanmaurice were held to two second-half scores. Graffin shot the first equaliser, while O'Hagan held her nerve from a placed ball to drill the second one.

It is worth noting that while Teehan has established herself in the Kilkenny team as a corner-back, her more natural role is more advanced and it was her goal after a brilliant length-of-the-field move that ended Castlegar's resistance.

Emma Manogue and Emma Gaffney are others who James Stephens followers will be looking to if they are to deliver more silverware but the likelihood is that there is very little between these two well-balanced units and that this is one that will go all the way down to the wire.

However the Connacht side hauled themselves back to parity at


the break, 1-6 to 1-6.



Sarsfields retain title after overcoming Loughgiel

Sarsfields retained the All-Ireland senior camogie club title at Croke Park, defeating Loughgiel Shamrocks who were bidding to become only the second-ever winner from Antrim, after O'Donovan Rossa

Appearing in their fourth consecutive final, and tipped to win, the side managed by former Galway hurler Michael 'Hopper' McGrath claimed a third win in four seasons and achieved a first successful defence.

Having gone in level at half time and fallen a point in arrears soon after the resumption, Sarsfields were lifted by a vital second goal seven minutes into the second half through Rachel Murray which put them four points up and they were five ahead a minute later from a Niamh McGrath free.

Loughgiel refused to surrender in a match that produced a terrific tussle from first whistle to last. Five points, four from Roisin McCormick a neat finish from Caitrin Dobbin, brought the Antrim side level, 1-12 to 2-9, as play entered the 52nd minute. That set up a grandstand finish.

But Sarsfields have more finishing kick. Siobhán McGrath and McCormick exchanged pointed frees before Niamh McGrath sent over a fine point to nudge Sarsfields in front with 55 minutes gone. Another free from Siobhán McGrath left two in it, but Sarsfields couldn't feel safe, even when Niamh McGrath landed an excellent free to open up a goal lead in the 58th minute.

But in the first of four minutes injury time Sarah Spellman, introduced in the first half for the injured Maria Cooney, put them four up. McCormick's reply, a ninth converted free, wasn't enough to stall Sasfields who needed all their experience to see off a spirited Loughgiel challenge.

Sarsfields captured a second All-Ireland club title last March, when they overcame Oulart-The Ballagh, who had dethroned them in the previous season's decider played just three months earlier. This latest success completes a dream year for a club that only won their first county title in 2016.

Loughgiel suffered the worst possible start when after just 31 seconds Sarsfields full forward Siobhán McGrath scored a goal at the second attempt, her first effort saved by Eimear Boyle. Similar to their semi final win over St Vincent's, Sarsfields were quick to settle into the match and had 1-2 on the board before Loughgiel managed to register a score in the sixth minute through Mary McKillen, with good build up play from midfielders Lucia McNaughton and Amy Boyle.

Before that there was a brilliant solo point by Caoimhe Kelly, daughter of 1993 All-Ireland winner Pádraig, and McGrath put over a free to give the champions a five-point start. McKillen's opening point for Loughgiel was replied to immediately with a fine score from Niamh McGrath, but the Ulster champions became more composed as the half wore on, full forward McCormick leading the fightback.

It was McCormick who won and pointed a free which led to Cooney having to go off injured in the 24th minute, a major blow to Sarsfields, McCormick's free leaving Loughgiel trailing 0-4 to 1-4. And they were level when Caitrin Dobbin picked up the ball in a ruck outside the D and raced away before finishing cooly to the net after 27 minutes.

Two exceptional scores from Annie Lynn had Loughgiel in front for the first time, two up after being five down, and when Kelly scored her second point for Sarsfields it ended a 17-minute scoreless period for the Galway ladies.

One of the scores of the half was a point by Lucia McNaughton who caught a stick pass by McCormick on the move and struck over the bar. But Sarsfields got back level by the break with Klara Donohoe pointing in the seventh minute of injury time, after numerous first half stoppages.

Clare native Fitzgerald brought huge energy to the role and the feedback from all the players was superb with each and every player enjoying the year - what a pity their huge efforts just fell short. The intermediate team, under the guidance of manager Trevor Coleman, looked to be the form team as they took on Galway and, with the Connacht side reduced to 14 players for the last quarter, Cork were in a good position but failure to capitalise on opportunities saw them lose out by two points on a disappointing day in Croke



game in their group, Cork and Galway came face-to-face in the final, with Galway having knocked out holders Kilkenny.

Cork showed huge determination and spirit all through the campaign to get out of tight corners. The final lived up to expectations and a superb effort from Cork in FBD Semple Stadium saw them capture the county's third title at the grade. In a tight game, Cork had a 1-3 to 0-3 interval lead and they tore into the second half with a superb

energy and they kept their noses in front despite huge Galway pressure. Their defence was magnificent as they hooked, blocked and got the ball out of the danger zone, led superbly by Aoife Healy, who was named as Player of the Match. Cork won by 2-11 to 2-7, the goals scored by Ciara Morrison and Orla Cahalane.

