Last year Sandie Fitzgibbon was voted The Echo Rebel Legend winner, as Cork's most loved sporting personality of the past 50 years. Andrew Horgan talks to Sandie about her remarkable career.

THE scale of the achievement should not be underestimated.

Standing in the way between her and The Echo Rebei Legends glory was none other than Billy Morgan in the last 32, Denis Irwin in the last 16, Robert Heffernan in the quarter-finals, Roy Keane in the semi-finals and

then Rena Buckley in the final. But typical of her sporting career, she overcame the toughest of obstacles to come out victorious in the public vote to decide the best Leeside sportstar of the modern era.

And typical of her personality, she accepted the award with the greatest humility when she finally got her hands on it in *The Echo* office recently, almost a year on from the conclusion of the competition.

"I think it was like a political campaign at some slave with my states."

paign at some stage with my sisters to be fair, they were ringing everyone to be voting," she laughs. "I did play two sports (camogie and basketball) but I played soccer as well so I had a lot of contacts and I did make a lot of

friends.

"I played basketball up the country so as far as I'm aware they were voting as well so I had a lot of support behind me. "It was a great initiative by The Echo because we were all missing sport and we were all missing discussions and this was a his discussion point for a number of a big discussion point for a number of people throughout the course of the

It was a huge honour. There was fierce excitement and it did give us

something to do for those three weeks and it generated a lot of interest in the city in particular.

"There was a lot of big names in it and the excitement of waking up the next morning to see did I get through... it was something to look forward to."

This latest award will be in good company in the Fitzgibbon home and it will also face some stern competition for a place on the mantelpiece.

That's because during her illus-trious career, she played in 13 senior All-Ireland camogie finals with Cork

winning six.


At club level, she began playing with Glen Rovers as a nine-year-old and won her first All-Ireland minor medal in 1978 at the age of 14. She would go on to claim 10 Cork senior medals with the Glen including the seven-in-a-row between 1990 and

Fitzgibbon also has eight Munster Senior Championship medals and just to round off her club career she won four Senior All-Ireland medals in 1988, 1990, 1992, and 1993.

And that's just her camogie career. Sandie was also a basketball star and she more than played her part in the North Presentation School's All-Ire-

land Cadet title win in 1978. Then at senior level, she helped Blarney win four National League titles and three National Cups, while she also played with Lee Strand in

Tralee where she added another national league and cup to her honours list during her three years with the Kerry club.

"I was very lucky in my career that I played with great players," admits Fitzgibbon, modestly, "I enjoyed both of those sports. I actually enloyed soccer as well. If I could have played the three of them together I would have. I did at one stage but I had to give up the soccer eventually just because it was taking up too much time.

We had a great team again with Blarney as well. At one stage we won the four main trophies in one year and that year was phenomenal yet that year we could have lost the league because they changed the format. It didn't go down to points anymore, it went down to the top two teams playing each other in a final.

So even though we were 10 points ahead in the league, we went in and played Tralee and it went to extra time. So we could've lost the league which would have been a really big shame because we beat every team that time.

"I had great commitment from myself because I loved sport, anything I do I would give full commitment and sports was my life really as such, I loved it.

"I was just lucky really with the teams that I played with, a lot of people had the same mentality as myself - great commitment - and that generates good teams, we were very lucky.

"I was out seven days a week, seven nights. I was lucky in one respect that basketball was in the offseason to the camogie season. There were clashes at the end and the start of each season because we were doing so well in camogie that it did run into the basketball season.

"There were a lot of times when I had to train twice a night as well so it took a lot of commitment but I loved

it so it wasn't too much of a toll.

"When I was growing up I was always playing on the street. I was always very active so that did help me going into my career when it was a lot more intense." But her sporting career did also have its tough moments as she was a member of the Cork side that lost six All-Ireland finals in a row before they finally ended that run in 1992 with Fitzgibbon leading the way as captain.
"It was really hard," she admits.

"Every year as a player you always go out with the intention of winning and you always feel the games that you lose you didn't do yourself justice, the team didn't do itself justice.

"So each year you come back and say 'this year we are going to do it, this year we are going to give our-

selves justice'. "But as the years went on we were saying 'are we ever going to do it? Are we ever going to get over the bane of our lives?' At that time Kilkenny had

a brilliant team, a brilliant team. They had big players all over the pitch, especially the main parts of the pitch and when we did eventually beat them - we actually beat them in the semi-final up in Nolan Park - that game was exciting. "We didn't even know where we

were on the pitch, what time of the match it was. The score was so high, there was a high number of goals, a high number of points everyone was saying 'Who's winning? Who's win-ning? Who's winning?' We didn't even know who was winning.

"At the end, we scored a cracker of a goal and we won, it was just excellent altogether and we went on, of course, to beat Wexford in the final and I was the captain which capped it off, capped it off altogether."

And what made her achievements on the pitch, or on the court, more, remarkable was that the conditions behind the scenes were hardly catered to maximize performance.

It's hard to fathom in these modern times when the playing surfaces are pristine and the athletes are generally well taken care of what the likes of Fitzgibbon and her teammates had to tolerate in the not too distant past.

"For camogie, if you went up and played a national league game, we often changed on the side of the road because there were no dressing rooms," says Fitzgibbon. "The county might have got a loan of a pitch off somebody so we would've went there, played the game, then came home without a shower.

"Sometimes I think how did we do that at all? It was just the way it was at the time, it was accepted by everyone, all women in sport were in that

"When I initially joined the mi-

nors, which was U16 at the time, we had to buy our own t-shirts. The white t-shirts. We were given the red skirts and the red stockings but we had to buy our own t-shirt.

"I turned up once with a t-shirt that had 'Up Cork' written on it so they wouldn't let me play with it. I had to swap with someone else so I

But arguably the definitive period to show Fitzglbbon's level of commitment and sheer love for the sports she played came in October 1990. "The first thing that happened is I was playing a National League game

in Ballina with Blarney and my friend Rose Mackey drove me up there," she begins, "Then we travelled over the border the next day because we were playing the club semi-final.

We played there then she drove me to Dublin. I met up with the Irish team and we flew to New York on the Monday and we played six games

"We were there for about 10 days. Then I came back and I joined training on the Wednesday with the club and I played the All-Ireland final on the Sunday. It was hectic, hectic alto-

There is little doubt when hearing her speak about it in The Echo offices, that she would do it all again in a heartbeat.

In Cork, we are truly blessed with the level of athletes that this county has produced over the years and this award could have gone to any of the 32 that made the shortlist.

But after numerous rounds and almost 40,000 votes cast, Sandie Fitzgibbon's incredible career was deservedly honoured with an achievement that should not be underestimated.

MATTHEW Twomey's reign as new Cork senior camogie manager began with a victory away to Clare at a storm-ridden Cusack Park last Sunday in the Littlewoods Ireland Division 1 Group B League.

Before reporting on a hardearned Cork win, the question must be asked about the validity of the game going ahead despite a Status Orange wind warning for Clare that same afternoon.

The elements dictated the outcome in which, at times, the wind was so strong that the sliotar hung in the air. Both teams knuckled down and got on with a game in which the hosts led 0-4 to 0-3 at the break having played with a gale wind at their

Impressively, Cork held Clare scoreless in the second period and added 2-6 to claim their first league points. Cork boss Twomey was delighted with the result but acknowledged that conditions were a concern before throw-in.

'We are delighted with the win but conditions were unbelievable,' the Cork senior manager told The Southern Star.

'We stopped in Cratloe on the way to Cusack Park and there was no way we could see

the game being played at that stage. Even pucking around before the game, the girls couldn't reach each other with 30-yard passes. It was insanity:

The pitch was in good shape alright but if you asked me before the game should it have gone ahead? From a safety perspective, no way, but when it did get the go ahead we were just delighted to get the result."

Cork began with a full-back line made up of Meabh Murphy and two dual players who togged out for the county's footballers the evening before at Croke Park, Libby Cop-pinger and Meabh Cahalane. Izzy O'Regan, Laura Hayes and Amy O'Connor points kept Cork in touch at the end of a first half in which Chloe Morey (free), Eimear Kelly and two Aine O'Loughlin scores edged Clare a point ahead.

Amy O'Connor (free) and newcomer from county Down, Sorcha McCartan, pushed Cork in front prior to a terrific Katle O'Mahoney effort making it 0-7 to 0-4 early in the second period. Next, McCartan, who has been based in Cork since last year and plays her club camogie with St Finbarr's, marked an eye-catching debut with a converted penalty before Amy O'Connor completed the scor-

ing with a well taken goal. It finished 2-6 to 0-4 and Matthew Twomey was delighted with both the result and performance as well as Sorcha McCartan's contribution.

'We were very happy with Sorcha and she is going to be a huge addition to our panel," Twomey stated. 'She took her penalty very well. Cork had three debutantes today. Sorcha, Katie O'Mahoney and Meabh Murphy as well. The three of them did very, very well. We were very impressed with all three players which was another bonus out of the game.'

One downside to Cork's preparations for their league opener was the loss of Fiona Keating to injury. Ciara O'Sullivan, who played well, replaced Keating after the Courcey Rovers star suffered a broken hand earlier in the week.

'Unfortunately, Fiona broke her hand in training last Thursday night,' the Cork manager explained.

Fiona will be out for a minimum of six weeks now. She will be a huge loss to us. The Kildare game would have been an ideal one for her as she works so hard. We just have to get on with it and hope she makes a speedy recovery.

'We are trying to build a panel for the All-Ireland championship and have close to two or three players for each position now.' Cork host Limerick in their next league outing this Saturday, 26th, and finish off their Group 2 campaign with a tantalising clash at home to the side they defeated in last

AFTER what were excellent and exciting third-level com-petitions where the Ashbourne, Purcell, and Meagher Cup competitions reached their conclusion, two players from UCC were named on the third-level All Star team of

UCC fielded two teams this year and in what was an historic first, the second team took the Meagher Cup.

The naming of the team on Monday was a huge honour for Glen Rovers player Emma Murphy, who took the number 14 jersey after an impressive Ashbourne campaign where her side lost at semifinal level to DCU in a game that went to extra time, and she was the only player from the UCC side to be selected.

Cork should secure points

CORK and Limerick meet in round two of the Littlewoods league campaign in Páirc Uí Chaoimh today, ahead of the men's football clash with Galway.

Despite Cork being determined to put out their strongest team, they fielded without five of last year's All-Ireland starting 15 last weekend, and with the likelihood that it'll be something similar again today, you would still expect them to take the points in the Páirc, 3pm. Just once across the last 16 years has

Limerick advanced beyond the group stages of the championship. 2019 remains the only time Limerick reached the knockout stages since 2005.

Their manager Pat Ryan felt last season that belief is their Achilles heel. "It's be-lief, it's totally about belief with Limerick camogie," stressed Ryan at the time. "There is a belief issue there, they are well capable of putting it up to anyone when they hurl.

In a major re-shuffle, Limerick named a new-look panel for 2022. A list of 45 players have been announced, which includes an extended number as part of the county development squad. In total 19 clubs are represented. It's a very much new-look Limerick panel. Eight players who saw action during the All-Ireland championship last year are not involved, some familiar names and still very much in their playing years, such as Laura Stack and Karen O'Leary. Former Tipper-ary manager John Lillis is at the helm this season. Limerick lost their opening league game to Kilkenny, 1-18 to 1-10.

Tipperary have started their league campaign very impressively. They may have been playing weaker opposition in Down and Offaly but on both occasions, they notched up 3-16 and 4-21 and this without the services of Karen Kennedy, Orla O'Dwyer and Caoimhe Burke, I've said it before that if Aishling Moloney gave her first playing choice to camogie,

Tipperary would be a huge threat to the inter-county level. Then, just last wee top three. As it stands, she injured her kend, the placing of Slaughtneil of Derry cruciate ligament last summer and it's unknown if she will line out for Tipper-

ary's camogie team this season.
The 4,000 strong GPA and WGPA membership has appealed for a yes vote behind a motion regarding amalgamation of the GAA, LGFA and Camogie associations at Congress this weekend.

There's been talk about this for the past decade. But this weekend could be the real catalyst for change. I believe there isn't strong appetite in the LGFA for change. The camogie association are more open to it and at this point, in my opinion, they need it. There has been a significant drop in standards of administration in the past two years.

We were without a championship sponsor in 2021 and to date, no sponsor has been announced for the 2022 campaign. With an almost 100% vote for amalga-mation from the GPA/WGPA, the players body has moved on the widespread approval with their motion submission and this weekend could be a truly defining moment. This just has to happen. Every season, on multiple occasions we witness crazy clashes and ultimatums being issued to dual players, at both club and

and Sarsfields of Galway to Gorey in Wex ford for their All-Ireland semi-final clash as there was no other facility available to the camogie association.

It was perfect timing in one sense to remind people ahead of congress of the mind-boggling and utterly unfair treatment female GAA players endure.

This isn't an easy decision for the LGFA or the camogic association. There is fear in change, and this is a whopper. The camogie association is in existence since 1904 and has done a fantastic job. The LGFA was mangured in more times, 1974, and their membership has rocketed in recent years.

Both organisations have CEOs, executives and administrators. Where will they sit post amalgamation? Will both associations find themselves playing second fiddle to their male counterparts under the one umbrella? Will they lose their autonomy? To dissolve two massive organisations and bring them under a giant that is the GAA is an enormous ask and task. But it seems to be getting harder to put in on the long finger and avoid it. Almost every player across all codes wants it. There's no longer anywhere to hide.

ONE of Cork's most experienced camogie players, Laura Treacy, was happy after her side's comprehensive league win over Limerick on Saturday.

AA president Larry McCarthy says patience will be required as the organisation commences the process to amalgamate with the Ladies Gaelic Football and Camogie Associations.

As a Gaelic Players Association's motion calling on the GAA to prioritise integration with its sister bodies received almost 90% support at Congress on Saturday, McCarthy revealed work has begun on further aligning the organisations

Two of the three parties have already consulted with Iggy O Muircheartaigh who oversaw the unification of the Golfing Union of Ireland and the Irish Ladies Golf Union to become Golf Ireland last year. The remaining group will speak to him soon.

McCarthy also highlighted tht integration forms one of the tenets in the GAA's new five-year strategic plan, "Towards One GAA For All", which will be released in the coming weeks. However, speaking at a post-Congress press conference, he warned the timeline for the completion of integration will be measured in years.

"Corporate entities can come together relatively quickly but you have three different cultural associations coming together. It's going to take time and it's not going to happen as quickly as people will want it to happen.'

With integration motions on the Clar of forthcoming LGFA and Camogie Association congresses, the GPA have called for all three organisations to issue a press release declaring their full intentions

to work together.

GPA chief executive Tom Parsons believes the end goal can be achieved quicker than expected: "What we need immediately is a joint commitment statement and that is something we would like to see in 2022 and that in the respective congresses next year there is a motion that speaks to integration and significant work being done.

"Players want to see significant equality achieved in 12, 18, 24 months so that it is within their careers. Even looking at five or 10 years, too many

playing careers are ended by then. The rate of change we see in the world today in organisations and even the rate of change of something that is so significant in the football structures over a period of four months ... I think if this is a priority and there are good people brought around this, it

can move very quickly. Duing the floor debate, Cork Central Council delegate Tracey Kennedy stressed "it's no longer acceptable to have separate organisations" while highlighting that one only need to look around at the

male-dominated floor of Congress to realise that change has to happen.

Former GAA president Liam O'Neill, who had approached the LGFA about concentrating amalgamation efforts during his presidency in the mid-2010s, spoke on Saturday about the need to forget the past. McCarthy said he had no such experience of difficulty with the LGFA, who were in attendance at Congress in Bekan, while Maria Kinsella, co-chair of the GPA's national executive, said if the female body has concerns about merging, they should reveal them.

'If LGFA are not in favour. they need to come out and say why and be transparent, I think they also need to listen to their membership because from what I am hearing, the grassroots and a lot of people in the LGFA are in favour of it.

'I can relate to a lot of those fears that the LGFA or Camogie Association have. But there are a number of measures that can be built into the constitution, the board diversification that can protect the female voice in

this, that it's not going to be the GAA consuming two female associations, that's not for the betterment of the games, that isn't what this is about.

In his address to Congress, McCarthy said facilities would be a major challenge in the integration process and highlighted the example of Connacht GAA and the development of more cost-effective domes such as the one which hosted Congress.

He confirmed afterwards that he has spoken to Minister of State for Sport Jack Chambers about the matter. The next round of large infrastructure grants are going to come out, I guess, in October or at least the application process and I said we should consider those in that process. He's a politician and he said 'yes' and that's as far as it's gone. Maybe there will be a dividend from Croke Park this year and we might be able to allocate some of that to those

Meanwhile, the likes of Cork and Galway are set to be the biggest benefactors from the GAA's new coaching and games development mechanism. Largely based on player populations (60%), the model will benefit those counties with most registered footballers and hurlers.

Cliona Healy added two points, one from a free, before Cork's forwards demonstrated their undoubted quality with a superbly crafted Amy O'Connor goal after five minutes.

Limerick struggled to contain their opponents although Michelle Curtin found room to get her side on the scoreboard. That was about as good as it got for the visitors, as Cork moved up through the gears and increased their lead. A magnificent Sorcha McCartan goal made it 2-3 to 0-1 before a rampant Cork added four more points via Aishling Thompson, Amy O'Connor and the excellent Healy (two).

Caoimhe Lyons reduced the deficit with Limerick's second score but Cork heaped further misery on the Shannonsiders with another Thompson point preceding Amy O'Connor's second goal. Izzy O'Regan found the net shortly after and then Cliona Healy raised Cork's fifth green flag just before the break. Michelle Curtin notched Limerick's third point to end a completely one-sided first half with Cork 5-8 to 0-3 ahead. The points safely in the bag, Cork saw out a pedestrian second half - highlighted by Chloe Sigerson coming off the bench to score 0-3 - before running out comfortable 5-17 to 0-6 winners.

It's been a special period in Ursula Jacob's life,

GETTING MARRIED between appearances in All-Ireland finals wouldn't be an unusual occurrence generally, but when a mere 78 days separate those two national title deciders, throwing nuptials into the mix might finish off weaker-minded people. Ursula Jacob hasn't blinked.

"It all worked out pretty okay," she explained. "Both myself and Stacey Kehoe were keeping each other going because we obviously knew the further along we were going with the games, the closer it was getting to both our weddings.

"I have massive admiration for Stacey and Shelley because I probably would have struggled that little bit more to play an All-Ireland the day after my wedding. To them it didn't seem to faze them at all, their performances really shone through.

"Obviously I had the element of cutting back on numbers which was probably the little bit of stress in advance of my wedding but look, I tried to put things into perspective. At the end of the day I'm getting married and my close family and friends were all there.

"It was a really special time and (I) probably haven't fully reflected on everything, yet, but it's definitely going to be a very special time of my life. Both from a camogie point of view and from a personal point of view, December 2021 was magical in many ways really."

That lack of time to dwell on lifetime moments comes down to the fact that another key day is approaching this weekend. The AIB All-Ireland Club Senior camogie championship final is back in Croke Park, as important as it always is for Oulart-The

It takes so much work to get to this point that it's easy to take their achievement for granted. Unlike their opponents Sarsfields, they had to win their province too. And it provided by far the biggest scare for this dream-like run they are a collective part of right now.

"It's funny," Ursula said, "we've all seen the clip back where the Dicksboro player got inside and had the chance to take the shot on Lauren (Sinnott). Credit to Lauren, a massive save from her.

"Tremember I was out probably around the '45 at that stage, I was out around centre-forward. I remember watching on, you know when you are watching something and you can't do anything about it, you can't change it?

"It's not like I could sprint the length of the field, you just had to witness it happen and unfold and thankfully we got that little bit of luck. And Lauren, who is a very brave goalkeeper, she will always stand up to it in fairness to her, thankfully we got though it.

"I think we were always going to be a little nervy in that game. We didn't have a Leinster semi-final going into it, I do think Dicksboro were that bit sharper in the Leinster final.

"Maybe our touch was a little bit off. We worked hard on that in the three weeks prior to the semi-final and I think it did stand to us. Our hurling, despite the conditions, got us through that game last week."

That game was a muck-fest in Clonmel against Scariff/Ogonnelloe that did produce surprisingly good play, given the underfoot conditions and strong wind.

"It was a massive performance," Ursula said. "To be honest, when I got up on Sunday morning and saw the weather, then when we even arrived in Clonmel, I said to myself this is going to be under pressure in terms of the game actually going ahead. Thankfully it did.

"It's a tricky one, when you haven't played a team before like Scariff, you know a lot about them but you have never directly played against them. We knew it was going to be a big battle, I don't think the scoreline reflects how tough the game was.

"Obviously we got some vital scores in the first-half and got that bit of a lead, but we kind of said to ourselves at half-time,

we need to push on now.
"And I think probably our second-half

performance was that little bit more impressive.

"Obviously our backs were very solid again. Our midfield, Anais and Stacey, covered a lot of ground and our forwards worked extremely hard, even the girls that came on were pushing for places.

"I think our use of the ball in the second-half when we had to carry it against the wind, I think that was the most standout for me because you couldn't just hit the ball up the field and hope for the best, you had to be accurate, intent on where you were hitting it."