Despite defeat to Galway in their opening group game, the U16 team knuckled down with excellent victories over Kilkenny, Limerick and Wexford before going on to meet Tipperary in the final. What was impressive all through their campaign was their workrate – it was huge and the will to win was there to be seen. The competition for places on the starting fifteen was intense and, with a very strong bench, Donie Daly and his management continued to keep everyone on their toes as they changed their lines out and keeping everyone focused and working hard.



Twomey: Cork to implement new

A YEAR that ultimately ended in heartbreak for the Cork camogie team still offered hope. Douglas man Matthew Twomey has completed his first year in charge and in his second, the Rebels will be gunning for their first All-Ireland senior title since 2018.

'At the start of 2022, all we wanted to do was get back to the final and better what we did in 2021. We got a lot of young players into the panel to see how they fared. We were up in Croke Park three times which was always fantastic but the way we came up short was dis-

appointing, admitted Twomey, as Cork lost the All-Ireland final to Kilkenny in August by a single point, 1-13 to 1-12.

'On a whole, you have to say it was positive. There's no doubt there are learnings there from the management's perspective but also the players.

'There can be improvements there, which is a good reflection to have but it's also a modest reflection. Ultimately, my job is to look at myself and everything else. It was a good year, but there could have been more. We had a league final that we could have won and obviously the All-Ireland we possibly should have won.'

The three main camogic contenders, according to most, are Twomey's charges, Kilkenny and Galway. The Cork boss is still wary of the so-called challengers.

'We were missing Orla Cronin, Linda Collins and Pamela Mackey in the final, huge losses to us. We played for 40 minutes and lost the All-Ireland by a point, after leaving in a poor goal. There is no doubt we can improve,' the Cork boss

'Then there's the likes of Tipperary, Dublin, Waterford, all with new management. They're going to improve as well. The gap is getting smaller

and smaller, as we found to our detriment against Tipperary. That's still a healthy situation though. Our goal next season is to get better,' Twomey added.

One new face coming in is coach Liam Cronin, who has replaced Davy Fitzgearald in the Cork backroom team. Cronin was involved in 2020 with Cork camogie and with Clare hurling for three years previous to that. He was with Dublin senior hurlers for the last two years and Twomey is delighted to have him on board.

'Coaching wise, he's a class act, most importantly too, he's a gentleman. He feels he has unfinished business down in

style in '23 to show our strengths

Cork which is great, Twomey

explained.

The Cork boss will be hoping that a new style of play will come from this appointment too. The quality of players we have is second to none. The success coming through at underage is a credit to everyone involved there but we have to utilise that. We have to get the right players in the right positions with the right play,' he said.

'Let us worry about ourselves. We were playing with eight players in the defence so people did put up their stalls against a team like us. That is a compliment in a way, like

they're worried about us. We did play into their hands though. We have an excellent coach coming in next year and he's in the same mindset as myself. It is a stumbling block for myself that we have to remain totally united as a management. Everyone has to buy into what we are doing. There is a system we could play that suits our players. I'm hoping we'll implement that next year to show our strengths rather than focus on anyone else's."

Two important players are dual stars Libby Coppinger and Meabh Cahalane, and the Cork manager is full of praise for the duo but also aware of the big

commitment.

'They remind me so much of Rena and Briege. There's not a bother on them, they could be out four or five nights a week. There is a bit of minding of them as well. Libby has a fair drive up to Cork from Kealkil and that has to be brought into consideration,' Twomey said.

'We do have to sit down with the football management and try and curtail their activities as well. These players want to play, they're good enough to play. If they could split between the two teams, it would be key. You want them to be happy too, I wouldn't put a gun to anybody's head and say if you play football you're gone."

Even though Cork have now suffered back-to-back All-Ireland final defeats, the belief in the group is strong.

'There's savage belief there,'
Twomey said. 'I think in 2021,
just to get to a semi-final was
a monkey off the back. They
hadn't been in a final for a few
years. Galway were just more
experienced on that day but in
2022 we were very confident of
going the whole way. It didn't go
our way but they are relentless.
I don't think any player would
go back in January unless there
was a belief that we'd win an
All-Ireland. We have to be confident, and we are.'

Enniskeane camogie star Orla Cronin says her recent eight-day visit to Africa has completely changed her outlook on life, and made her realise the importance of health and happiness



ALL-Ireland camogie player Orla Cronin is just back from a life-changing trip to Kenya where she was part of a group working to plant one million trees and support hundreds of thousands of African families and communities to live off

The 27-year-old from Ballineen travelled with Cork team-mates Libby Coppinger, Laura Treacy and Ashling Thompson, as well as GAA players from all over the coun-

The trip, she explained, was an initiative by Alan Kerins who is the founder of Warriors for Humanity - a charity organisation offering campaigning, volunteering, educational and fundraising opportunities with the expectation to inspire and connect people and is-

The trip was in partnership with Self Help Africa (SHA) who are a leading international development charity with an expertise in small-scale farming and growing family-farm businesses. They work with their own local and African staff and, through local partners, they have been undertaking a range of agri-development programmes in rural African communities for years,' said Orla, a physiotherapist who works in in St Finbarr's Hospital in geriatric and stroke rehabilitation.