It will need to be that good and maybe more when Jacob and Co. face Sarsfields on Sunday. The Galway camogie stronghold are a talented bunch but will be looking to improve on their 25 per cent success rate in All-Ireland finals.

"This is obviously our second time playing them," Jacob said, "It's a bit mad that we never played them before the All-Ireland back in December, and now we are playing them in the space of two months really.

"I expect a huge battle, for it to go right down to the wire, there was very little between the two teams in the last final. You are trying to learn from that game as well.

"We came out on the right side of it in December but we have lots of areas we can work on and improve on.

"We'll be looking to push on from that as well. Even on our performance against Scariff, we'll have to take it up another notch in the final. Sarsfields have so much experience as well, they have lots of girls who have played in Croke Park.

"This is, what, their fifth final in six years, they are well used to the big stage as well as we are. I think it's going to be a massive battle.

"We are all really looking forward to it, we knew there wasn't going to be much between Slaughtneil and Sarsfields so we knew whichever one was going to come out on top, it was going to be a massive game.

"They are going to be gunning for us and looking for that little bit of revenge after losing the final in December. We are just focusing on ourselves and getting things right on our end."

Despite it being a fourth All-Ireland title on the line, it feels as special as ever for Jacob. She's relishing the opportunity to add another medal to the collection, to burn more classic battles won into the memory banks.

"To me, playing with Oulart-The Ballagh for 22-plus years at this stage, I've said it in advance of the semi-final, I've probably never enjoyed playing with Oulart-The Ballagh as much as in the last couple of years.

"Some people might say it's easy to say because you are winning but I don't know, there's something special about this group of players.

"There's something special about the bond we have with the management team, with even our supporters who are travelling every day.

"It just means so much to our community and parish, who are travelling every day, it does drive you on that bit more. We can only win one more on Sunday, that's the only guarantee.

"We are really, really looking forward to it. It would mean the world to us to win but we have worked so hard to get back here, we are just trying to embrace it all and look forward to it.

"It would be something special, there's no point in saying otherwise. Playing with your club will always be the ultimate pride for me and I'm privileged to play with such a brilliant group of girls.

"It's fair to say, I think it's been a real panel effort, every day there's someone different standing up when we needed it most.

"Whether it was Lauren in the Leinster final, or Anais or Stacey the last day or whoever, there's always someone there ready to back the other player up and I think that has stood to us going forward.

"It's going to be a huge game but it will be extra special if we can do it again on Sunday."



But Siobhan McGrath just turned the screw with some sensational points from play and frees in the second half, while all around her, women in green stood tall, not least the likes of Maria Cooney, Tara Kenny, Laura Ward,

Sarah Spellman, Niamh McGrath, and Orlaith McGrath.

DESPITE reaching the league final, which was the overriding goal of Matthew Twomey and his management team last wee-kend, I think the psychological win over Kilkenny in the Littlewoods national league semi-final goes way beyond that.

For a team with several newcomers, a win over a Kilkenny side that an experienced Cork team narrowly beat by a point in last year's All-Ireland semi-final, this win will boost their self-belief consider-

ably.
You could argue that Kilkenny manager Brian Dowling will equally take a number of positives from his side's win, most notably the fact that after Cork went four up, nded to take the lead entering additional time before Chloe Sigerson scored the decisive leveller with a free from about 50 yards.

Tipperary. The emerging star scored 1-3 of her side's winning total and will be an important player in this weekend's All-Ireland final.

I know the girls and everyone involved with the Cork minor team is proud because that semi-final win over Tipperary was one of those fabulous moments in sport and for Cork camogie, Cork minor manager Jerry Wallace told The Southern Star. 'Orlaith's (Cahalane) goal arrived at a very important juncture in the game for us. We have been contesting the elements this year including the underfoot conditions and the Tipperary game was exactly the same.

'In fairness to Orlaith, as she proved against Waterford and earlier in the campaign, she got a great goal and at an important moment in the game when our backs were against the wall.

'Looking ahead to this week-

A new backdoor system rather than the usual straight Munster camogie championship knockout format means Waterford must next play Limerick and the winners will face Cork in the provincial semi-finals on April 24th, From a West Cork point of view, having Amy Mc-Carthy and Newcestown's Alice Buckley involved with this year's Cork U16s represents a welcome boost for promoting camogie in the rural region.

'We know Amy McCarthy from being on last year's panel and she is a great player,' Cork U16 manager Donie Daly told The Southern Star earlier this year.

'Amy's club, Clonakilty camogie, is very strong right now. We know all about Amy from her competing at premier level, her speed and athleticism.

"This is still a step into the unknown for a lot of us. All the girls are new to this. We don't have any previous years (experience to go on either because of Covid. It is a case of learning as we go and preparing the team as best we can, to get them in the right frame of mind."

O'Flynn: Gender equality must be top of the GAA agenda

Former Camogie Association president Joan O'Flynn says gender equality within Gaelic games is the wider issue behind recent discussions about integration of the Gaelic games organisations — the GAA, the Camogie Association, and the LGFA.

"It's a case of 'what's your goal?" says O'Flynn.

"If the goal is gender equality in Gaelic games, if that's commonly shared and people can articulate what that means in everyday language—everyone understands that that's not going to happen just because you say it.

"That comes down to organisational values, decisionmaking processes within organisations, the culture in those organisations... a lot of today's female Gaelic games players are working in en-

vironments in which gender equality is a norm.

"So your day job is in an environment where there's a commitment to gender equality, but then you go up to a pitch and may have a different experience.

"This generation is ahead in terms of knowing what they want, to experience games in a gender-equal way, so it's up to the associations — all of the Gaelic games associations to make that happen.

"I'm not privy to what's precisely going on behind the scenes, so I'm not about to criticise particular organisations, but this is an issue which isn't intractable, or something nobody knows about, because it's happening in other areas of modern life as well. This is just the Gaelic games version."

O'Flynn points out that discussions about equality in

sport take place in a wider context also, one which links sport and public policy.

"Take the citizens' assembly model — there was a citizens' assembly on gender equality which published a report last year suggesting public funding for culture, arts, sports and media organisations should be contingent on published plans for gender equality within those organisations, and addressing issues around quotas and governing bodies

"The Government has its own sports action plan which says that governing bodies need to publish equality action plans and to achieve 40 per cent representation of each gender on their boards by the end of 2023.

"And in the last couple of weeks the European Commission published a report, Towards More Gender Equality

in Sport, which says much the same thing.

"There's a momentum, then, in public policy around making gender equality more centrally connected to public policy, and that's the kind of momentum that any sports governing body will have to take account of over the coming period, because everyone is talking about those kinds of frameworks for the next decade."

Hence O'Flynn's interest in equality compared to integration: "In terms of Gaelic games, a point worth making is that while a lot of the language has been around mergers and integration and so on, maybe the debate has now moved on and it needs to be more about equality now.

"The recent GPA motion picked up on that issue, ladies football had a motion on that and camogie will have a mo-

tion on that issue at its Congress next month.

"Gender equality means addressing certain things — is everyone on the same page and is there a common vision for it, how would the rules governing an organisation be different if that organisation is working towards more gender equality?

"I don't think anyone expects gender equality to happen overnight but what would help is to have a clear pathway towards that, a clear approach. And changes which reflect the integration of gender equality into the values of an organisation and the culture of an organisation.

"How does that conversation happen across Gaelic games, with the current imbalances that there are? There have been plenty of efforts around collaboration and cooperation — that's clearly the case at club level, there are double-headers and so on at inter-county level, all those things, but it's still segregated administration of sports, and Gaelic games is a bit of an outlier now in that regard.

"For instance, golf just went through a process to move itself towards greater integration, and gender equality was at the heart of that. You don't want to wait another 40 or 50 years for it to happen."



Camogie Association inks lucrative sponsorship deal

All-Ireland champions Galway have been paired with Kilkenny and avoided Cork but the headline news from Camogie's 2022 championship draws yesterday was an exciting five-year sponsorship agreement with philanthropist Carmel Naughton and the Glen Dimplex corporation her husband founded in the 1970s

Naughton played camogie in Monaghan as a young girl and a statement explained that she had now chosen to support the code in a philanthropic capacity, with branding rights associated with the sponsorship resting with joint sponsor Glen Dimplex.

"I have very fond memories of my years playing camogie. To me camogie is ultimately about community, teamwork, and how the energy, drive, and passion of a group of people can deliver such dividends that benefit both local and wider society.

Glen Dimplex is an Irishheadquartered international manufacturing group, which specialises in innovative lowcarbon electric heating, and ventilation solutions and is

owned by the Naughton family.

The five-year deal, up to 2027, is a huge boost for the sport and was warmly welcomed by the Camogie Association and camogie county boards, representing almost 600 clubs nationwide.

It was confirmed at yesterday's announcement that the senior championship semifinals will be held in Croke Park this July,

Glen Dimplex's Rowena McCappin said the company were delighted to be involved with the sponsorship of such a key sport in Ireland and highlighted the connection between Glen Dimplex and the Camogie Association.

"I see a synergy between Glen Dimplex's business and the Camogie Association, given the energy that is exuded on the camogic pitch, and the sport's role in inspiring and sustaining local communities. We're all, as a society, on a journey of sustainability for climate and com-

munity."
Hilda Breslin, of the Camo-gie Association, acknowl-edged the generous contributions of Naughton and Glen

Dimplex, and the commitment shown through signing a fiveyear deal. She also welcomed the significance of having an Irish-owned internationally recognised brand associated with the organisation.



Time to get in a room and talk out integration, says camogie boss

Camogie president Hilda Bres-lin will invite the presidents of the GAA and LGFA to sit at the one table and formally begin integration talks, should the latest integration motion be successfully passed at this weekend's Camogie Congress. Congress.

The motion put forward by the Camogie Association's Ard Chomhairle not only calls for an integrated Gaelic games organisation, but gender equity and equitable access to full participation in Gaelic games across all units of the organisation.

The GAA and LGFA have in recent weeks passed motions committing to one single governing body and should Camogie follow suit this weekend. Breslin will then seek to get all three association presidents in the one room to formally begin the integration process.

"We are all going to Congresses and coming up with aspirations, and they are won-derful and it is brilliant that we are talking about this. But the next step must be con-

"To me, the next step is the three presidents sitting down together, and that is what I will be calling for, if we get our mandate, that we sit down and put in place a formal mechanism to start this process,'

Breslin fold the Irish Examin-

er.
"It doesn't matter who puts
the invitation out there, but if
we get a mandate this weekend, we'll be putting the invitation to the other two

Breslin said the road to integration has arrived at a point where "a timeframe, a format, and a structure around how we are going to do it" is now

required.
"There are no guarantees this will work and there are also no guarantees the three associations will all decide this is what they want. But I think until we get the three associations into the room, we are all just talking at each other and not particularly with each other.