Cork lost to Kilkenny in the 2021 final, but they were back with a bang last season to take the title and now the hunt is on to make it back-to-back titles again. Joining Wallace in his backroom team is coach Michael Boland who has been with the minors through their hugely successful campaigns and this year they are joined by U16 All-Ireland winning coach Mossie O'Sullivan. Ollie Hallihan provides experience and mentorship to both players and management and he continues in his role. A new addition to the group is Chris Casey who joins in a role

covering mentorship and onfield training with players. Orla Hallihan returns as the group's lialson officer along with Mairead Donovan from the county board. John Daly is again the medical officer and will work with the group on game day. Sean Duggan returns in the role of providing statistics inputs from game days. Reyanna Power, Lucy Wallace, and Paul Griffin return to provide support and logistics assistance on championship

match days. Denis McCarthy and his team of coaches at Midleton Fitness Cork are providing outsourced support to the groups in the area of age-specific strength and conditioning performance-related group programs.

Currently, the Cork management are looking at approximately 80 players in either game-based or training events and are leaving no stone unturned in talent searching for players.

The Douglas woman reminded attendees that while the physical aspect of sport is key, women in sport must not neglect their mental health.

Speaking of her own experience, Shine said: "I spent the majority of my sporting career afraid to be myself, afraid to share what I was going through, because I was scared I wouldn't be selected for a team. When I found myself in a situation where my mental health and addictions pulled me away from the one thing I loved and portrayed me as something I am not and slowly deteriorated my life, it was sport and the sporting community that gave me my life back. That is the power in sport.

She continued: "If I could change one thing about being an athlete, it would be how we are really understood, especially when facing difficult periods. We do not have conElaine Whelan

UL controversially knocked out of Ashbourne Cup

UL have been eliminated from this year's Ashbourne Cup, the blue riband third level camogie championship, in extraordinary circumstances, WRITES CONOR McKEON.

The Limerick College played Maynooth in the final game of the group stages, requiring a win to draw level on points with DCU and TUD. According to competition rules, score difference would then determine which two out of the three would qualify for the semifinals

A table published on the official third level camogie social media channels showed DCU with a scoring difference after three games of +3L with UL's shown as -2.

In a statement released yesterday by the UL panel, they claim that they received confirmation from the CCAO executive of the standings prior to their game with Maynooth which they won by 34 points.

However, they were subsequently contacted by the CCAO, who informed them that a mistake had been made with the information.

"As far as we are aware," the statement outlines, "a question was raised by DCU about the score difference, importantly not before but after our match with Maynooth, although they had been made officially aware of the scores and possible outcomes in the week leading up to the UL and Maynooth fixture."

UL say they were informed, via a "one line email" from the THDC that DCU would be advancing to the semi-finals after clarification of a scoreline by the referee in the DCU/ Maynooth game, which was played last November 29.

AFTER decades of service to camogie in Cork and Glen Rovers, Mary Newman was inducted into The Echo Women in Sport Awards Hall of Fame at Páirc Uí Chaoimh.

She was commended for her years of service to Cork GAA and recognised for her work as secretary of the Glen Rovers Camogie Club, PRO for the club, and PRO for the Cork County Board. It wasn't just a personal victory, she was joined by her whole family when she accepted the award. This brought everything full circle as her mother, Nora O'Brien, played on the first Glen Rovers team to win the senior county championship in 1950. She started playing before transitioning into various volunteer roles and has worked as a selector. It was her off-the-pitch position that helped the club win a number of Cork, Munster, and All-Ireland titles. Despite all the trophies that she helped bring to Blackpool, the growing status of camogie in Cork is one of Newman's greatest achievements.

"I love it and I have great memories. I was thinking below with Linda (Mellerick) about the many battles and fights we had picking teams.

"They are all here from the county board and I served with all those great people and people in my club. Mary Sheehan, our chairperson, just took photographs with my mother and

THURSDAY evening saw the best and brightest of Cork gather at Páirc Uí Chaoimh for The Echo Women in Sport Awards.

They were treated to a speech from guest of honour Clare Shine that outlined the struggles of being a professional athlete and how sport can be used to overcome such adversity.

As a youngster, the Douglas native excelled at camogie, ladies football, and soccer, reaching great heights from playing at Croke Park to scoring in the Champions League but battled addiction and mental health issues along the way.

The former Irish international said: "When I was asked to be guest speaker for tonight's awards, as soon as I got off the phone I was thinking 'how am I going to inspire women who inspire me?"

"But being an athlete is so much more than what people may seem; the hard work, commitment, scarifies, blood, sweat, and tears, the highs and lows, the cold winter nights, the pressure, the expectations, not only the expectations that people have on you but the expectations you have on yourself to be the absolute best that you can

"And that is where the real athlete is born. Sport shapes you into being an incredible human being.

"In saying that, my career didn't shape up to be what I hoped for in the end, but I am the person I am today because of sport. That is something I am forever grateful for.

"Growing up playing sport in Cork, it was always exciting between Gaelic football, camogie, and soccer, I spent every night of the week doing what I loved. The opportunities that young sport stars have in

Cork are incredible and that is down to the work being done by all of you paving the way.