"So we have got to talk together, the three associations, and see if this is where we are going and put a timeframe and a structure around the talks.

"I have never known any integration or merger where everybody is sitting in separate rooms, and it works that way. Eventually, you have all got to get into the one room and talk it out."

Although not wishing to set any pre-conditions ahead of inviting the GAA and LGFA to the table, Breslin said it would make sense to have an independent chairperson overseeing integration talks.

Hilda Breslin: Is hoping to begin integration talks soon.

"We need someone independent of the three associations. We all come with our own hats on and you have got to have somebody that is going to challenge all of us in our thinking and challenge us to

say, why can't you do that. "It will be up to them, in some ways, to make sure we drive it on, put timescales around it, and are committed

"And if we are not committed to it, then they should equally be the ones to call it out and say, well actually they are not committed to it and this isn't going to work.

Breslin was adamant that she does not want this weekend's Camogie Congress to be a rubber-stamping exercise and would much prefer if delegates air whatever concerns they might barbour with regard to joining forces with the GAA and LGFA.

"Obviously, we are looking for the motion to be endorsed, but we very often say why we should do this, nobody ever comes out and says why we shouldn't do this, what are the concerns, what are the fears of people. We kinda leave all that hidden in the background. "I'd like to hear that from

"I'd like to hear that from the floor of Congress, I'd like people to be honest and say, what's their concern or what do they fear for camogle. We'd like a robust debate; we don't want a rubber-stamping exercise. This is really what we are looking for: To get a mandate where there are no pre-condi-tions and we don't go into talks saying, this is a red line for us, and this is a red line for someone else. Instead, we say, if we were to start today, what would we want and how do we get there.

Elsewhere, the Wexford senior camogie panel have written to the Camogie Association's fixtures committee to outline their "shock and disappointment" at the clash of fixtures this Sunday which means dual players Sarah Harding-Kenny and Ailis Neville will have to choose between the camogie team's Division 2 League semi-final against Waterford and the footballers' Division 3 final against Roscommon.

Both victories were at the expense of Galway and considering that the Tribe are the number one senior team in the country, it's good to be creating a bit of nervousness west of the island that the Rebels are on their heels with continuous talent coming through.

The minor achievement was tremendous and our congratulations to Jerry Wallace, Michael Boland, and the entire backroom team and panel. This is Cork's third title in four 'playing years', the 2020 competition not completed as Cork went in pursuit of three in a row.

What an experience for these players personally. And what a valuable experience it will be if Cork reach an All-Ireland
intermediate final. To already have the
experience of Croke Park's environment,
dressing room, hurling hall, pitch, and
sound come September would be worth its weight in goal.

It's a huge incentive for the side. They'll face Antrim, the 2021 All-Ireland champions, but they've a strong side with competition for places and are playing well.

The seven-figure deal fea-tures one of the newest and most intriguing figures in sports sponsorship — a mother of three, grandmother of 10, and now benefactor to tens of thousands of camogie

Carmel Naughton, who is in her "very late 70s", produced a deal which marries a complex hybrid of philanthropic, activations in a unique invest-

The Pitch understands that Naughton invested some of her own wealth, along with an investment by Glen Dimplex, the family firm, which will see all marketing and sponsorship assets returning to the

electrical products firm. Speaking to the Irish Exam-iner, Naughton revealed that the investment follows a life's love of camogie which was nurtured growing up in Coun-

ty Monaghan.
"We certainly don't do (the sponsorship) for thanks but we do it for what we hope is for the good of camogie, and in a small way the good of the country," she told The Pitch from her Florida base.

As a player in the 1950s and 1960s, Naughton was forced to endure the sort of conditions, that even by the standards of today's still improving female sporting landscape, are scarcely believable. "We made our own uniforms, which con-

sisted of a short mustard skirt and big thick woolly tights, (much to the disapproval of

some)," she recalls.

The deal came together following a conversation between Naughton and GAA commercial director Peter McKenna, "some years back", in which Croke Park facilitated and supported the concept into full-scale activation with the Camogie Association.

Once the finer points of the contract were worked out, the way was set for one of the longest initial headline sponsorships in sport and one which positions the association as one of the most secure in the long-term in



'Cork want to be tested every time we go out on the pitch – and this All-Ireland draw will certainly do that,' the Cork manager explained,

'We want to be challenged tactically as well. Each one of those group games is going to bring a different test. We cannot go out with the same ideas for every game. Each match will pose a different set of chal-

lenges for us.

'I am happy with the draw in that we will have to perform (every game) otherwise we won't qualify for the knockout stages. The top seed will go into the All-Ireland semi-finals and that's what we want to achieve. Every game is going to be difficult, even though we don't know the home and away situation just yet. The quality of each of those teams means it is going to be tough.

"That's what Cork wants. We want the girls tested and to give as many players as we can a run in the championship. This year's All-Ireland championship draw will do that."

Before all of that, a rematch with their 2021 All-Ireland final conquerors and a chance to lift a first league title since 2013 should bring the best out of an improving Cork.

Cork hope to shake Galway monkey off their backs

TOMORROW Littlewoods Division 1 League final: Cork v Galway, Croke Park, 7pm

IF the meeting of Cork and Galway in the Littlewoods division 1 league final in Croke Park tomorrow is even 70% as good in quality and drama as last September's All-Ireland final between the two, then we're in for a great hour's entertainment. What a game that was!

Unfortunately Cork came out on the wrong side of a 1-15 to 1-12 result.

We thought we had it when Katrina

We thought we had it when Katrina Mackey billowed the net on 48 minutes to give Cork a three-point lead, but Galway

finished in a blaze of glory.

It was a different Galway to previous teams which couldn't see tight games out. Their mindset had changed. Galway had started to beat Cork in league and

championship games in the two years pre-

Despite both side having qualified from their group in the 2020 championship when they met, Galway came out tops by

In their league semi-final meeting in Nowlan Park in June 2021, three months before the championship final, Galway edged Cork again after extra-time, 1-19 to 1-17. Those defeats mattered, those victories mattered, depending on which side of the fence you sit.

Galway will obviously go into this final as favourites. Cork have lost a lot of experience in recent years and, as expected, it's taking time to rebuild. Galway's rebuilding process is only around the corner with some of their key players in their early thirties.

They've lost a few of their extended panel through retirement but their back-



bone is still intact.

Galway haven't been hitting top form throughout the league but are on a high, with Sarsfields having recently won the All-Ireland senior club title and their players are now back full-time with the

The McGrath sisters, Orlaith and Siobhan, are top class forwards. Despite Gal-way presently having the upper hand at senior level Cork are on their heels, having defeated them two weeks ago in the division two league and minor All-Ireland final on the same day.

Cork will line out minus Hannah Looney, Pamela Mackey, Orla Cronin, and Linda Collins from last year's champion-

It's hoped that Looney and Cronin will be back for the championship. Fiona Keating hasn't started a league game since breaking a bone in her hand. Sorcha McCartan has joined the panel from Down and is a huge plus, but Cork have fitness tests for McCartan and Katrina Mackey ahead of tomorrow's encounter.

McCartan hasn't trained since the Kilkenny game four weeks ago due to an ankle injury and Mackey pulled her ham-

string last week.

Manager Matthew Twomey is hopeful they'll both make it. With the aforementioned absentees and injuries Cork's manager said: "We're down six from last

would be telling us things and giving us advice. It was just really cool to be inside there with them."

Of course they wouldn't give an inch on the pitch so the battle for a starting berth was hot. It still is, so Healy certainly isn't taking anything for granted, despite her consistently high scoring return and good form in recent months

"We are working so hard at training. When there is a lot of competition for places, it pushes you and everyone is pushing. I am just so lucky to get the chance to be on the starting 15 for the games that I have gotten on for."

Healy's pride in Aghabullogue is evident. The north west Cork parish has overachieved since the dawn of Gaelic games, providing the county with its first All-Ireland hurling title in 1890, when Dan Drew and Pat Buckley were to the fore.

"It's a long standing tradition in our family. I would have no choice but to play growing up. I was dragged along to all of the matches but I wasn't complaining and I love it. "The club are so supportive. We have three girls with the seniors. There is myself, Emma (Flanagan) and Méadhbh (Ring) in this year. Aoife Barrett was playing full-back with the Cork minors that won the All-Ireland. Our club would be flerce supportive of the Cork players in football as well, with Ciara McCarthy, Ciara was on the camogie panel and so was Katie McCarthy but she did her cruciate last year, So it's brilliant for a small club. But they are putting in flerce work at the underage so it's going

from strength to strength."
But it isn't all about the en-

vironment, or indeed DNA from one side. Healy's mother, Eileen starred when Cork won the All-Ireland junior title at Croke Park in 1996 and added a senior medal to her collection two years later.

"Mam played in the backs and Dad played in the forwards. I think Mam won player of the match in the junior but she wouldn't be telling you anything like that. But we are steeped in it."

She is forever thankful to Murray for bringing her through and halls his huge impact on not just Cork but the game of camogie. Now, Twomey and Fitzgerald are in situ.

Twomey is the steady hand on the rudder, having served as a selector with Murray last year. It says a lot for his lack of ego that he was willing to bring someone of Fitzgerald's profile. A stronger message on the primacy of the unit could not be delivered.

Healy admits to a feeling of excitement when hearing that the former Clare, Waterford, and Wexford hurling manager was going to be working with them. "We couldn't believe that he was coming down. It's really good in terms of camogie as a whole to have some-one as established like that getting involved. I don't know if a lot of people know it, but he has actually trained a good few camogie teams. He was training Clare. We are delighted with him. He is really good. Obviously, he is a great coach and he has loads of experience. He has won everything that he can as a manager and a player so he is bringing a wealth of knowledge to it. We are learning new things. And he is bringing in different ideas and he is always open to look if we have ideas. We are just delighted to have him down with us and are enjoying

It needed a Chloe Sigerson point from a long-distance free to secure a draw with defending champions Kilkenny in the group stages and edge a spot in the final on score difference. It was nice to come through a dogfight but Galway present an even tougher challenge.

"Obviously when you lose an All-Ireland final it's awful. I think we took learnings from it. It's a new year now and that is in the past. We are just concentrating on ourselves and working hard. We don't get to play in Croke Park too often. Cork haven't won a league title in a good few years so it would be great to do it."

My money's on Cork. New manager Matthew Twomey, assisted by motivator-in-chief Davy Fitz, has brought an injection of freshness and hunger to this experienced group. Looking for their first bit of silverware since 2018 and their first league title in almost a decade, they'll savour the opportunity to strike back at Galway after their defeat in last year's cracking All-Ireland final.

Eimear . Ryan Over the past 10 years in particular, the box office appeal of camogie has gone through the roof. This is due to a multitude of factors: increased coverage, broadcasting and streaming of games has enabled spectators to become more invested; rule changes have helped the flow of games; and increased focus in areas like S&C has given players the tools to be the best

versions of themselves.

Camogle has one main optics problem compared to hurling: a small pool of potential winners. The recent camogle All-Stars illustrated this. While six counties were represented in the nominations, the usual triumvirate of Cork/Galway/Kilkenny accounted for all the winners. And while the likes of Waterford, Wexford, and Dublin are steadily growing in influence, only

growing in influence, only
Tipperary has caused any palpitations to the top three in recent memory.
Tipp have had an unhappy

run in the league the last number of years, performing exceptionally well only for games to slip out of their grasp in the dying moments. They qualified for the league final in 2020, only for that fixture to be cancelled due to Covid; they led eventual champions Kilkenny for much of the semi-final last year, only to lose by a late goal. Some adjectives that I'm sure Tipperary players would gladly never see again in headlines related to their performances include heroic, gallant, brave, heart-broken, and crestfallen.

As a Tipp fan, I watched the final minutes of their league semi-final against Galway with white knuckles. Tipp led for much of the game, but Galway hung in there steadily, a Siobhan McGrath goal in the second half bringing them back within touching distance. Three minutes from time, the unerring long-range freetaking of Rebecca Hennelly levelled things up. Then,

seven minutes into injury time, Tipp's Claire Hogan gathered the ball near the halfway line. Seconds later, Sarah Dervan stepped into her path; both players went to ground. The ref immediately called a free for Galway which Hennelly calmly converted the seal the win.

Charging: another vestigial rule in the camogie playbook, one of the last differentials from hurling and one which, I'm sure, many players would be happy to see the back of. To be clear, Dervan did the right thing, what you would want any back to do, but Hogan being pursued by two Galway women and having just taken possession - did not have time to avoid her. It's a testament to the levels of excellence maintained by Sarah Dervan and her teammates since 2018, as Galway have established themselves as the dominant force in senior camogie. This culminated on Saturday. recently in the magnificent achievement of winning a record eight All Stars.

Saturday's league final represents an opportunity for Galway to consolidate their position, with a more silverware on the line. This match will be Galway's 13th appearance in the league final, having won the title on five previous occasions. If Galway are to win their sixth title this weekend, they must overcome the most successful county in the history of the competition.

Cork lead the roll of honours list for league titles with 16 triumphs. Historically, the Rebels and the Tribeswomen have clashed in five league finals, with Cork winning three (1996, 1998 & 2001) to Galway's two (2005 & 2015). The 2005 final saw Galway defeat the Rebels by 1-6 to 0-6, on a day when Veronica Curtain scored the winning goal. In 2015, captained by Niamh Kilkenny and under the management of Tony Ward, the Tribeswomen defeated Cork by 2-15 to 2-12. Niamh McGrath and Molly Dunne were the goal scorers in Semple Stadium as Galway won their fourth league title.

Nevertheless, the Rebels always present a formidable challenge, and Galway manager Cathal Murray was expecting nothing less than a very difficult test for his side





IT'S disappointing that a week after the Camogie Congress took place there is still nothing on their website to advise us what motions were raised, passed, or defeated.

One motion we do know was included is the continued work to work to work the continued wo

is the continued work towards the integration of the Camogie Association, the GAA and Ladies' Gaelic Football Association. It was overwhelmingly, backed by 97% of delegates on Saturday in the Rochestown Park Hotel. This means the three bodies have separately given formal support towards forming one single governing body in Gaelic games

A motion to the same effect proposed by the Gaelic Players' Association received the support of 89.8% of delegates at Febru-ary's annual GAA congress in Mayo. Similarly, 67 of the 75 delegates at the

Ladies' Gaelic Football Association's Congress backed the amalgamation.

Amalgamation seems to be on the cards, but it's going to be a slow process, with piecemeal integration over a number of years. That's to be expected as three massive organisations try to become one.

How the initial integrated systems work will determine the smooth or difficult transition of the larger process. From a player's perspective, an all-inclusive fixture list leading to a division between the ladies' football and camogie

calendars is a key priority as is the availability of pitches and facilities. Despite the best of intentions on all parts this is an area which is going to be difficult to manage. There just aren't enough pitches in any county to cope with

CORK camogie captain Amy Lee doesn't expect "much change" on the integration front across the remainder of her career but believes the next generation of players will benefit from the push to achieve one single Gaelic games governing body Although the GAA, LGFA, and Camogie Association passed motions at their respective Congresses in recent weeks committing to amalgamation, GAA president Larry McCarthy has warned that a long road lies ahead before full integration becomes a working reality.

Cork goalkeeper Lee knows that integration will ensure greater and more equal access to play-ing facilities for female players but does not believe that she will still be lining out when such equality is achieved.

"I always say, we have to forget about ourselves sometimes."

"There won't be much change between now and when I retire, there probably will be some, but there won't be much," Lee be-

You've to remember the eight and nine-year-olds that are coming up now, you want to set something in for them to come into and hopefully it will be better for all of them.

"I'm a big supporter of [inte-gration]. I just think it would run a small bit smoother and we'd have access to more facilities. "Obviously, most facilities are GAA owned and I understand why a male team would take

preference. But it (amalgamation) would help in terms of facilities, training, and money. And it would develop the game massively. That this year's Leinster ladies football final will be played as the curtain-raiser to the men's provincial football decider and the six cross-code double-headers recently announced by Munster GAA speaks to increased cooperation between the three associations, but Lee, who will skipper her county in this evening's Division 1 League final against Galway, said there are more basic improvements to be made than staging double-

headers. "I was never too fussed about double-headers.

"I was more fussed about whether we were going to get a hot shower afterwards, Because we have gone to matches and the showers

weren't working.
"In terms of double-headers, it

A third-year teaching student in Mary I College, she has been doing a bit of sub-bing at Coachford College, the camogie nursery she attended herself and in whose colours she played in an All-Ire-land junior final. She smiles at the enthusiasm she sees now as training is ramping up for this year's schools' com-

"When I was growing up and younger, I would have looked up to Orla Cotter and Briege Cotter and the Mackeys (Katrina and Pamela) and Gemma O'Connor, Ashling Thompson and people like them. Cork's hoodoo when it comes to big games against Galway continued at Croke Park when the Tribeswomen came from six points down early in the second half to record a four-point win and retain their Littlewoods Ireland National Camogie League Divi-

The All-Ireland champions have now won five consecutive big league and championship games against Cork in succession, extending back to the 2019 All-Ireland semi-final.

When Amy O'Connor slammed in a close-range goal to crown a superb attacking move at the start of the second half, the Rebels were 1-10 to 0-7 in front. However, the Galway bench, led by Carrie Dolan, was to transform this game. Dolan, Catherine Finnerty and Sarah Spellman all added huge energy and zest while Sabina Rabbitte also landed the insurance point at the end of the contest to confirm the victory.

It was all a far cry from the early stages, when a youthful Cork side hit the ground running, matching Galway score for score in the opening quarter before kicking on to build a three-point interval lead.

Ashling Thompson fired over three wonderful first-half points, while wing backs Saoirse McCarthy and Laura Hayes were also in sublime form, driving forward and chipping in with another trio of scores. Laura Tracey was notionally lined out at full-back but with Méabh Murphy dropping deep, Tracey picked up a world of ball and put Cork on the front foot time and again.

Galway had good early scores from Niamh Kilkenny and Aine Keane, but really only Ailish O'Reilly offered any consistent attacking threat.

Outstanding work from Laura Hayes and Katrina Mackey set up O'Connor for a simple goal with less than a minute gone after half-time, and it looked as if Cork were set to win their first league title in nine years.

Crucially, Galway replied with the next two points through Orlaith McGrath and O'Reilly, before a joint substitution brought Carrie Dolan and Catherine Finnerty into play

The duo made an immediate impact, combining to win a free that Dolan converted, and just short of the three-quarter mark, Finnerty took a pass from Niamh Hanniffy and beat two defenders with a single sidestep before slipping the ball underneath Amy Lee to level the game.

Cork responded well initially as Saoirse McCarthy fired her third point but by now they had lost all control of the middle third. With Dolan immediately operating as the focal point of the attack, Galway soon hit the front. The Clarinbridge player tied the game up with a free, then fielded a good diagonal ball and powered past her marker to register a vital second goal.

Two Dolan frees stretched the gap to five, Katrine Mackey replied with two Cork points in stoppage time, but by now all Galway had to do was protect their goal to preserve their league title. The match was to act as a curtain-raiser to the Munster SHC game between Cork and

Limerick in Paire Uí Chaoimh with a throw-in time of 2pm. The contest will now go

ahead on Sunday, April 24, but is not expected to form part of a hurling/camogie double-

Murphy said: "Unfortunately, Waterford are not in a position to field on Sunday. The original date for this

game was April 24. And assuming they had this weekend off, eight of the Waterford panel are not available. The game will go ahead the following Sunday."

The second of the planned double-headers is to take place on Saturday week involving Limerick and Tipperary at the Gaelic Grounds (5pm), ahead

of the Limerick/Waterford SHC game. A week later, Sunday May 1, the winners between Limerick and Tipperary will face Clare at Semple Stadium (12 noon), prior to the Cork/Clare SHC match.

The Munster senior camogie final is pencilled in for Sunday, May 8, at 12 noon in the Gaelic Grounds and will

take place before the Limerick/Tipperary SHC.

Because of the postponement of the Cork/Waterford camogie game, Munster camogie has announced the intermediate championship final between Cork and Kerry will now be played next Sunday in Páire Uí Chaoimh as curtainraiser to the Cork and Limerick hurlers.

Munster camogie chair Ger Browne said, "Munster camogie are delighted with the exposure which this decision will bring. We look forward to a number of excellent camogie games to whet the appetite in advance of the respective matches in the Munster senior hurling championship.

As the camogie season gets into full swing, we chat to three-time All-Ireland medallist and All-Star Orlaith McGrath

How is Galway shaping up ahead of the Littlewoods Ireland National Camogie League?

It is great to have the games back at this time of year. There are a lot more games in the calendar this year, which is brilliant. As a player, all you want to do is play competitive matches. You learn a lot from big days.

You have played alongside your sisters Niamh, Siobhán and Clodagh, both with Galway and your club Sarsfields over the years. Do you feel more secure when they're playing alongside you? It's all we have known from a young age, especially with our club. Your sisters read you better than other players. They know when you're going for that high or when you're going to make a pass. At home, it makes it easier when your family is on the same schedule as you and when you're doing the same thing.

Your dad, the famous
"Hopper" McGrath led
Sarsfields to All-Ireland Senior
Club Camogie title in 2019.
Was sport a huge part of your
household growing up?
We all got into GAA and
camogie from a young age and
my dad has been a really
influential figure, from playing
U/6 right up to senior level.
We're very fortunate to have
him in our club.