"It was only on my way across here tonight after a long day of reflecting, and reflecting is something that I do love to do, I remembered winning the monthly award and attending the annual dinner just like today and only caring about the wine that was being served.

"For me, I was never present. I was never someone who could appreciate what I had achieved in the moment because there was always the next trophy and game to win.

"It's only since I stopped playing a couple of months back that I really started to appreciate and be proud of my achievements.

"Being true to yourself while playing sport can be difficult at times. There's a simple fact that lies among our fears and that is being judged. Being put under a light of having weaknesses and being vulnerable is something that can categorise us as being unfit and not being the best player or athlete that we can, which can

be a scary thought.
"I most certainly think the opposite. I
think being vulnerable and having weaknesses is having a strength like no other.

"Imagine a world where everyone can be themselves; be open and honest with who they are without a fear of judgement. We would be unstoppable, unplayable, and the best version of ourselves on and

"For me, I spent the majority of my sporting career afraid to be myself, afraid to share what I was going through, because I was afraid I wouldn't be selected or chosen to be part of something I always





dreamed of

"I've travelled around the world doing what I love. I've played in a World Cup, two European finals, an All-Ireland final in Croke Park, and I've scored in the Champions League.

"When I found myself in a situation where my mental health and my addictions pulled me away from the things that I loved, portrayed me as someone I'm not, and slowly deteriorated my life on this earth, it was sport and the sporting community that gave me my life back. That is the power of sport; the power of having team-mates and a family who believe in you. Not only as a player, but more importantly as the human being you really are.

"If I could change one thing about being an athlete, it would be how we are understood. Especially when we go through difficult periods. We do not have control over everything that happens in our lives. But we do have control over how we react to it and no matter what happens in life, sport has the power to bring us back to

"Just like it did for me."

This follows a landmark season that saw her win the Munster Senior Camogie Championship and the Cork Senior Camogie Championship for the second year in a row with Seandún.

O'Connor was instrumental in both victories as she scored ten points in the provincial decider and 2-8 in the Cork final against Sarsfield at Castle Road in Mahon. She was recently made the Cork senior camogie captain for 2023, and she said Thursday night's award was the perfect way to kick off the new season.

"It's a lovely way to start the year, I'm in total shock and delighted to start the year on a high," she explained. "I'm in a state of shock. I didn't expect to win when I saw the calibre of people who were also nominated."

O'Connor beat a number of Irish, European, and world champions to the prestigious award. The trophy will now go into her collection alongside four All-Ireland medals, six Munster titles, and an All-Star. Thinking about all of this, O'Connor prefers to see camogie as a game that she loves as opposed to a way to win trophies and medals.

"I just love playing, obviously I do play to win, but I genuinely enjoy playing and every minute I do have playing," she said.

association football was also mentioned and people were told about her performances at the 2014 U19 European Championships. She starred for an Irish team that reached the semi-finals, and the majority of that squad are now getting ready to compete at their first-ever FIFA Women's World Cup.

"I'm really looking forward to it. It's on right at the peak of our season, I might have tried to go if it was on at a different time of year," she explained. "It's brilliant for them. I

"It's brilliant for them. I think they can do quite well. It'll be great to see the likes of Denise (O'Sullivan), Megan (Connolly), Katie (McCabe), and all of those people that I would have known growing up and playing with. I'm looking forward to it and hopefully they can do well.

"Denise is about two or three years older than me and I've known her since I was very young. It'll be brilliant to see her do well because I know she will do well at the World Cup."

While she gets up early in the summer to catch Ireland's games in Australia, O'Connor will be in the middle of her first season as the captain of Cork's senior camogle team. She says that the new role adds no pressure as it is a team sport with shared responsibility. "We play a team game, it's actually a squad game so ultimately my role at the end of the year, if we win something, is to collect it on behalf of the team. I won't be feeling any additional pressure or anything," she said.

Feast of college action in Ashbourne, Purcell and Meaghair Cups

IT'S a big weekend for students as the UCD campus in Belfield hosts camogie's oldest and most prestigious competition, the Ashbourne Cup.

The Purceil Cup and Fr Meaghair Cup are also up for grabs at the university venue.

The Aushbourne Cup is hugely complettive and is without doubt. the highlight of college sporting life for camogie playing students. Huge preparations will have been made since term begain and the scene is set for what promises to be feast of colleges camogie.

The competition was the brainchild of Agnes O'Farrell, founder member and president of UCD camcigie club, who later served as president of the Camogie Association.

In 1915 she persuaded Lord Ashbicume to donate a trophy for the camogie inter-varsity comprettion.

Since 2010 the Purcell Cup has been staged alongside the Ashbourne and has been contested for simps 1977. It was donated by Una Plurcell, president of the Ca-mogie Association, Her husband Padraig was Gaelic games correspondent for the Irish Press. The format is similar to the Ashbourne Cup; in the final stages of the competition six teams are divided into two groups of three in which each team play two

The trop two in each group goes through to the cup semi-finals while the bottom team in each group plays in the final of the Purceil Shield.