Is it hard to separate your dad from being your coach? It's so important to separate home life from playing sports - one person is your father and the other is your coach. If you don't separate the two, that's probably where you would begin to find it difficult. I don't take anything personally and you have to remember that anything he says as coach is for the betterment of the team.


What do you do away from sport?

I'm a P.E. and Irish teacher in Kinvara. I've a big interest in sports science and that's an area I would like to learn more about when I stop playing camogie. I love learning about how the body works and the different ways you can improve your performance in the game.

Does that line of work suit your sporting life, knowing exactly when you're off and having extended holidays?

Exactly! We're very fortunate to have great hours in teaching and the profession gives you a better opportunity to look after yourself and prepare yourself better for training. We're at an advantage compared to other professions. I'm on my feet most of the time and I'm not stuck at a desk for eight hours, that certainly helps.

With your understanding and knowledge of sports science, are you more careful about what you put into your body? There is a lot more information out there for everyone these days. I know I need to keep myself well informed and fit, even with my job. I would be conscious about what I eat and drink.



We're seeing a lot more camogie games on television – big sponsorship deals and the majority of games being played in GAA county grounds. Are you reaping the benefits of this increased exposure? Ever since the WGPA

Ever since the WGPA
(Women's Gaelic Players'
Association) has become
aligned with the GPA (Gaelic
Players' Association), they
have done trojan work to raise
the profile of the game. We're
really lucky to have that
representation. Littlewoods are
doing great work in promoting
the team and more and more
people are attending games.

Travelling to training, buying gear and sticking to nutrition and diet plans costs a lot of money. Do you get any reimbursement?

That's improving year on year for female players. Last year, it was announced by Minister Jack Chambers that female inter-county players would be getting the same grants as their male counterparts, and that's coming down the line this year. That's a huge positive for us.

Galway, Kilkenny and Cork are the only teams to have competed in the All-Ireland Senior Camogie final since Wexford won in 2012. What other counties could make a final this year?

There are five or six that are competing to win. We have had fierce battles with Kilkenny and Cork as well as Tipperary and Waterford over the years.

CORK boss Matthew Twomey is hoping Orla Cronin's

Cronin's (pictured) imminent return will help bolster his side's All-Ireland senior camogie championship aspirations.

Fiona Keating was a welcome addition to the Cork full-forward line in last Saturday night's league decider at Croke Park, The Courcey Rovers forward had not featured in the league since breaking her hand in February but there was disappointing news for the player Keating replaced, Down native Sorcha McCartan.

Also, while Enniskeane's Orla Cronin has not been involved in this year's league campaign, the All-Star forward is not far away from making a comeback.

'We are hoping Orla will be back within the next two weeks,' Cork manager Matthew Twomey informed The Southern Star.

'Hannah Looney is expected back within the next two to three weeks as well. Unfortunately, Sorcha McCartan got an MRI during the week and she has a hairline crack in her leg. We only found that out yesterday (day before the league final).'

The news on McCartan's injury is a blow as the forward had featured prominently during Cork's previous three league games. On a more positive note, Looney and Cronin's imminent return is grounds for optimism heading into the championship.

Cork will certainly be in the senior camogie championship conversation this summer

SO, is the glass half full or half empty at the conclusion of new Cork senior camogic manager Matthew Twomey's maiden National League Division 1 campaign?

There is no doubting that Saturday night's capitulation to Galway was a disappointing result. The Tribeswomen have won their last five competitive games against the Rebels, including the 2021 All-Ireland final.

Cork led 0-10 to 0-7 at half time and deserved every bit of that lead in Croke Park. Hungry, tenacious and driven forward by excellent Ashling Thompson and Saoirse McCarthy displays, Cork tore into the All-Ireland champions, who struggled to mount a response. Add to that an Amy O'Connor goal to open up a six-point lead and it is all the more perplexing that Cork couldn't see out the final two quarters.

True, Galway needed the impetus of substitute Carrie Dolan (who finished with 1-4) to turn the tide in their favour. But the truth is that Cathal Murray's side capitalised on Cork's mistakes and increased lethargy to storm to victory.

Was it a case of Cork tiring or Galway having a stronger bench that led to the Connacht side's win? The answer is a bit of both and the match statistics (courtesy of @gaa_statsman) back up those theories.

Cork lost despite having a better scoring average, 70 percent (14 out of 20 shots) compared to Galway's 61 percent (16 out of 26). But a more telling statistic is that Cork only managed three points, two of those were frees, in the entire second half following O'Connor's 31st minute goal. In con-

trast, Galway amassed 2-7, and 2-5 of that came from players introduced off the bench.

The stat that leaps out the most from Saturday's league final, however, refers to turn-overs. Galway grabbed possession off of Cork on 36 occasions compared to their opponent's 29. Those turnovers were crucial in the second half when Galway got on top and put pressure on the Cork puck out,

Looking back over Cork's entire league campaign, their path to this year's Division 1 final showcased some of the 2022 panel's strongest traits.

Shaking off the cobwebs of their opening win in Clare, Cork obliterated Limerick in cut-throat fashion before facing Kilkenny in monsoon conditions at Pairc Ui Chaoimh. Gaining the draw they required to reach this year's league decider, Cork were pushed to the limit by a Kilkenny side desperate to a venge

CORK'S wait for the Littlewoods Camogie National League Division I title goes on after their latest Croke Park heartache last Saturday night.

In a rerun of last year's All-Ireland final, it was Galway who, again, headed home with the silverware while Cork travelled home empty-handed, and still without a league crown since 2013. The Rebels produced an excellent firsthalf performance to lead at the break. Amy O'Connor's goal extended that advantage to six points immediately after the restart. Unfortunately, that was as good as it got for Cork.

Substitutes Carrie Dolan (1-4) and Catherine Finnerty (1-0) turned the game in Galway's favour, combining for 2-4 during a dominant closing 20-minute spell. A resilient Cork managed to reduce the deficit to three but Galway fired over a late score and deservedly added the Division 1 title to their 2021 All-Ireland senior success.

'I am very proud of my players as ten of them have made their senior debuts since the start of the league,' Cork senior manager Matthew Twomey told *The Southern Star*.

'Today was bonus territory. We put ourselves in a great position at the start of the second half. The disappointing thing is that we didn't kick on from there. We conceded a lot from our own puck-outs which was also disappointing, Overall, we are happy with the league campaign but it is just disappointing to lose another final.'

A free-flowing opening half produced 17 points and some scintillating individual scores. Ashling Thompson was one of Cork's best players on the night and replied to a Niamh Kilkenny opener. The teams were level six times during the first 30 minutes with the impressive Saoirse McCarthy firing over a brace and Thompson ending the half with 0-3.

Laura Hayes (0-2), Chloe Sigerson (free) and Katrina Mackey found their range to hand Cork a 0-10 to 0-7 interval lead. Aine Keane, Rebecca Hennelly, Allish O'Reilly and Aoife Donohue were on target for a Galway side struggling to find any rhythm.

Cork have played well in patches so far this year despite failing to overcome Kilkenny or Galway. Those two, along with Cork and Tipperary, are the quartet expected to challenge for the O'Duffy Cup.

It was interesting to hear Twomey namecheck Waterford, Wexford, Dublin and Clare as dangerous opponents (along with Tipp) in Cork's All-Ireland qualification group during his after match press conference on Saturday night. The Cork manager's belief is that there are no easy games in that group and that he will need his strongest available 30 players to be certain of claiming an All-Ireland quarter-final let alone a semi-final berth.

Cork are contenders for this year's All-Ireland, no question, but they are still in the chasing pack, behind Galway, following the conclusion of the league.

Hannah Looney and Orla Cronin's return would immediately upgrade Twomey's midfield and attacking options. Ashling Thompson has been in magnificent form and her partnership with Looney would make Cork a much more dangerous proposition around the middle of the pitch.

Orla Cronin has unfinished business from 2021 which saw the talented forward only make the All-Ireland team at the eleventh hour following an appeal against a red card. Not that Cronin needs any extra motivation, but one of the best forwards in the country will be as desperate as any of the Cork panel to go one better in the All-Ireland championship.

Twomey's new-look panel has shown flashes of brilliance in the past few months and enough quality in the draw with Kilkenny and defeat to Galway to suggest they have a realistic shot at winning an All-Ireland. That's all you can ask for at this time of the year.

NEXT LIP-CHAMPIONSHIP

The draw for the 2022 Glen Dimplex All-Ireland senior championship sees Cork facing Tipperary, Waterford, Wexford, Dublin and Clare in the opening group phase. Group 2 comprises Galway, Kilkenny, Down, Antrim, Limerick and Offaly. Each county plays one another once with the top ranked side in each group progressing to an All-Ireland semi-final. Second and third-placed teams in each group will contest this year's All-Ireland quarter-finals while the bottom-placed counties face a relegation play-off. The championship throws in on the weekend of May 21st/22nd, with the All-Ireland final at Croke Park on Sunday, August 7th.

"That's why they are All-Ireland champions," Twomey said.

"They came at us immediately after our goal and we had no answer, which is unfortunate. It was similar to last year's All-Ireland final when we went a goal up and they came back at us. Our pace dropped a bit after the goal and they excelled before scoring two vital goals."

Orlaith McGrath and Ailish O'Reilly (free) efforts reduced the deficit to 1-10 to 0-9 early in the second half. That's when Galway manager Cathal Murray played his trump cards. The introduction of Carrie Dolan and Catherine Finnerty coin-

cided with a Galway resurgence that Cork simply couldn't contain. Dolan landed a free prior to Finnerty shrugging off three Cork defenders before finding the net to level matters for a seventh time after 43 minutes.

Saoirse McCarthy split the posts in response but a revitalised Galway continued to pour forward. Dolan landed another free before walloping home to make it 2-11 to 1-11 with over ten minutes to go. Cork saw an Emma Murphy goal-bound shot miss the target by inches but Galway remained in the ascendancy with Dolan landing two scores in quick succession.

Katrina Mackey converted two placed sliotars at the beginning of seven minutes of injury-time but the writing was already on the wall for a Cork team out-muscled all over the pitch.

A goal in it, another Galway substitute, Sabina Rabbitte, put the result beyond doubt with her side's final score.

'Obviously, we would like to be heading into the All-Ireland championship off the back of a national league final win but we have to be happy as our panel is getting stronger,' Twomey concluded. 'There were seven of our girls playing out in Croke Park for the first time tonight.' Scorers

EANNA O'REILLY AT CROKE PARK


A STEELY second half comeback saw Galway claim their sixth National League title with a four-point win over Cork on Saturday evening at Croke Park.

After playing second fiddle to the Rebels during the first half, the concession of a goal shortly after the resumption saw the Tribeswomen fall into a very tight corner, with a six-point deficit to chase.