The Plurcell Cup winners play the Ashbicume Shield runners-up the following year to determine promotion and relegation. Having initially been established for non-university colleges in 1977 the standard of the team rather than the type of university determines if colleges should

participate in the Ashbourne Cup or the Purcell Cup. Colleges that don't compete in the Ashbourne and Purcell Cups play for the Fr Meaghair Cup; it was inaugurated in 1986 and the format is similar to the Ashbourne and Purcell. Close to 400 players will de-scend on the Belfield complex for the semi-finals; many of the players in action are already involved in inter-county camogle, while for a lot of players it will be a huge privilege to represent their college. Down through the years many players have made the breakthrough to inter-county camogie thanks to their efforts in the Ashbourne Cup and intercounty mangers will be keeping an eye on proceedings. Cork are well represented in the Ashbourne semi-finals with UCC fielding a strong side that will feature a host of Cork seniors and intermediate players including Emma Murphy who captains the side, Molly Lynch, Ali Smith, Laura Hayes, Clara O' Sullivan Meabh Murphy, and Aoife Healy.

They lost at the semi-final stage last year and they will be hoping to go all the way this year. Cork eyes be also be on the Purcell Cup semi-finals; SETU C will meet UG at 2pm and MTU will meet Trinity at 4pm. 'Unfortunately, Ciara suffered a bad injury while playing in the semi-finals of the Ashbourne Cup for UCC. We are waiting for confirmation on the severity of it but, right now, it looks like Ciara could be out for some time. It's a huge blow for the player herself, obviously, but also for Cork.'

The opening weekend of the 2023 Very Ireland Camogie National League sees Cork beginning their Division 1A campaign at home to Dublin this Saturday (MTU Cork, 2pm).

Last year, Twomey's senior side topped a group containing Kilkenny, Clare and Limerick before going down 2-14 to 1-13 to Galway in the Division I League final at Croke Park.

This season, Cork will entertain Dublin and Clare before embarking on two difficult road trips against Tipperary and the side that defeated them in the 2022 All-Ireland final, Kilkenny. A home fixture against Galway rounds off the Rebels' group phase in which fringe players will get a chance to impress. Davy Fitzgerald has departed the Cork camogie management team to take over the Waterford men's senior hurling team. The Clare native's exit has necessitated a backroom team reshuffle.

'Dynamics is a word I have been using a lot lately but it was vital that we got the dynamics of the Cork management team right for 2023,' Twomey admitted.

'Teddy O'Donovan, Anthony O'Neill and Ger Manley are staying on. Liam Cronin, who previously worked with the Clare and Dublin senior hurling teams, has a wealth of experience and came in as coach after Davy Fitzgerald took up his new role with Waterford.

'Wesley O'Brien and Eoin Dorgan are looking after our S&C programmes. Jennifer Meade is new to the backroom team as well and has been a huge help to me since she came in.'

First up for Cork is Dublin on Saturday. The visitors are looking to build on last year's encouraging run to the All-Ireland quarter-finals where eventual champions Kilkenny ended their run. 'We certainly want to look at more players and give some younger players an opportunity during the league,' Twomey explained.

'This year's league will be a great test as last year we had only three league games before facing Galway in the final. Now we have a minimum of five games and all against serious contenders. We want to see exactly where we are at and will be trying to integrate a new style of play into the Cork team.'

Clorakilty's Amy McCarthy played a pivotal role in Cork's Mursuer and All-Ireland U16 Championship triumphs last year. Newcestown's Alice Buckley was also part of Cork manager Donie Daly's third All-Ireland U16 title success in as many years.

Amy McCarthy, alongside fellow midfielder, Sarsfield's Ava Fitzgerald, helped Cork overcome Tipperary 2-18 to 0-10 amid sweltering conditions in the All-Ireland final.

'We're after having a good winter, recuperated well and ready to go again with the Cork minor camogle squad for 2023,'

Jerry Wallace told The Southern Star.

'We've been working away for the last couple of months and trialling lots of players. I was very fortunate, along with my management team, to announce the panel for 2023 last weekend. Last Sunday, I also had the unfortunate task of having to contact 15 girls that had come down to the last cut but did not make it on to the final panel of 30.

"This year we have eight dual players involved and they will require careful [time] management. We have a very healthy panel at the moment. It includes 14 players from last year's Munster and All-Ireland championship-winning U16 panel. There are ten players from 2022's minor All-Ireland winning team. We've added six players that were U17 and didn't make last year's minor panel as well.

'So there is a very strong group of players ready to represent Cork at minor camogie level this year.'

There is a new All-Ireland camogic minor championship format for 2023. Cork will compete in a round-robin tournament where the top four ranked counties progress to the All-Ireland minor semi-finals.

Cork begin their minor championship with two road trips. Dublin are Jerry Wallace's side's first opponents on March 12th. That's followed by an equally difficult assignment away to Waterford seven days later. Tipperary visit Leeside in the third round of the minor A championship on March 26th before Cork take on arch rivals Kilkenny on April 2nd. The Rebels complete their round-robin fixture-list against the county they defeated for last year's title, Galway, on April 15th/16th.

Should Cork accrue enough points, they will contest an All-Ireland minor semi-final on April 22nd/23rd. This year's

minor All-Ireland decider is pencilled in for the weekend of May 6th/7th.

'Wexford, Limerick, Clare and Antrim withdrew from this year's minor A grade,' Jerry Wallace explained.

Those counties would always have been involved in tier 1 since I first got involved back in 2018. They have all elected to play tier 2 this coming year.

So the Camogie Association have put all remaining tier I teams into the one group for 2023. Each of us will play one another once before the semi-finals and final.

'It's fabulous to have this new format because, as a Cork camogie minor player, if you are good enough, you will play a minimum of five All-Ireland championship games. There are semi-finals and possibly a final to play too.

'Everyone involved in the Cork camogie minor setup is excited and looking forward to the challenges that lie ahead.'

Caoimhe Carmody and Aine O'Loughlin scored goals in either half to help Clare see off Kilkenny, who had overturned a 1-5 to 0-4 interval deficit to lead at the threequarter mark thanks to points form Denise Gaule and Miriam Walsh.

That makes the Clare triumph all the more worthy, as they stepped up their resis-tance and O'Loughlin's goal secured the verdict for new boss John Carmody.

On Saturday, a stunning fourth-minute goal from joint captain Karen Kennedy sent Tipp on their way and Róisin Howard and Courtney Ryan also raised green flags to make it 3-6 to 1-3 at the break. Carrie Dolan found the net fortuitously from a long-distance free for a Galway side that has ladies football and AFLW legend Cora Staunton as performance coach this year.

Cathal Murray's crew were

benefits of it. There might be a game that's very tight in the last 10 minutes - I'm thinking of the Munster final last year, the crowd really got behind us and it does make a difference so we're delighted that they keep coming to the

Cork opened up their Very Camogie League Division IA campaign with a convincing rout of Dublin (3-17 to 0-5) last weekend, and the Rebels host Clare in Páire Uí Rinn on Saturday, but will be without both Katrina Mackey and Enniskeane's Orla Cronin.



Camogie Association drops plans to change its brand

The Camogie Association's highly anticipated plans to rebrand the organisation, on foot of a major sponsorship investment by Carmel Naughton and Glen Dimplex last year, has been shelved.

The association went to market last September inviting tenders for a "review of the current brand identity and development of a clear tagline which meets our ambitious goals (as an organisation which) competes above its weight in the sporting land-

A key challenge for the board was outlined as one which must engage with younger audiences while ensuring that the traditions and history of the body prevail.

While eager to keep its current corporate identity, the Camogle Association told prospective tenders that it wanted a new logo to attract that key younger audience, and a tagline, along with a suite of corporate brand

guidelines. The key timelines for the rebranding of the Camogie Association were due to be

October 10 for submission, with the selection of a shortlist of agencies by October 24, from which the successful candidate would be se-

The final designs and submissions was due on December 2 before an unspecified launch date. However, the Camogie Association contacted applicants in recent days to advise that it had made the "difficult decision not to progress with a full rebrand at this time".

The reason given for the sudden ending of the plan was down to a series of unspecified changes within the organisation and its work environ-

The rebrand of the organisation coincided with the end of camogie's first season of a seven-year deal with Glen Dimplex and its key stake-holder Carmel Naughton, which was activated at the beginning of last season.

When asked if Glen Dimplex had any input around the ending of the rebrand the company did not respond, although such involvement would be most unusual.

McCarthy's Cork teammate, All-Star defender Laura Treacy added that the trip was 'a decision made without consulting players or the GPA.'

With the All-Ireland camogie championship expected to start in early June, players taking part in the All-Star tour land home on May 25th, so will miss vital preparations ahead of the championship. Cork manager Matthew Twomey described the scheduling as 'farcical' and 'embarrassing'.

Cork All-Star Ashling Thompson has also noted that the Munster camogie championship takes place at the end of May so the All-Star tour cuts across it.

'Very disappointing to be missing out on this oncein-a-lifetime trip. We feel extremely let down by our own association. How can we leave our teammates in the middle of championship preparation when we wouldn't have an All-Star without them?' Cork AllStar Laura Hayes said.

"We were all happy on Sunday and we'd gym then on Monday so there was definitely a positive atmosphere after a positive start to the season," Spillane details. THE Galway senior camogie team bounced back impressively from their opening round loss to Tipperary by defeating All-Ireland champions Kilkenny at Nowlan Park on Saturday. The Tribeswomen clicked from the outset and were deserving winners, outplaying the home side for long spells of this game.

It was clear that Galway were a different team from the start of this contest, and the flatness which characterised their performance against Tipperary was noticeably absent. They played with high energy and intensity and put Kilkenny under pressure from an early stage.

Points from Ailish O'Reilly and Carrie Dolan gave Cathal Murray's side an early lead before Kilkenny opened their account with a point from Julianne Malone. Dolan pointed her first free two minutes later, before Malone's second score made it 0-3 to 0-2.

The visitors then hit three consecutive points, through Dolan (0-2, one free), and Aoife Donohue. Some excellent link up play by the Galway forwards was evident in the lead up to each of these scores, reflecting a level of sharpness which was absent against Tipperary.

Denise Gaule soon got her first score for Kilkenny from the left wing, before Aine Keane responded for Galway with a terrific individual score. Galway's work rate was highly impressive throughout the field as they forced Kilkenny into turnovers and dominated the middle third, where Ciara Hickey and Niamh Hanniffy were prominent.