When Amy O'Connor raised a green flag in the 32nd minute, it looked as though a determined Cork side would push on and put the contest to bed. However, with their backs to the wall, Galway came out fighting and took over during the next 15 minutes. The impact of Carrie Dolan and Catherine Finnerty after their introduction was vital in sparking Galway into life. The pair netted the crucial goals which turned the game in the second half.

Another huge factor was the

Another huge factor was the impact and leadership shown by Galway's veterans in the crucial third quarter period. As they have done so many times

While these experienced players laid down the marker, Galway's comeback was equally driven by a dominant half back line, while others such as Niamh Hanniffy, Rebecca Hennelly and Orlaith McGrath had a major second half impact.

The result was that Galway scored 1-3 without reply to cancel out Cork's advantage, and though the Rebels briefly took the lead again through Saoirse McCarthy, the Tribeswomen subsequently hit another 1-3 on the bounce to go five points ahead late in normal time. It was another tremendous display of hunger, resolve, and determination from a side which brought home a fourth trophy in three years, to cement their status as the number one team in the country.

Saturday evening's league final saw Galway make the perfect start when Rachael Hanniffy sent Niamh Kilkenny through for a well taken point. Cork replied a minute later with a point from Ashling Thompson, before Ailish O'Reilly got her first score, to put the Tribeswomen O-2 to O-1 ahead.



Kate, 20, dies after accident in match

Bank holiday weekend joy for a GAA club in Galway quickly turned to tragedy when a "bubbly and tal-ented" young camogie player lost her life yesterday following an accident during a match.

Celebrations were just beginning in Athenry after the club's U15 hurling and camogie teams completed a unique double by winning the Féile na nGael county titles when the tragic news emerged of an incident in a

senior league game in Ar-drahan on Monday. Kate Moran — whose dad Cathal was a former Galway hurler and a mainstay of the Athenry team which won the All-Ireland club title in 1997, 2000, and 2001 — was seriously injured in an acci-dental collision in their game against Ardrahan.

Medical crews from three ambulances treated the 20-year-old at the south Co Galway venue before she was rushed to University College Hospital.

Prayers were offered at a special Mass in Athenry yesterday before Kate, a commerce student at NUIG, was later pronounced dead.

The former student at Presentation College in Athenry was an accomplished camogie player who won All-Ireland underage medals with Galway in addition to numerous titles with her club and colleges,

The family runs a successful auctioneering business

and is well-regarded throughout mid Co Galway. Kate was the eldest of four children and is survived by her parents Mary and Ca-thal, brother Thady, and sisters Leah and Saoirse.

Tributes quickly poured

in from clubs across the county.

"This is a terrible tragedy for her family, our club and our community. We are deeply saddened by these events," said Athenry Camogie Club. "Our sympathy and thoughts are with the Moran family and friends. Kate will be greatly missed by all who knew her.

"She won two All-Irelands at U16 level with Galway, both titles she was incredibly proud of. She was a tremendous role model for our many underage players and a wonderful leader both on and off the field of play. Her bubbly personality will be remembered for eter-

Kate's father bids heartfelt farewell to the 'most gorgeous girl' who was a 'shining light'

An entire community has been stunned into silence by the tragic death of a young GAA star in Co Galway, her funeral was told yesterday.

Kate Moran, 20, from the village of Monivea, was fatally injured playing for Athenry Camogie Club in a senior league game in Ardrahan on Monday.

A rising star who won two All-Ireland medals for Galway at under-16 level, she died in hospital on Tuesday. GAA players from Mon-

ivea and Athenry lined the route outside the Church of The Sacred Heart, Ryehill, Monivea, yesterday, with many gathered for over an hour before the funeral

Galway and Athenry GAA flags flickered in the breeze outside the church as dozens listened to the service.

Parish priest Ronnie Boyle said the community "has been stunned into silence by this inconceivable, terrible, unfortunate accident".

He said the best way to celebrate Kate's life is with words and action, "because that's what Kate was"

Fr Boyle described her as a beautiful young woman, blessed with so much talent and ability in this life".

"Talent as a camogie player, what a bright future she had," he told mourners.

"An intelligent and ambitious student, a caring daughter, friend and team-

"The more we think about all her qualities, the more we are confounded by the nature of her death.

He described her life as "filled by such promise" and said she had a beautiful,

deeply loving family. Kate's father Cathal said that he and his wife, Mary were "very proud" to be her parents. He described her as their "angel" who was loved

We hope Kate, our love, that she didn't suffer when this happened to her," Mr Moran told mourners.

"I think it was quick. I was was very close to her when it happened. As were all her

playing colleagues on the field that she loved also.

"I won't say much more about that terrible evening.

"Our beautiful Kate, whom we loved so dearly. And Mary and I are so proud to be your parents, Kate, and we love you so much since the day you were born.

"I think you are our angel now, Kate and I think also that you are such a special

Mr Moran described how he bought a book a number of years ago about how a young woman died aged in her early 20s.

"Whatever it was, I thought of that book in the last few days and little did I know when I bought the book what would happen," he added.

"Kate, she always had so

many things to do.

"She was a busy lady, "She hadn't time to help us all the time, she had a lot of things to do.

"She had a great spring in her step, always.

"Particularly lately, in recent times even more so with so much coming together for her and she had so much beauty in her life.

"Kate, she had so many strings to her bow. There wasn't just one thing or one

"She had so many friends from so many circles of life.
"She loved to have the fun.
Everything had to be a little

The thing about Kate we are really proud of is that she always did the right thing. and when we knew she had that principle, we were

happy when she was out." Kate was due to celebrate

her 21st birthday in just two weeks time "Mary and herself had

planned a four- or five-day break in New York to celebrate and she was saving up it," Mr Moran told mourners, "But sadly that day didn't come.

'It was the girls' character and the way they won the game was huge for us. They are never beaten. Looking back, maybe had we lost the Munster final after losing the National League final (to Galway) maybe that might have put a bit of doubt in people's minds about us.

from Tipperary, would be known for a lot of things but singing, she professes, is not one of them.

It is a rare blank in the col-umn marked 'traits and skills' for the Moneygall Mary Ryan, heading into her own next chapter of a magnus opus career that extends to an 18th season of senior summer ca-mogie for the Premier in this evening's Glen Dimplex All-Ireland Champions Group 1 opener against Clare at The Ragg (5pm throw-in,Live on Tipperary Camogle YouTube). She patiently listens to the

She patiently listens to the questions she has fielded for a few years now, as to what the motivation is for someone who will be 35 at the end of the year to be still doing this, particu-larly with the demands and commitment required having increased immeasurably since she hit her fourth decade, not to mind from when she was a youngster with a tongue stud and not a care in the world, only to puck ball.

Anyone trying to track Ryan down now will realise very quickly camogie is just one element of her life. A process development engineer with Boston Scientific in Clonmel, Ryan is also a sports, per-formance, and personal devel-opment coach, having just graduated with the latter qualification from her most recent return to third level education last month. That means she works with schools and clubs but also with indi-viduals. This has now been in-corporated by her bosses into the workplace too. So between it all, most

hours are covered. It is easy

from the remove of a couch, or the stand, to wonder if someone would want to do other things in life that they might be missing out on or had to put on the back burner due to their commitment to the high performance environment. But that is attempting to put our perspectives on people we don't understand.

"If it was easy everyone would be doing it," smiles Ryan through a laptop screen. "It's just part of my make-up. part of my routine

Tipp have made giant strides in the past five years and are seeking a signature win to continue that, having gone close against eventual victors Galway and Kilkenny in Championship and two National Leagues the past 18 months. Reaching a national final or winning a major

final or winning a major medal is a target, and something they feel capable of now, but it isn't why Ryan is there.

"I don't think you would find many players who would just throw in the towel if you said, 'You are not going to win a medal at the end of the year.'
"I do enjoy that process of training, enjoying the challenge of keeping up with the game. The game has changed massively and it is a challenge and you do get a land when a young one comes in and is legyoung one comes in and is leg-ging it around the place. "And then I have been lucky to avoid anything that kept me

out long term. It's not easy but it's manageable keeping up with the game, managing

niggles, and as long as the enjoyment outweighs that sort of thing... if it was pulled from me tomorrow, I know I'd miss it so I enjoy it while I can."

It's not as if Ryan is hanging on by her fingernails. She belatedly won a first All-Star two years ago in the full-back line, having also been nominated in

having also been nominated in the half-back, midfield and half-forward divisions over the years also. She was nominated again at the end of last season, having been named Munster player of the year.

When she was brought into the panel first in 2005, Tipp were reigning All-Ireland champions. She had a big reputation, having played at every underage level for the county and been named on the first Colleges' All-Star team in 2004 alongside the likes of Cork trio Rena Buckley,

Kilkenny's Jacqui Frisby.
Tipp lost the All-Ireland in

The loss of competitiveness grated initially but she began to develop an alternative view over time, making her an excellent captain along the way as many of her current teammates were blooded over the past decade.

Reflecting with pride

Plunkett Carter looks back on the highs and lows of the last 50 years of a great sporting institution, St Finbarr's camogie club

A GOLDEN jubilee is always a proud and distinguished time for any club and the Barrs camogie club can look back with pride and satisfaction on their past 50 years.

their past 50 years.

During those years they were blessed with a dedicated and passionate group of volunteers, players, coaches, supporters and gifted administrators.

While the present club operates in very different circumstances compared to 1972 when Francis Barry Murphy, John Barry-Murphy, Mary McCarthy, Kitty O'Grady, and others reformed the camogie wing of the illustrious club, the core principles remain the same, namely to offer young girls a healthy and safe environment in which to play.

The history of St Finbarr's Camogie Club can be traced to pre-Cumtann Camogaiochta na hÉireann

Records exist of a group of girls playing in the Lough area in the latter years of the 1800s. Since then a team representing St Finbarr's has fielded in every decade. Famed hurling families, the Dooleys and Sheehans, combined to launch a camogic club in 1905; Mary Agnes Sheehan, sister of "Rocket" and Katie Dooley (daughter of Tom), formed Clan Eimear based in the Gould Street area.

_However, not all were pleased with the prospect of women playing hurling and Fr Fleming of the Lough parish condemned what he termed their unfeminine activities. After a few years activity they disappeared from the scene but were revived as a senior side in the thirties.

In 1957 another short-lived Barrs team, founded by Imelda Leahy and Eily Murphy assisted by Moll Doolan, Alice Meaney, and Fr Good en-

tered the fray. Trained by Barry Barrett they won the Junior Championship in 1964 but disbanded shortly afterwards.

The present club was reformed in 1972 under the guidance of Frances Barry-Murphy and her late father John Barry-Murphy.

Mary McCarthy and Kitty O'Grady were also of great influence. Like any other club, St Finbarr's experienced their ups and downs on the playing field and contested a number of finals before eventually winning the first junior county title in 1981 defeating Blackrock.

The following year they went on to win the 1982 Cork Intermediate Championship. These victories sparked a golden era for the Barrs when the girls in blue won all before them including three consecutive U16 County Championships which paved the way for a three-in-a row All-Ireland minor titles for Cork.

St Finbarr's contributed 10 players

St Finbarr's contributed 10 players including three captains Colette O'Mahony, Deirdre Christie, and Paula Carey. During this time they also won the 1982 Cork Féile na nGael and numerous other trophies at U14, 16 and 18 as well as another junior title in 1984.

The senior team contested two finals in 1990 and 1992 and, while defeated by Glen Rovers in both games, progress continued. In 1991 the junior team completed the B Championship and League double and success continued at underage with the winning of the U14 and U16 Championships in 1995. It was evident that the hard work of the underage mentors was begin

It was evident that the hard work of the underage mentors was beginning to reap its rewards as young players were showing great promise and hopes were high that the ambition of winning a first senior title was not too far away.

not too far away.

In 1994 the Camogie Board introduced a Senior B Championship in which the Barrs were graded. They contested three Senior B finals in 1995, 97, and 98 without success but eventually made the breakthrough in 2001 when crowned Senior B Champions defeating Milford in the final.

A year later they were back in the county senior final but were narrowly defeated by Cloughduv. The heartbreak of agonising defeats continued, but this bunch of girls were not going to be denied the club's lifelong ambition to win a senior county title which came to fruition on Sunday October 8, 2006 when they restored pride in the blue jersey and brought great honour back to Togher with a scintillating county final victory over Imokilly.

Barrs players have contributed hugely to Cork's success at inter county level down through the years. Marie O'Sullivan, Claire Cronin (holder of four senior All-Ireland medals), Colette O'Mahony, Colette Cronin, Brid Kelleher, Jenny Duffy, Lynda O'Connell (now in her 30th season), Orla O'Sullivan, Ellen Clifford, Meabh Cahalane and Gemma O'Connor have all won senior medals with Cork.

In recent years Keeva McCarthy, Eimear Hurley, Aoife O'Neill, Ciara Hurley, Ciara Golden, Ella Wigginton-Barrett, Nicole Olden and Orlaith Cahalane have all been part of successful intermediate, minor and U16 winning feams.

U16 winning teams.

Many girls have made huge sacrifices for the club but nobody has done more to promote the game than Marian McCarthy. She continues to make huge contributions to the Barrs and to camogie in general.

In February 2020 the inspirational

In February 2020 the inspirational Marian received the prestigious President's CLG Award for outstanding contribution to the GAA.

As a player she tasted a junior championship success with the Barrs in 1981 and then victory at intermediate level the following year to send the club up to senior level for the first time in its history. When her playing career ended, Marian turned her attention to administration, mentoring and coaching. She was elected chairperson of the Cork Board in 2002 and held the post for 14

years.

For many, her greatest achievement is arguably the developmen of Cork's camogie grounds and club house at Castle Road, bringing this impressive development through to fruition. It stands as a fitting legacy to her and her colleagues, something for which camogie shall be indebted to them for many years to come.

Cork camogie author Mary Moras complimented Barrs greats Colette O'Mahony and Gemma O'Connowhen she wrote, "At the age of 10 Colette followed the family tradition and joined the Barrs. Hours of practice paid off when she won the Corl Féile na nGael Skills title in 1981. The following year she helped Barrs with Cork Féile. Colette played major role in the club's hat-trick of U16 Championships between 1982-86 "She captained Cork to win the

All-Ireland in 1983 and for good measure added a second in 1984. Of the inter-county front, Colette en joyed a great innings winning three All-Ireland Senior Championships three National Leagues and Inter-Provincial senior medals.

"Her greatest hour in Cork colours was in 1993 in Nowlan Park where she punished Kilkenny's indiscipline with a remarkable display of free taking that yielded 3-5."

Her last remaining sporting ambition was fulfilled on a wet morning a

The senior footballers play their Munster final today in Kerry at 12.15pm. Cork camogie play the second round of their All-Ireland championship in Pairc Uí Rinn at 5pm against Clare.

As it stands, at the time of

As it stands, at the time of writing, Libby Coppinger will travel with the footballers and Meabh Cahalane will line out against Clare.

I'm going to lay the blame for this at the feet of the LGFA because that's where it belongs. There was an agreement that the camogie associ-ation would fix all their games for Saturdays and the LGFA for Sundays. Straightforward

The Munster board of the LGFA then placed their Munster final for today as a curtain raiser to the men's Munster senior football final. No issue with that, but then you should make every effort to accommodate a solution if one is required and the LGFA have refused to do so, despite Cork and Clare offering to move to accommodate the

players.

First, Cork and Clare agreed to switch their championship game to tomorrow, Sunday, but the LGFA said no as Clare and Down are playing in the intermediate champion-ship, and they wouldn't consider bringing that game for-ward to today. So, both Cork and Clare looked at their schedule and said they were willing to cancel the camogie championship game altogether this weekend and move it to either the weekend of June 11 or 25 when they both have free weekends in their schedule and again that wasn't facilitated as they have other games settled for that

So, despite the fact that it is the Munster branch of the LGFA that made the switch to Saturday here and the camogie counties involved did their utmost to rectify the situation, they were denied at every suggestion. I've said it before; there is an arrogance at ad-ministration level within the LGFA at provincial and national level.



Cork won their opening round against Wexford last Saturday in Bellefield. I have to say that some counties need to do much better when hosting these games. I arrived 40 minutes before the game, and I got the last programme. At that stage there were very few spectators in the ground.

There were no teams announced before the game and no substitutes announced throughout, of which there were a total of eight. So not only were the majority of speconly were the majority of spec-tators without a programme to identify players, but they also had no idea who was coming on or off, unless they were extremely familiar with both panels.

That's really not good

hosts. With this being their opening fixture, why weren't both games played as a double-header last Saturday? It just seems ridiculous.

Teams are obsessed with creating space. But at this stage it's so flagged that it's not giving the expected, or acceptable,

What happened to just trying to get that yard on your marker?

That's creating space. That telepathic understanding between players that gives

your team-mate that 60/40 advantage,

your team-mate that 60/40 advantage, even 55/45 will do it if the player is up to it.

Aaron Gillane did it to goal twice against Tipperary. Alan Connolly did it last weekend, with just that yard of space, and Galway's Carrie Dolan did it against Cork in their recent league final victory over the Rebels. over the Rebels.

All three players just needed a yard and they made it work. Go back to the days

when you won your patch.

Defenders are as fast as forwards. The sprint out the wing gives both players an opportunity to gain ground if they've been slow off the mark.

As a forward, you've still a lot to do so far out from goal. Cork have speedy forwards, but I don't feel we're capitalising on that. Their speed should be utilised to get that yard ahead, not a dash to the

It's not all about speed either. Dolan got just that fraction of a step-in front of Libby Coppinger in the final and pushed past

I'd suggest that we should be getting the ball in first-time nearer to the goal and not out the wings; there's just too much for

I remember Eddie Brennan once saying that he never wanted a ball struck to him out the wing, he wanted it as near to goal as possible. Why, he asked, would you want it as far from the goal as possible?

Cork's two wing-backs, Laura Hayes and Saoirse McCarthy, are very impres-sive coming forward and a big plus for Cork, no doubt about that. Does that how-

Cork, no doubt about that. Does that how-ever lend to midfield being bypassed?

Ashling Thompson is too good a player to be bypassed. She tends to drift out of games for long periods.

I'm not saying Cork's current style is the reason for that, but it isn't helping.

Why not put Thompson up near goal?

Why not put Thompson up near goal? Imagine giving her a ball inside. Would that also give Cork the option of hitting a few high balls in?

She'd brush her marker aside, that's without question; Hannah Looney the

I think we need to change things up a it, it's too predictable and it's markable. There's something in the water in Clare. No one gave them a serious thought last February in hurling or camogie.

Both teams are playing out of their skins. Their big performances have been backed up with even bigger performances.

'We are more focused on ourselves rather than Clare heading into this weekend's match but we are also conscious of the fact it is their sixth week on the trot playing competitive Camogie,' the Cork manager added.

'It is a big ask for the Clare players. A lot of their games have been away from home as well. I would imagine they might have to freshen things up a bit. I watched back their game against Tipperary and they were impressive.

On the plus side, Cork came through last weekend's All-Ireland senior championship opener away to Wexford, 2-14 to 1-6, with Sorcha McCartan and Orla Cronin continuing their respective returns from long-term injuries.

Add in Hannah Looney's imminent return from the USA and Matthew Twomey's panel is beginning to take shape ahead of a crucial period.

'Every game we play, Cork are more often than not going to be favourites, so every team is going to put it up to us,' the Cork manager said.

'More than anything else, we have to match the intensity of our opponents if not top it. That was one of the most pleasing aspects of last weekend's wir down in Wexford. We matched them physically and edged the result because of that.

'Panel-wise, Orla Cronin came on (against Wexford), as did Sorcha McCartan. It was great to see Sorcha back be cause she has had a long injury layoff. Now Hannah Looney is due back this week as well and she is going to make a huge impact.



CAMOGIE followers and mentors were saddened last week to learn of the passing of Lil O'Neill (nee O'Grady).

Lil served camogie with huge distinction and was chair of the Cork Camogie Board for six years from 1960 to 1966.

During four of those years Lil was also chair mn of the Munster Camogie Council from 1960 to 1964 and she took the reins again in the Munster Council from 1968 to

In total she served the province for 12 years

Previously, Lil had served the Cork board as treasurer from 1958 and 1959. She had huge interest in schools and col-leges camogie and chaired the Munster Colleges Council and also served as presi-dent of the All-Ireland Colleges Council. The ultimate honour of president of the

The ultimate honour of president of the Camogie Association was bestowed on Lil from 1965 to 1967 when she became the association's 13th president and it was a fitting honour for a hugely efficient and admired official.

Lil was elected unopposed at Congress in 1965 and used her casting vote to defeat the motion calling for the abolition of the double crossbar which was a feature of camogie in those days

During her presidency in 1966 the first national training programme for coaches were introduced.

She was one of three camogie selectors of the Gaelic Weekly All Star award which was the predecessor of the current GAA All Stars, when the scheme was extended to camogie in 1964.

Lil was a wonderful person and was always dignified and sincere; her dedication to the game was second to none and she chaired meetings with huge authority and

As a player, Lil lined out with St Aloy-sius School, Old Aloysians and the Cork schools team, winning several champion-

She was also a hugely popular referee both at local and national level and she of-ficiated at the 1969 All-Ireland senior final

She will be greatly missed by all who knew her. Her dedication to camogic knew no bounds and her like will not be seen