Kilkenny narrowed the margin with points from Asha McHardy, and Gaule (free), before Sabina Rabbitte got her name on the scoresheet three minutes later. Rabbitte impres sively won a turnover before pointing from long range to make it 0-8 to 0-5.

The sides traded 0-2 each before the half time break. Michaela Kenneally and Katie Power tallied scores for the Cats, before O'Reilly and Dolan (free) concluded the first half scoring to leave it at 0.10 to 0.7

were treated to some excellent half time entertainment from the under 12s of Oranmore-Maree and Kiltullagh-Killimordaly, who were involved in exhibition games against local teams Tullaroan and Rower Inistinge.

Linda Mellerick inducted into Hall of Fame

The Gaelic Writers awards saw four new inductees into the GWA Hall of Fame, among them our own camogie correspondent Linda Mellerick.

The GWA scheme, in association with EirGrid, recognises the extraordinary contribu-tion of players to Gaelic games in all four codes.

Linda was the winner of six All-Ireland medals with Cork and was one of the most influential players in the history of camogie. She was one of only four Cork players on the camogie team of the century in 2004 where she was joined by her club-mates Sandie Fitzgibbon and fellow Corkonions Marie

Costine and Pat Moloney, In what was a fantastic club career she won eight Cork County Senior Championships medals, three All-Ireland Club Championship medals as well as Munster club and All-Ireland Sevens with Glen Rovers, whom she joined in 1986 having played underage with Brian Dillon's. She captained the Glen to the 1996 county against Imokilly to record a seven-in-a-row, matching the club's record from 1962-68.

Her inter-county career spanned 21 years, she captained Cork to All-Irelands in 1993 and 1997, won 10 leagues. She also won minor and junior All-Irelands and four Gael Linn Interprovincial titles.

Linda was actually born in Tipperary but moved to Cork at a very young age where she attended St Patrick's school at CAMOGIE

Gardiner's Hill. It was there she decided to try out camogle. A superb athlete she had a

unique style and covered every blade of grass. She stood out in the days when helmets with

her boundless energy. Her skill matched that workrate, always available to help team-mates in defence or at-tack. Her trademark solo runs were legendary while her spirit and leadership qualities made her a special player.

It was nothing to Linda to finish shift work and come straight to training with Cork and Glen Rovers. She became the only player to captain Cork to win All-Ireland senior titles on two occasions in 1993 and 1997. She was also Player of the Year in 1993 and 1998

Retirement was on the horizon in 1997 but she returned for five more years and eventually hung up her boots in 2002 after winning her sixth All-Ireland medal, two years before the introduction of the Camogie All-Stars scheme.

In recent years Linda has carved out a new role off the playing field, reporting on games for The Echo and contributing a hugely popular and honest weekly column.

I am honoured to have her as a colleague at club and media level but most of all as a friend. Well done Linda, it was hugely deserved.

THE modern-day player's voice must grow louder to question demands made by governing bodies and associations.

Cork's Ashling Thompson

is one of Cork's camogie stars to hit out at the date of the All Stars tour.

In recent years, there has been an increasing trend of sports personalities amateur and professional - speaking out against their governing bodies if they felt they have been unfairly treated.

The current All-Star camogie tour issue is a prime example.

The Camogie Association's decision to sanction a 2023 PwC Camogie All-Star tour to Calgary, Alberta, Canada, from May 19-25 drew an instant response from the affected Cork senior players.

Asking inter-county players (not just from Cork) to embark on a trans-Atlantic trip and return only a week before the start of the All-Ireland championship is a

head-scratching decision.

Ashling Thompson likes to do her talking out on the pitch. So whenever the All-Ireland winner and All-Star midfielder comments about an off-field situation, Thompson's pedigree and experience mean her words carry extra weight.

'How could you expect seven players to turn their back on their team-mates at probably the most important time of the year leading up to championship. We wouldn't have All-Stars only for our teammates," Thompson told the Irish Exam-

We are looking to be the one association. That's the goal. We are constantly looking for equality. How can you look for equality when it doesn't come from the top down? How can you possibly look for equality when women don't support women?

Katrina Mackey and Laura Hayes also voiced their frustrations as did other Cork players via their personal social media accounts. In the interim, the GPA contacted the Camogie Association to discuss the possibility of rescheduling the trip.

Thompson, her Cork team-mates and

manager Matthew Twomey had little choice but to come out and voice their displeasure. What else could they do with a decision that will wreak havoc with the county's championship preparations?

In the past, there was a perception that players should refrain from expressing

opinions against governing bodies. The Cork GAA football strike of 2007-08 and hurling strike of 2008-09 showed what can happen when a complete breakdown of trust between players and a county board occurs.

So whether they like it or not, Cork Camogie and LGFA inter-county players in 2023 are also role models and public ambassadors for their chosen sports.

Nowadays, there is pressure, not alone to perform to the best of your ability on the pitch but also to defend your fellow players' rights.

That's why it is imperative the likes of Thompson, and other high-profile figures continue to speak out against perceived inequalities. At the very least, those voices spark change and draw attention to important issues.

Cork's current camogie and football players have a unique platform compared media, the likes of Thompson, Mackey, Hayes, and others have multiple avenues in which to express their views to a wider audience. Social media gives players the power to amplify their message and make an impact like never before.

Cork's players, albeit amateurs, also have a responsibility to future generations to ensure that the sport they are dedicating their lives to remains as equitable as possible.

If they see injustice or discrimination

within their sport, it is their responsibility to speak out and advocate for change. By doing so, they are setting an example for future generations off ladies football and camogie players to follow.

It is not just amateur players in this country that are raising their voices and having their opinions heard.

Welsh rugby averted a crisis following contract wrangling about a new six-year financial agreement between the WRU governing body and players representing four Welsh regional teams. The unknown status of Welsh players' contracts meant uncertain futures and so a strike appeared likely.

Concessions were made to the Welsh players, but only at the 11th hour following a series of talks

Last weekend's Wales and England Six Nations encounter was in doubt but went ahead. Yet the scars left behind between the WRU and their country's players will take a long time to heal.

Similarly, the concern for camogie and LGFA players is that decisions like the recent All-Star one are only going to in-crease amid a crowded split-season intercounty calendar.

I've no doubt that each of the nominated camogie All-Stars (from the 2021 and 2022 seasons) were looking forward to the trip

I've no doubt each of those players ould rather be fielding questions Canada rather than how they could possibly prepare for an All-Ireland championship seven days after stepping off a longhaul flight.

Irrespective of if or when the tour goes ahead, the last fortnight has been a timely reminder of the delicate relationship that exists between players and governing

Let's hope future generations have someone like Ashling Thompson to speak up when necessary.

Studies are being carried out and there is information linking the issue with physiology (e.g. different pelvic width), the smaller size of women's ACLs, core strength, and possibly even menstrual cycles. There's tracking now on how people are feeling day to day, which I think is a big thing, because it is fairly evident that it's an issue among women something that needs

to be factored into the playing and training.

"It is coming from the older girls to the younger girls now, to let management know if it's the case, if you aren't feeling 100% and that's accepted now. I'm sure there's loads more research will be done and will start to come into play."

ORK sit on top of Division

O'Brien continued to lead the line brilliantly up front for Tipperary and she fired in a quickfire 1-1 at the beginning of the final period to leave the sides deadlocked, Róisin Howard finding a deft pass to pick out O'Brien.

Both sides were unbeaten before yesterday and were level at 1-8, 1-9 and 1-10 apiece before Cork struck two in a row with Emma Murphy grabbing the pick of the pair. Despite their best efforts, Tipp were unable to regain parity with Keating grabbing the final score of the game in the 67th minute to seal

a crucial win for Cork.

All-Ireland champions Kilkenny breathed some life into their fading hopes of squeezing into the top two and reaching a league final by overcoming Dublin 0-17 to 0-11 at Parnell Park.

With 54 minutes gone, Kilkenny's lead was down to just three points,



0-14 to 0-11, after an Aisling Maher score for the Dubs opened the door to a late smash-and-grab finish from Gerry McQuaid's charges, but Kilkenny finished strongly with the last three points of the tie.

The contest shifted in Cork's favour following a mesmerising run by Cahalane

Maher produced a terrific display for the beaten side but Dublin struggled to break down a resolute Kilkenny rearguard in the opening half. Maher fired in all four of her side's points in the first 30 minutes, just one of those coming from play. Kilkenny, meanwhile, were able to call upon the reliable Denise Gaule to punish any indiscipline, with 0-3 from Laura Murphy helping the Cats lead 0-9 to 0-4 at the break.

Although Asha McHardy and Gaule helped Kilkenny keep Dublin at arm's length, Aisling O'Neill and Maher kept the home side in the hunt, ensuring a tight finish.

In the west-coast derby at Kilbeacanty, seven points off the stick of Carrie Dolan and a Shannon Corc-

oran goal proved decisive as Galway secured a 1-14 to 0-13 win over Clare, despite a strong second half fightback from the Banner.

Galway led 1-9 to 0-4 at the break after hitting 1-4 on the bunce in the final 10 minutes of the opening half. Dolan grabbed four first-half points for Galway, three from frees, as last year's All-Ireland semi-finalists appeared to be in complete control.

Even though Clare Hehir and Lorna McNamara hit back for Clare, two Dolan scores kept Galway 1-11 to 0-6 in front, suggesting a comfortable win for the reigning league champions. Meanwhile, in Division 1B, Waterford secured a facile 3-24 to 2-6 win over Limerick, while their neighbours Wexford completed a double. The senior side picked up a 2-17 to 0-9 win over Down after their intermediates defeated Galway earlier in the afternoon.

Finally, a huge second-half performance from Antrim helped them salvage a draw against Offaly in Banagher.

The Saffrons came from 2-7 to 1-2 down at the break to salvage a 2-8

Last season Cork participated in Division 2A and made it to the semi-final where they lost to Antrim, but having competed in a group that saw them play five games against Wexford, Kildare, Derry, Meath, and Galway it was a most competitive campaign and one that helped in no small way with championship preparations.


